## January

Winnipeg Sunday 1

Up at 8 AM. Max 26 below Min. 28 below Wrote all day. Rung up friends and wished them a happy New Year. Mays and I to supper at the Charly Bells Cold wind, bad weather.

#### Monday 2

Up at 7.50 AM. Max 24 below min 32.° below. Reception at Government House. The Military of the Winnipeg garrison went together A fine lot of officers turned out. They assembled at the mess of Strathconas Horse. A very cold wind, all day. Lieutenant Fraser S.H. brought up from the Garry club drunk. Placed him in close arrest Poor foolish chap. It appears that no steps were taken to ascertain why he left the 10<sup>th</sup> and the Indian Army. He was gazetted first. Too bad. It gives a bad impression to the public, and the Active Militia. Colonel Biggar went to govt House. I remained with the governor to the last.

# Winnipeg Man. Tuesday 3

Up at 8 AM. Max. 8° above. Min 28° below. Colonel Biggar called to see me and I invited him to come and see us Thursday morning at 8.30 since that I have asked him to dinner. Busy all day at confidential reports. Had young Critchley paraded before me about the neglect to take stock properly in the mess last month. I gave him some good advice. Sandow.

#### Wednesday 4

Up at 7.35 Max.  $8.^{\circ}$  B. Min -  $18^{\circ}$ B Busy all day. Very cold, a blizzard. Wrote up accounts. Mays poor girl busy sewing for the Children Will not rest. Always on the sacrifice for her children. I hope they will be grateful Sandow.

Wednesday 4 [there are two printed days of Wednesday 4 January in this diary] Up at 7.30. Max. 8° below zero, Min 18° below Major Munro called to see what could be done about lectures at the Institute and I said that I would help them.

### Thursday 5

Up at 4. AM. Could not sleep. Then had a lot of Sandows developer and shaved. Went to bed and slept well until 7.30 AM.

Max. 2,° above Min . 14 below. Max. 2° above. Min 14° below Busy all day Several people congratulated me on my birthday, which must have appeared in the paper. Col. Biggar came to dinner at seven o'clock. After dinner the Burnhams, the Haslets, J.J. McHugh, the Mr Vibart, Captain Donnelly, - We played bridge until the clock struck eleven, then refreshed. I was all right. Sandow I had no time for

Winnipeg Friday 6

Up at 7.30 Max. 8°A. Min. 22° below 0.

Busy all day. Finished Confidential reports. Wrote all afternoon Checked Miss Pennefathers work. It is very good Colonel Biggar called to say good bye. I spoke to him about the coal supply being insufficient, and he then told me that he would be glad if I would send him a comparative statement of allowances and expenditure. He leaves tomorrow by the Montreal train. Sandow a lot. I am quite thirsty at night, slight symptom of pain in small of my back.

## Saturday 7

Up at 7.30 Max. 6° below. Min. 24° below zero

Busy all day gave orders to the Adjutant and to the Staff Adjutant Captain Ketchen, that the Squadrons here are to be trained as horse breakers. Trainers are to swim horses in the summer over both the Red and Assineboine rivers that Lieut Arnott is to take charge of the acting adjutancy and be a couple of weeks with Capt Bell the present adjutant so as to get along at the duties of the position, that the training must be well up to date in everything. Ketchen to find out if the Winnipeg Street railway could give terms to the people of the military forces here who have to go far out to the range just bought and taken over, also for men of the corps who wish to go out to the new range.

I inspected the remounts to be handed over they are much improved. Gave orders to Ketchen and the adjt that the horses purchased in January last are not to be until further orders, ridden by recruits or officers and men attached for courses and are not to be changed when sold off to a man.

#### Monday 9

Up at 7.30 Max. 4° below zero, Min 24° below. A blizzard started in the afternoon, very severe. Some of the officers of my course were delayed by the storms delaying the trains, a bad lookout. Inspection of remounts on Saturday last revealed a great improvement, the horses will be the best they ever had. Letter from the Chief of Staff re training. I have carrying mine out the same way.

Up at 7.20 Max. 36° above zero. Min 8° above zero. Busy all day. Major Macdonald came to see me at my request about his application to be brevetted Lieut Col. He talked about his services, the arrant conceit of the man was enough to sicken one. He stated that he had nine months of misery, brought upon himself, although he does not say so. I wrote forwarding his

application saying that he had been doing well since the 23<sup>rd</sup> of November, the date upon which the letter from AG was read to him.

Winnipeg, Tuesday 28

Up at 7.30. Max. 30° above. Min 22° above Much work. Gave Mr. Cottrell something to do in the shape of carrying two letters of introduction, one each to Edmonton and Vancouver. Wrote General Mackenzie asking to have rank of brevet Colonel restored Have little hopes that I will get justice. Sandow a lot.

## Wednesday 29

Up at 7.30. Max 30° Min 16° above – Busy all forenoon. Up at 7.10 Max. 38° min 24° above zero. Busy all day, much to do. Courses of infantry officers called. and I spoke to them, a nice lot of young men. Major Smith had a long talk with me about matters. Uniform etc.etc

# Winnipeg, Monday 10

## Regina to Winnipeg Friday 14

Up at 4.0 AM. Left by train at 6 AM could get no berth until I got Broadview took no lunch, late breakfast the reason. When I got home there was no one at station. Telegram miscarried. Cold better Met the Wapella troop OC of 16 L.H. and his wife on train had a nice chat. Col. Rankin on train. Max. 52 min, 22 Snow on the ground at Winnipeg. Cold raw day. There has been a bad blizzard during my absence.

#### Saturday 15

Up at 6.45 [6 written over 7] six forty five. max. 52 Min 22°.

Up at 6.45 Max. 40° Min, 30° 30° - at 8 am. Busy all day. Went to Charley Bells lecture on the history of expeditions to the west Sandow

Winnipeg Sunday 16

Up at 7.30 AM. Max. 56° min 41. Busy all day Captain Barrington called to see me. Donnelly and Milne called. I wrote a good deal.

Monday 17

Up at 6.45 max. 62° min. 40° Sandow. Busy all day. Appointment at 10.00 with Mr Aikins.

Winnipeg. Tuesday 18

Up at 6.30. Max. 52. min 32° Busy all day long. Shaw C L came to see me at night we talked over the book, and now quite understand one another Called on J.A.M Aikins, arranged matters Sandow.

Winnipeg Wednesday 19

Up at 6.30 Max. 52° Min. 40. Busy all day. Much worried Went to stables at noon several officers were reported absent, A.E. Shaw P.C. Shaw. Capt Gray attached. They came to stables late.

#### Thursday 20

Up at 6.30. Max 52 [2 written over 4] Min 34°. Busy all day a great deal of trouble with the 22<sup>nd</sup> regiment on account of the crest. By some mistake the crest intended for the 29<sup>th</sup> went to it and the whole of the officers wish to resign.

Winnipeg Friday 21 Up at 6.00 AM. Max 58°. Min 36°- Busy all day. Capt Ketchen states that the statement of Capt Dixon to the effect that the DOC always has the DSA as Chief of Staff, all nonsense. Dixon is a schemer. Sandow. Arranged for church parades of the units and to move by the Government House- so that Earl Gray may see them.

## Saturday 22

Max. 58° Min. 36° up at 6. AM. Busy all day. Wrote to the department to the effect that I intended Captain Mackie to be chief staff officer at camp. Dixon did not behave properly at all in suggesting himself and I should have put my foot down.

Earl and Lady Gray came to town today and stay a week I believe. I arranged for a church parade all the troops and boy Scouts. I arranged went to go(?) the Holy Trinity Church and met—His excellency there Ketchen met my kind(?) to meet His excellency at the Holy Trinity church all the rest of the troops to go to their selected church. Boy Scouts to Trinity-

Winnipeg Sunday 23

Up at 6.30 Max 62. Min 42 All went off as arranged for the day church parade of garrison and scouts

#### Monday 24

Up at 6. AM. Max. 66° Min 52- Busy all day. Inspected guard of honour for the musical theatrical festival for the Earl Grey Cup as His Excellency must be present I believe, each night. Wrote thirteen pages of foolscap in book. Sandow a lot

Winnipeg Tuesday 25

Up at 6 AM. Max. 65. Min 45 Harwood busy trying to photograph a robin. (English Thrush. Busy all day, office until 1.00 Lunch at the club by JAM Aikins and to His Excellency Earl Grey. Then a reception to Lady Grey at Govt House Mays the poor little dear had to remain at home with the excuse of Sir Henri Taschereaus death. Dined at Govt House to meet Earl & Countess Grey. Thenna to the theatre with Sir Daniel and Lady McMillan "The Tyranny of the tears" by an Edmonton troupe competing for Earl Greys cup

Winnipeg to Wednesday 26 Saskatoon,

Up at 6.30 went to the train to accompany his excellency Earl Grey to the Penitentiary at Stoney Mountain. The fellow passengers in Mr Whytes private car were, M Arundel Superintendant of the line to Fort William Mr JA.M. Aikens Dr Montague, Mr Chipman Lord Lacelles, His excellency Earl Grey and Sir Daniel McMillan. We were met at Stoney Mt by Mr A Manseau deputy Warden with three motor cars. The School Children sang God Save the King, but mistook the gorgeously dressed Sergeant of the Guard for His Excellency. Colonel Irvine met the party at the Penitentiary and conducted us all over. I was surprised to see on Sam Bedsons brass that his age was only forty four when he died, he was at least sixty years if not more. He died in. 92 and in 1870 was a heavily bearded Quartermaster Sergeant of the Quebec Rifles. We returned after seeing everything. Earl Grey much pleased with what he saw I went back to the

office and found that I had to be personally present at Saskatoon to see the land for the drill hall I started at 9. PM by C.N.Ry. Met Hayes of Edmonton on the train, accompanied by an ex Klondyke man. To bed at 12.00

## Winnipeg to Saskatoon, to see drill hall site Thursday 27

Up at daylight. Train behind time all day. Met Mr William Newman a Contractor, Mr Stewart a land owner of Minneapolis, both Canadians from the Lake Erie shore of Ontario. Hayes I saw little of all day as he was busy smoking. At Humboldt where we stopped for about twenty minutes, I met an old friend Mr Norquay late of Edmonton, son of the late John Norquay premier of Manitoba, and had a chat with him. He introduced me to Mrs Norquay and her sister Miss McCully who came up on the train, but who had no one with her. She attended poor Colonel Irvine and helped to bring him around from his severe attack of illness a very nice typical Canadian girl. Changed Cars at Warman for Saskatoon, was met at the station by Acheson Aikins and smith, also Lang all Majors of local corps. Major Carey also came. He had come by the C.P.Ry. and as I had a return ticket by the CN. Ry I could not leave for Winnipeg tonight. Mr Mollard Public works dept of Regina met us and we all went to see the site and then had a motor around town. Site satisfactory cost is \$47.000.00/100 249. by 200 feet. faces the drive or South Sask.

## Saskatoon to Friday 28 Winnipeg

Up at 6.30 had a pleasant chat with the Aikins. The Major had to go back to the office last night. A cold rain fell after we got to bed last night and at eight thirty A.M this morning it changed to a disagreeable fall of snow accompanied by an east north east wind. It should do good though the snow will soak into the dry ground which has much need for moisture. Aikins saw me to the train he and Acheson saw me office. Nice fellows both. Changed at Warman for the east bound train, got a good berth, lower, about fifty miles east the snow was succeeded by rain. No acquaintances on the train. Read a lot of magazines. To bed at 10.30 I spent last evening with the officers of the regiments at Saskatoon who brought me to the club, a very pleasant chat with all. Smith, Acheson, Lang, Aikins Dulmage, and some new officers present. All are now on good terms with one another and were pleased with Aikins, the arrangement Ketchen made rent (?) sent up by me to put all straight.

# Saskatoon to Winnipeg by train, Saturday 29

Up at half past five AM, breakfasted early arrived at nine AM. Was met by Martin Went to the office very busy indeed. Young Wetton and another Englishman called to see me gave them advice, as to what they require. Went in the afternoon to the laying of the corner stone of Westminster church by Earl Grey. Flora went with me. Earl Grey and party went home.

#### Sunday 30

Up at 6.30 Max. 30° Min. 22 Took a brisk walk around the blocks to the south weather cold temperature 26° above zero yet the leaves are out. I hope the frost will not affect them Met Donnelly at the door on his way back from church. He came in the evening, had a pleasant chat.

Wrote 30 pp of foolscap in book. Donnelly says that a small percentage in the book is sufficient for collaborator. Miserable raw day. cold wind. frost last night.

#### May

Winnipeg, Monday 1

Up at 6.35 Max. 40°. Min. 22°. Meeting of Lord Strathconas took place at the Office of the Minister of Education. Captain Borden and I were the only officers of the Militia present. I as chairman got him to explain and assist. Captain Conger was appointed the Secretary. Cheques to be countersigned by the chairman. Resolved too the the [*sic*] school inspectors of the province at large and for Winnipeg, Brandon and Portage LaPrairie the Superintendent of schools be the judges for physical training training of the school children. That the D.O.C. M.D 10 be the judge for the cadets. Any officer chosen by him to be responsible for it. Sandow as usual. Weather very disagreeable indeed cold and strong N.E. wind all day. Much trouble. Sandow

#### Tuesday 2

Up at 6.30 Max. 48° min 28°. Busy all day at many things. Wrote a little. J C. Waugh called to see the \_\_\_\_ head which McIllree wishes to sell. Sandow

Winnipeg Wednesday 3

Up at 6.30 Max - Min.

Wrote Galbraith for claim record of Sand Creek land and water right. Weather finer to-day.

## Thursday 4

Up at 6. AM. Max. 54° Min. 32°. Busy all day. Sheffield(?) choir last night good singing. Was much annoyed at the bad situation of the Lt Governors box. All of us went. Sandow

Winnipeg Thursday 4

# From Winnipeg. to Stoney Mountain Saturday 6

Up at 6.30 Busy in office until 1.30 Went to Stoney Mountain at 5.40 Harwood came with me. We put up at the Manseaus A hearty welcome for us. Called on the Colonel (Irvine) He was glad to see me.

Stoney Mt. Sunday 7

Up at 6.30 Went to the R.C. Prison Chapel with Harwood and Manseau shewed us around after church. Met the Colonel in the afternoon. Mrs Manseau came with us in the previous evening. Sat up late with Manseau talked over old times. Max. 74° min 54°

Stoney Mt. to Winnipeg, Man, Monday 8

Up at 6.30 Max. 74 Min 46°.

Went to Aikins funeral. Could not get a carriage was loaned motor by Ketchen, very nice of him. The funeral very large indeed. Many floral offerings. The Church of England Archbishop led to the procession the grave in the cemetry and said the first prayers, a remarkably graceful act. Mr. Somerset Aikins, the deceased, being a Methodist. Stormy, rained in torrents all last night then snowed, a good thing for the country, rain much wanted Dined at the club with 100<sup>th</sup> Grenadiers Nice time. Cameron and Hutchings, on right and left. Sir Daniel present.

Winnipeg Friday 12 Up at 6.30 AM. Max. 50° min 40°

Fine day after the rain. Busy arranging matters for camp. The Lt Colonels of Infantry in town came to see me by request about the arrangmts for coronation day and the composite battalion for camp. Senior lieut Colonel to take Command of the force in Winnipeg, the second in Command to handle his corps. Winnipeg Sunday 14

Up at 8.00 Max. 68. Min. 46. Terrific thunder storm during the night large quantities of rain fell. 68- 46.

Big Parade for veterans decoration of the graves of the soldiers who have died on the field or of wounds or disease. An enormous number of people turned out, they were about ten deep on Broadway and Main for three miles. Hundreds of motors came. The service was in the open air in Ft Osborne square. The troops turned out well. I arranged for Sir Daniel MacMillan to take the salute at Portage Ave. east. Main St. He sent his carriage for me and I went to govt House for him. We then proceeded to the university grounds where(?) the veterans parade was waiting. Sir Daniel then presented two nurses with medals, inspected the veterans and Boy Scouts, then service was held in the barrack square. Sir Daniel and General Kelly inspected the ranks at my request after the service. Sir Daniel proceeded to Portage and Main. I headed the march on foot to that place, saluted and took my place Gen. Kelly from India was with Sir D. by request. We then drove to the graves and a service was held. The corps present

## Winnipeg Tuesday 23

Up at 6.15 Max. 70° Min 52° A beautiful day. Major Ross called and had a chat arranged to let him have the clothing for his squadron. Gave him some encouragement and advice. Inspected the riding of the coronation contingent the men are improving a great deal. Young Buchanan is not a fit man to send across Sandow a lot. Walked a long way and spent the evening at Dr Pennefathers place. Got home at 11.00. Arranged for a regimental camp. Sandow.

#### Wednesday 24

Up at 6.30 Max. 70. Min 50. Heavy rain at 8.30 P.M. The rest of the day pleasant. Went to the barracks. Met Major Bell 79<sup>th</sup> there Gave him some pointers re the Inspection of the regiment. Major Mitchell, Mrs Mitchell and Elinor called to see us, spent the evening. Had a long chat with him (Mitchell) about the 100<sup>th</sup> Wrote a lot on book hope I shall be through with it soon. Sandow.

# Winnipeg Thursday 25

Up at 6.25 Max. 60 Min. 40° Busy all day had a look at the foot drill of the contingent going to the coronation of King George the fifth. They are a good lot but raw, very raw. I hope Mackie can do something for them. Mays and I dined at the Ashdowns, a nice time, very fine \_\_\_\_- Arranged matters with Aikins Gave one third interest in 160 acres at Sand Creek in security for a loan in the bank. also gave in security my two policies in the Great West Life, all of the above in trust.

Up at 6.30 Max 48. Min 42. Very heavy rain fell during the evening and most of the night. We have had more than for many years. The lawn tennis ground is full of water for the first time since I came to Winnipeg. Busy all day. Went to a meeting of the committee of the city council re the celebration of the coronation of George the fifth – Col Ruttan, Col. Thompson and Col. Aikins present. Sandow a lot.

## Winnipeg, Man Saturday 27

Up at 6.30. Max 50 Min. 40 cold morning Temp 42. ground saturated Busy all day. Attended a meeting with regard to the coronation ceremonies and was placed upon the nomination Committee. Sandow a great deal

## Sunday 28

Up at 7.30 Wrote a great deal. Went to the mess at eleven. Wired to DOC 11 the names of the officer and instructor for the camp at Kamloops. Made many arrangements about camp, that is I went over them in my mind for tomorrow. Harwood and I walked via Langside St and Wellington Crescent to our home Met Tom Moffatt of Orillia there at the crescent. He ran back to speak to me I had not seen him since I was thirteen years old. He is seventy five and looks fine. We talked over old times in Orillia. He lives in Minneapolis. Sandow a lot. Spent evening at the Donnellys

## Winnipeg, Monday 29

Up at 6.30 Max. 62. Min 52° Busy all day. Captain Stephenson of Russell called to see about raising a squadron of horse. I encouraged him but stated that he must send in the application of officers for the Corps not later than August next. Lt Colonel O'Grady called to see me about men who refused to send in their uniform when ordered to do so. He has been advised to bring them in to court. I inspected the company of the 79th which is to go to the Coronation of King George the fifth. Sandow a lot twice per day now, great benefit. The Mackies and Mr Ogden called to see us. A pleasant evening. The day cool and threatened rain. Sandow. The Highlanders looked very well indeed.

#### Tuesday 30

Up at 7. AM. Max. 60° Min. 50. Busy as usual. Inspected the Highlanders before they went off to the train which takes them to Montreal & England to attend the Coronation. They looked well and soldierly in bearing. Dr Good took Mays Mrs Macdonell and myself to the Orpheum Theatre, very amusing. Got back at 11 o'clock

# Winnipeg. Wednesday 31

Up at 6.00 AM. Max 74° Min 56° Fine day a slight shower in the evening. Phoned all of the O.C. units and all are agreed except Gwynne that the 13<sup>th</sup> is suitable for camp. The latter puts on a very poor mouth, complains that the men cannot come out so early. This in spite of the fact

that he is in a dry part of the country and that the rest of the units are of the same class as his own: all farmers, and that they are on all sides of him. Sandow as usual. Col Ruttan asked for more uniforms dist(?) is short of them. I find that we cannot supply him.

#### June

## Thursday 1

Up at 6.00 Max 72°. Min 52° Busy all day Gen Otter came and at 3.P.M inspected the books of the 79<sup>th</sup> Cameron Highlanders of Canada. at 5. Inspected the books of the 100<sup>th</sup> Much to be done in those regiments. I must send an instructor to look at the books of the same. The gen inspected the books of the 100<sup>th</sup> and 79<sup>th</sup> for the first time, the 79<sup>th</sup> need(?). Sandow. The 79<sup>th</sup> inspected at their drill on the college grounds, a fine lot of men the officers were rattled. It is a strange thing that they always get that way. QMStores inspected.

## Winnipeg Friday 2

Up at 6. AM. Max. 72 Min. 56°

General Otter inspected Lord S Corps Rooms good but not uniform. in arrangement of the belts. Mess good, rooms clean. hospital satisfactory Major Vaux gave me an excellent account of the running of the hospital, the wants of the same the weaknesses of of [*sic*] the system. Hospital and books neat. The Regimental books neat. There is too much money left in the hands of the careless sergeant and the mess book is not as I ordered it to be kept. The saddlery very badly placed, the officers saddles mixed up with those of the men. The District books in splendid order, everything to date. the enforcer(?) has no suitable place for work. I will give him the lecture room, and see that there is a place for lectures. Officers mess books all right. The Gen saw the musical ride and the system of Galvannes(?) for breaking horses. is was explained to him.

General Otter inspected the  $90^{th}$  at drill and as usual some of the officers lost their heads. The best Company was Blanchards. The officers prompt to a considerable extent. The rooms of A.SC.  $13^{th}$  F.B. F Ambulances and the Institute inspected and a few short and sharp words given.

## Saturday 3

Up at 6. AM. Max 66° min 56. Kings birthday. Salute fired in the usual way at the drill hall by thirteenth F. Battery Went out with Gen Otter and Lt Col Thompson to see the new rifle range. We got stuck in the mud and after a great deal of trouble had to send out for the team at the house and it pushed us out twice. We were covered with mud to the eyes Thomson and I got the work of it on the way back the motor gave out, and we had to take the car at Silver heights. Went to lunch with Aikins at the club was a few minutes late The archbishop, Gen. Otter, J B Mitche [*sic*] Mr Lister, Lt Cols Brown, Ruttan, Aikins, Cameron another gentleman whose names I did not catch. Ruttan took the general Mitchell and self for a motor drive over Fort Rouge. Gen - Inspected the 100th at 8.30 mosquitos very bad. Milne came with Capt Davidson to spend the evening. Dixon told me that the 90th gave Collins nothing to do. Sandow a great deal to advantage.

### Sunday 4

Up at 7.30. Max. 70° Min 60° Mays and I went down the river and had an enjoyable trip to St Andrews locks with the Ruttans in their nice launch. The river is pretty. Many persons encamped along its banks. Mosquitos very bad. Got back at ten o'clock P.M. The party consisted of Col. Mrs Ruttan, Mr Frank Ruttan, Miss Nichols Mrs. Crispo, Mrs McCara, Mays and self.

Sandow a great deal. Sandow

Monday 5

Up at 6 AM. Max 70° Min 50.

Busy all day. Lt Critchley asked me to let him off for the Horse Show on the eight, that is to say the young fellow wished me to put off for his convenience the inspection of the cadets at Fort William and of course inconvenience them. Mays and I asked by Sir Daniel and Lady McMillan to go to the horse show with them at 8.00 P.M. Mays could not go. (headache) I went. Show of delivery horses good, of polo ponies poor. Jumping fair. Leslie Cameron and Mrs Dixon 2<sup>nd</sup> and second. and third Lowes man 1<sup>st</sup>. Rest nowhere. Got home at 1.00 (one) show dragged out too late. Sandow.

Winnipeg, Monday 5

Up

### Tuesday 6

Up at 6.30 AM. Max. 72° Min, 62°. Busy all day . Weighed 237½ three and a half less than. on the 31<sup>st</sup> Very insulting letter from a major Elliot of the 22<sup>nd</sup> L.H I wrote his OC Col Hodson. to order an apology. He had written the letter in reply to an extremely civil one from my adjutant with regard to the regulations re travelling expenses. Elliot had made an overcharge of five dollars per day. Sandow. The little tailor(?) St Boniface came to see about the raising of a regiment of French Canadians at St Boniface. I encouraged him to do so but that he must select a man of weight and means as O.C and others. Heavy rain.

Winnipeg Wednesday 7

Up at 6.30 Max. 70. Min 60°.

Got a box at the horse show for military night. Not many military went there(?) at all. A miserable evening. Women invited into the box by Mrs Mac. kept my friends out of it. Awfully foolish at times she is. Sandow. heavy rain.

#### Thursday 8

Up at 7.00. Max 62°. Min 54° Heavy rains daily for weeks past. Horse show I had an inspection for Lt Critchley at Port Arthur (cadets) but through paying more attention to the horse

show than to duty he missed the train. I was busy writing at night when Capt Dixon phoned to say that Critchley had missed the train, missed the C.P.Ry. to port Arthur. Dixon asked if the Inspection on account of this could not be put off. I replied no and ordered him to wire to the people at Port Arthur to say that Critchley had missed the train but would be down by the next. I also told him to say that I was much annoyed with Critchley. Sandow

Winnipeg, Friday 9

Up at 6.30 Max 70° Min 58° Busy all day great bother about the 98<sup>th</sup> Gwynne called me up on the phone, and stated that he will do well enough. The 98<sup>th</sup> have given me a great deal of trouble. Sandow a lot. Wrote many letters.

## Saturday 10

Up at 3.20<sup>am</sup> Max [*blank*] Min. [*blank*] Wrote until half past six. Got rid of scores of old letters studied carefully my a/c. Pretty close shave pushing along with the salaries we get. Sandow a lot. Mailed cheques to all tradesmen in town Paid all bills, including over draft in the bank of Montreal and note for one thousand and one dollars. Wrote Mr. A S Vowell 21. Margaretta St Winnipeg. Man, sent two or three badges of 91<sup>st</sup> regiment of rebellion days to Mr. Mc.Cleneghan of Onion Lake. Sask. Sandow.

Sunday 11 to Saturday 24

Winnipeg, Sunday 25

Up at 3.00 AM and with Major Vaux and Harwood my son, took the Imperial Ltd for Winnipeg. arriving on time. C A Biggar was on train and came to speak to me. I am a friend of his for many years. He served with me in A Battery forty years ago, and in 1873 [7 written over an 8], I had the good luck with P.R Neale and Gunner Schofield to save him and two others from drowning.

I arrived at 7.30, and found Antoine and his wife still here They were glad to see me. I took Antoine out for a run around the city in the afternoon To the monument at Seven oaks, and all over Crescent wood. The Donnellys came to see us in the evening Mrs Donnelly and her eldest daughter, Mr Nash(?) and Mr Strutt of the bank also. Antoine sang a lot.

Winnipeg Monday 26

Up at 7. AM. Busy all day. Cold and raw day. Max 60. min 44° Wrote all letters due. Had a long chat with Mackie about training of the corps. at the new range. The men need it after their long spell of fatigues. Twenty are still at Sewell to fold tents. Antoine and wife also baby left at 10.00 P.M. for Edmonton I am glad to have seen them. They had a bad time in Montreal. Gov Gen Sec. wired for me to attend on the behalf of His excellency the funeral of the Hon. T.M

Daly. Paid my bills, wrote the bank of Molson. (Molsons bank) Calgary, enclosing receipt for the best ground premium on life assurance.

## Tuesday 27

Up at 6.30. Max 62°. Min 48. Cool. Most unsatisfactory and melancholy day. The Hon T.M. Dalys funeral at which I represented the governor general. A concert sacred in church at night in Grace Church. Lt Col. Aikins K.C. gave me the tickets for self Mays and Minnie. Concert good. Funeral service ditto. Letter from Capt Ketchen who is at "home" for the coronation. He says the SA contingent the finest, ours was good.

# Winnipeg, Wednesday 28

Up at 7.30 Max. 66° Min 56° Weather cool. but at times close. Arranged to have the figure targets ready for use in a week about which O'Grady and Munro called. Gave orders as to report on the camp at Sewell Up to the General hospital at 4. P.M and saw Major Macdonell and Mr Gordon, both are doing well. Gordon says Cowan may come. Walked out to see the Mitchells on Furby St. Called on W.J. Macleans family. Only one at home. Got letter from Col. Gwynne.

## Thursday 29

Up at 7.30 Max. 68° Min 60. Busy all day Much annoyed at Lieut H E Shaw who is complained of by adjutant as having gone to play polo when on duty as orderly officer, at the same time having reported that he could [*caret*: not] attend the funeral of the Hon Mr Daly on account of being on duty.

Winnipeg Friday 30

Up at 7.20 Max 74.°. Min. 68°

Busy all day. A captain Pearson from the Woolwich arsenal called. I invited him to the Caledonian games at the park. Spent evening at Pennefathers. The Dr. spoke of Dalys death.

#### July

#### Saturday 1

Up at 6.45 Max 90° Min 62°

Took Capt Pearson to lunch at the club and thence to Scottish games. I do not know what to make of him. Captain RA drops his H<sup>s</sup> knows all about the army and navy politics of England, says he is on sick leave for a year was caught in a fire in Brandon and lost all his papers has no cards. Says he put his money in the bank of Commerce. Telegram from mil dept. allowing only twenty five cents to maintain men at Lloydminster camp. Col. Hodson protested I wired for 40<sup>cts</sup> for men and 35 cents for horses.

Winnipeg Sunday 2 Up at 7.30- Max 72° Min 62°

Wrote twenty pages of Legal cap. Walked out in the evening Carleton, Portage, Furby and Broadway. The Mackies came to see us. To bed at midnight. Pleasant day. Sandow al [*sic*] great deal.

## Monday 3

Up at 7.10 Sandow. Max 72° Min 61° Inspected and catechised the battery N.CO through Capt the Count de Bury et Bocarme. The [*sic*] did fairly well on the answers but there is room for improvement. Called on the Donnelly at night to bring Mays and Mrs Mac home(?) Flora escorted by Harwood went with the Major Mitchells to see the old Folks home and assist Mrs Mitchell in entertaining them. What nice people the Mitchells are so considerate so kind. Mays and the children dote on them

Got authority to let contracts at Lloydminster for the grub for 22<sup>nd</sup> in camp. Close in the afternoon.

Winnipeg. Tuesday 4

Up at 7.00 Sandow. Max. 78° min 62° Busy all morning Col Thomson called to see me. Arranged about Lloydminster Camp inspection as well as Grenfell and Port Arthur 96<sup>th</sup> regiment Wrote from 2 to 6. P.M Took a walk Furby Portage, Hargreave [*sic*] and Broadway. Report that Conger is leading little Arnell(?) astray.

## [no heading]

Up at 7. AM. Sandow. Max 70.° Min 54° Busy all day, but much worried. Wrote until midnight Called to see Mr. Ptolemy who had his foot broken some days ago. He is on the mend. Had a long and interesting chat with him. He has had a trying career but has done well for his family and they have pleased him much. One son is accountant in the bank of Ottawa, one in Victoria BC doing well. He himself has the I.SO.

# Winnipeg Wednesday 5

Up at 7. Sandow. etc Max 76° 56° Busy all day. A stupid letter in a Port Arthur paper about the Sir William Whyte challenge cup for efficiency. Charges are made against the O.C. for favouritism with regard to it and of stupid and untrue statements re the award, Ruttans Co. being told that they did not earn it, that the OC. stated that he influenced me to make the award to it. He is also charged with not giving the cup out as per order

#### Thursday 6

Up at 7.10 Sandow. Max 78° Min 68° Busy all day. Terrific thunderstorm which lasted for hours, seven P.M to long after midnight prevented me from inspecting the 90th regiment, Itshould have a tactical scheme.

Up at 7 AM. Max. 76° Min 62° Terrific thunder and lightning all after noon accompanied by torrents of rain until midnight. Could not inspect 90<sup>th</sup> Wrote all evening.

#### Saturday 8

Up at 7 AM. Max 76° Min 60° Busy all day. Had long talk with Mackie about discipline. and training of officers ordered. There are many faults to correct

Winnipeg, Sunday 9

Up at 7.45 Max 70 Min 56°

Sandow a little. Went to church and paid in twenty five cents towards maintenance. I paid twenty dollars in before I went to camp on the 13<sup>th</sup> ult. which is a lot more than agreed upon by me.

Mays Mrs Macdonell and I went to the Mackies to-tea, the Malcolms brother and sister, Mrs Moore Mrs Sparks and D. Cameron the only persons not of the P.F. Mrs M very justly disappointed, should have had twenty two, had only sixteen Cecil Donnelly and Katie called at night

### Monday 10

Up at 7 AM. Sandow, a great deal. Max. 70 Min. 52. cold wind. some rain. It cleared up at night. Mays and accompanied Mrs Mackie to the camp at Sturgeon Creek and there dined with Capt Mackie and the officers Left for home at 10.00 arrived at 10.30 The girls and Harwood were at the Davidsons in the evening and returned at midnight. Wrote Esther Miller (Mrs McGregor) re my book. Wrote Col Laurie about the papers.

## On train Wpg to Lloydminster Tuesday 11

Up early busy all day. Left early in Evg with Capt Conger for Lloydminster went to bed at once and were all day on train. Passed through Warman at noon, North Battleford at night Met an old S.H. there and had chat. The country looks fine, particularly north of the elbow of the N Saskatchewan Arrived at Lloydminster at 12.30 midnight and put up at the Brittania hotel, and went to bed.

12th

All day on train to Lloydminster.

Wednesday 13 [adjusted from 12]

Up at 5.30 AM. and after breakfast went to the camp of the 22<sup>nd</sup> Lt Col. Hodson met me in the hotel. I did not know him at first. Drove to camp in a livery trap. A man named Despard who had been an officer in the Irish Yeomanry drove us out a decent fellow Conger mustered the 22<sup>nd</sup> we lunched then and in the P.M the corps had their sports in town. I sat in the grand stand with a lot of ladies. Sports went off well. The men a good lot, officers too. Spent evening at the Thompsons. Went to bed at 12.30 Sandow.

Conger stated that the pay a/c is the worst run in the P. Force, the very worst. He said a lot more about some people, mostly true.

Max 70. Min 62.

Sergt Johnson has no certificate as such got only Corporals. He must get a sergeants. No hospital comforts supplied to the corps only one stretcher, and two bell tents.

Lloydminster, Sask. Friday Thursday 14 [adjusted from 13]

Up at 5 AM. Max. 70. [7 written over 5] Min 52

Inspected the 22<sup>nd</sup> thoroughly, and tested the men at reiging positions, and leading horses at speed. The ground is very bad full of badger holes many men and horses down. After lunch tested them again and spoke to the officers. They gave me three cheers as I went away. Officers a good lot. Numnahs gave a few horses sore backs, some girths too short. Horses in good condition sanitation good food good. no complaints Books of regiment particularly good

## Friday 14

As per above. Left camp at an early hour spent evening at the Thompsons. Nice couple very pleasant time.

# Lloydminster [*caret*: to] Prince Albert Saturday 15

Up at 3. AM. Left Lloydminster at 4.30 AM. Arrived at Warman too late for P.A train. Had to wait until 6.30 PM. and arrived here at 10PM met McCraney MP on train also Capt Seale and put up at the best hotel. A nice place clean but the bathroom is locked up so that one has to bother about the keys went to bed at midnight

Told McCraney. MP on train that that(sic) it was difficult to obtain school sections for rifle ranges.

Prince Albert to Saskatoon. Sask. Max at Wpg Sunday 16

Up at 5 AM. bath. Max. at Winnipeg 72° Min 61. Fine day. Wrote Mays, Colonel Hodson & Capt Dixon Capt Seale came and drove us around the city of Prince Albert. We visited drill hall site. Shannon, and Conger came with us, visited the armoury and inspected but did not check the equipment. It is in the old land office, a good building. It will answer well for the arms of six companies, but more land should be purchased so as to have a fine drill hall built. Met the mayor and had a chat with him, told him what I would suggest about the drill hall and that I would recommend a fine building which would be an ornament to the town. He said that

the council would meet and consider it He was at Duck Lake fight. We then called on the Constantines, visited the Rifle range across the river, after which the officers gave us a nice lunch at a nice fashionable café. Left by C.N.R at 2.00 Mrs Constantine and Miss Cradock came to see us off. Arrd at Warman had a long wait there. and left at 6.20 P.M. for Saskatoon where we were met by Colonel Acheson, Lt Col Smith and Major Aikins

## Saskatoon. Saskatchewan Monday 17

Up at 5.30 AM. Drove out in Mr Engens motor to see sec (11. school sec) but found site for range too short – to have 1000 yds. as there is to be a dam built below it on the South Sask<sup>n</sup> R. over which bullets would pass. Came back to town and called at Engens nice home, from there to one of his farms. He drove us after offering and providing refreshments. At the farm we saw the most scientific piggery in the country The pigs naturally clean sleep on an upper flat, are fed below, and the place slushed out. Water and feed is supplied automatically. Saw a fine field 800 acres of wheat, four hundred of flax. Returned to town and lunched at the club. Engen left us then.

Drove out in the P.M. to the east or right bank of the South Saskatchewan R. to look for a range found none there was a succession of rocky ridges for miles, with intervals of cultivated ground between them. Rain fell and we returned to town soaked with it.

Max 63°. at Wpg cold and cheerless Min 53°— Went to the club after dinner and chatted with two professors until bed time. We are at <del>Tuesday 18</del> the Western hotel where rooms were obtained for us by the officers who met us yesterday AM.

## Saskatoon, Regina, etc etc Tuesday 18

Up at 5.00 Wrote letters. Drove out at 9. AM in Blairs car accompanied by him, Colonels Smith, Acheson and Major Aikins to look at ground for a rifle range. Found a good place six miles out and drove over it. It will cost too much I fear. Left Saskatoon at noon, arrived at Regina at 7.20 Crops look fine, all the way down. Met two young ladies on the train. They are in charge of the inspection of telephone offices, one is to be married and hand over to the other who is a Hamilton girl. Capt Ross adjutant of the 95<sup>th</sup> met me at the station. He had rooms for us self and Conger, at the hotel, Kings which is a temperance place now. Several officers called to meet me and we went to the club at night. Met several officers, Haultain and other friends, and arranged to recommend city corps of six Cos for P.A Saskatoon and Regina. I was up until one o.c. AM. the 19<sup>th</sup> Had a lot of fun with Bishop of the artillery chaffing him for his suggestions of all sorts, mostly impracticable Max at Wpg. 61° Regina, Min. do. 52°

## Wednesday 19

Up early. 5.00 AM. Wrote Colonel Smith of the 95<sup>th</sup> at Saskatoon and directed him how to act to get the regiment 95 divided into three - with Head Qrs at Regina Saskatoon and Prince Albert. Inspected the drill hall ground 30 lots and directed Captain Bishop of the Artillery to get the deeds made out. The site is excellent. Inspected the old P.O. it will hold arms for six cos and equipment for the same. Lunched at the Parsons, nice People. Capt Parsons a fine type of man. Met Mrs Codd daughter in law of medical Lieut Colonel Codd late of P. Force and R.R.

expedition. She is an Adams a descendant of Colonel Adams a Peninsular officer who settled on the Ridge Rd. between Orillia and Barrie. She thinks that the country descendants are not good style. I deprecated this, and stated that they would be all right if they had the means. Ordered W Ross to apply to me through Colonel Smith to get the regiment organized as a city corps. I wrote Acheson and Aikins To Ross I stated that the officers must qualify within the year. Wrote the same to Smith and Capt Shannon Max at Wpg. 63° 71.° Min 52.

# Regina to Winnipeg Thursday 20

Up at 4.30 called Conger at 5.00 AM Left Regina for Winnipeg on the Toronto train. Arrived at 5.30 PM. Train crowded, children running about and a nuisance to all. Found all well at home. Fine fields of wheat on all sides, other grains also. All it wants is a lot of fine warm weather. Crops further advanced than anywhere in the north. Found the children pleased with their lawn tennis court. Private Martin, my servant back from the Coronation. He states that Ketchen was the back bone of the whole Mounted troops of Canada. Got Jack boots for the men so as to match the helmets. Some remark caused by the fault finding on parade of the officers of the Infantry, the neccessity for the regular officers to be in command of such an event, on the whole barring the western contingent the affair was not a success as far as the Mil of Canada is concerned Why in the world cannot things be done properly Temp Max. 70. min, 50. Sandow no Lt. Col Aikins rung me up to ask if I could go with him to Mrs McMickens who would write out my book!!

## Friday 21

Up at 7.30 Max. 70. Min, [blank] Busy all day. Inspected the camp at Sturgeon Creek Lord Strathconas Horse riding fair Officers kept a bad line. Mackie put them through well. I rode. After the mounted work I took orderly room and found two reports against Lt Arnott, they were no doubt true for passing cheques with no funds. P.C. Shaw and Critchley lieuts- made the complaints They were true but would not have been made had it not been that they had it in for Arnott on account of his being made acting adjutant. I ordered that a Court of enquiry be held to investigate the truth of the charges. Arnott is a Mil College graduate, but has shewn little evidence of the good teaching of that institution. I have advised him and watched him, but it was of no use.

# Winnipeg to Grenfell. Saturday 22

Up early. Left with Flora for the Gwynnes at Grenfell. Got here at 5.30 cold raw and wet. Lt Col and Mrs Hosmer on train. and gang of crooks from the states going to Brandon fair. Train did not give us one minute to jump off at Grenfell.

## Grenfell to Winnipeg, Sunday Sunday 23

Up early. Gwynne came to see how we were. Went to the cadet camp inspected it, got the parade state, all very good except the lines. Cold day, dined and supped in camp. Church parade a good sermon, going on with the usual patriotic speech given. After that there was a parade and

march past me. Left Grenfell at 8.30 P.M. Gwynne saw me off. Got my berth at Broadview at midnight. Arrived Winnipeg on Monday at 7.35 am. and after breakfast at house went to work. Sandow. Fine day.

# Winnipeg, Monday 24

Up at 7.10 Max. 62° Min. 48° cool day as usual. One needs an overcoat. Wrote Major Aikins re the drill hall at Saskatoon to the effect that they should have more ground for it. but that I would have them sent a plan Did a great deal of work in office and ordered all correspondence to be ready for me or answered by the time I returned to the city from inspection of the 96<sup>th</sup> Arrived at 7.25 from Grenfell and as usual went to work after breakfast.

#### Tuesday 25

Up at 7.10 AM. Max, 71.° Min, 50° Went up to the camp of Lord S Horse at Sturgeon Creek range and saw then at fast mounted work. Had a look at the officers mess books, wire book. officers wire a/c. and went into it carefully. The balances had not been brought forward properly by Critchley Cartright had been easy and had not checked him up. P.C. Shaw made a report against the acting adjutant Lieut Arnott the charges are grave, no doubt true but not dictated by a sense of honour or duty but out of spite. Gave orders to Mackie and Cartright to investigate with Major Macdonell. Arnott is a d–d young fool and met knaves, but did not know how to face them. He is in a serious mess.

Arranged to leave for Port Arthur tonight. Ordered Mackie to have the men tested on the quarter mile, in camp. Sandow,

Left for Port Arthur at 9.50 to inspect 96th Regiment. Conger came with me to muster the corps.

#### Port Arthur. Ont,

Max. 74°. Wednesday 26 Min 60°

Up at 5.30 on train from Winnipeg Arrived at Fort William at 10.00 Miss Allison that was met me there with her sister and was very polite They are on their way to Toronto, and other parts of Ontario. I did not know Miss Allisons new name, nor did she tell me what it is.

Arrived at Port Arthur at 11.00 and was met by Col Laurie and Weyland, was brought to the Lauries. Mrs Laurie and her pretty little daughter Alice met me at the veranda and gave me a warm reception.

I inspected the 96<sup>th</sup> in the afternoon at 3.30 The regiment is weaker than last year and the equipment not put on uniformly as it ought to be. A contest between companies for the Whyte Cup does not indicate that the cup is any encouragement to the Militia. Ruttan Co. has the best points at drill, but there can be no award until the annual musketry is completed. Col. Laurie, Weyland and I judged the Cos on parde [*sic*] Capt Conger the numbers and books. Dinner at the Lauries, Col Rae, self, Laurie, Rule(?), Weyland, Young and Conger present.

Port Arthur & Thursday 27 Fort. William,

Up at 6. AM. Pleasant time at the Lauries a fine day. Conger at the books of the regt They are improving from last year.

I lunched at the Weylands. Lt Col. Laurie.,Mr Robinson, Conger, self and [blank] were present. Had a chat with Conger about the regiment (96) Gave Conger leave to go to Kenora. He left at 10.15 Capt and Mrs Cauchon called and spent the evening at bridge and conversation. Went to bed at 1.30 The Lauries drove me around the city Mrs Cauchon and the pretty well mannered little ten year old daughter Alice of the Lauries came with us. The city is vastly improving The reporter of the News met me and asked silly questions, silly because I cannot answer them. Asked if war was imminent between Gt Britain and Germany, I said that I could not give anything for publication.

Max. 73°. Min. 52°– Weather fine.

# Port Arthur and on train to Winnipeg. Friday 28

Max. 70,° fine. Friday 28 Min 50°-

Up at 7.00 After breakfast, went to Fort William to see Frank Gibbs. Weyland and the Secretary of the rifle association there, the latter want an officer to attend and take charge of the range at their annual matches. I promised to look into the question of ammunition. The 190<sup>th</sup>(?) is reported bad. Frank Gibbs says that the farmers of the west are still sending in several hundred cars a week of the wheat held over They must have concealed from the public the quantities held last fall. Weyland agrees with me that the drill should be done by the 96<sup>th</sup> in the winter, otherwise that there cannot be good parades for inspection.

There must be a drill hall or there can be no success with the Corps.

Went after lunch with Col. Laurie to see the dry dock at current river. It is 800- feet long and will hold a lot of tonnage two good sized ships can be berthed at once. The shops are being built by Americans no Canadians are employed. The workmen have no physique. After dinner went to theatre with the Lauries and took train for Winnipeg at 10.15 Met Weyland at Fort William and got the berth.

#### Port Arthur to Saturday 29 Winnipeg

Up at 5.30 breakfast west of Kenora. Arrd at 11.30 Went to the office. Saw Mackie. The horses with influenza caught it from those of officers who went to the Country club. Wired Secy. Mil Council that we would be ready to go on the 10<sup>th</sup> the horses are under observation. Not good accounts of affairs. Both Mackie and Dixon report confidentially that the misbehaviour of Mrs. Vaux and the apparent winking at it of her husband is common talk and no doubt it is all true. Something must be done. We must not have the corps in contact with such people. Mackie is willing to take the adjutancy of Lord Strathconas Horse, but it will be neccessary to bring him into quarters and have Vaux go out.

Max 70. Min 58°— Sandow a good course. Wrote Lt. Colonel and Mrs. Laurie. Poor private Dixon drowned in the Assineboine, He went from Camp to bath and no doubt caught cramp having gone into the cold water with a full stomach.

Winnipeg, Sunday 30

Up at 6.15 Max. 66° Min 56° a fine day. Wrote Laurie, Little, and Weyland about the 96<sup>th</sup> suggesting a parade for the inspection of the regiment on the day of the final shoot off or on some Sunday or holiday. I pointed out that I could not give a favourable report unless this was

done. Mr Robinson of N. York. USA called at night so did Donnelly and Mrs Donnelly. They left at 11.20 Donnelly admired Harwoods sketches. Sandow a lot. Weighed at club. 240 lbs.

#### Monday 31

Up at 6.45 Max. 68° Min 58° Cool most of the day. Busy all day. Wrote Ottawa reporting Arnott for his stupid conduct. Reported that I reprimanded the President of the mess. Private Dixon was buried today. He drowned in the Assiniboine through playing "wolf" having pretended to require help, and when he did need it he did not get it in time Poor Chap he is only a year out from England and was one of our best men. Sandow as usual. Wrote several letters and signed many. Did much work. Donnelly called about his war record. I told him what to do. The Hasletts came too. I fear there will be trouble with the wheat on account of frost.

#### August

# Winnipeg, Tuesday 1

Up at 6.30 Max. 68° Min 54° Cool day but sunny. Much fear of wheat not ripening in time to miss the first frost. Busy all day. Wrote confidential report on Lieut Critchley, so did Major Macdonell the next senior officer in the corps. His report and mine differ very much. Sandow a great deal after five P.M. Young Strutt called The girls are having a good time and write good letters to their mother.

# Wednesday 2

Up at 6.30 Max 74° Min 56° Busy all day. Manseau called. The scoundrel who was accountant a defeated Dom- candidate formulated false charges against him and having been proved to be a designing liar who had hoped that Colonel Irvine the warden of the Manitoba Penettentiary(sic) would die wh or retire and he would get the billet but as M- was in the way as deputy warden of the penetentiary, has been dismissed, every charge formulated against Manseau having been disproved. Mays and I called on Mrs Cameron who is very anxious about her son Duggy who is studying for the Permanent Force. I sent for Cartright and young Critchley to tell them that I was not satisfied with the way the mess was managed, and to tell Cartright that he would have saved much trouble had he taken it into his head to report to me at once. Sandow a great deal. Wrote many letters.

# Winnipeg. Thursday 3

Up at 7.40 Overslept myself through getting up too early and then going to bed again. Went down town in the P.M and saw the agent of the Federal Life about a loan on my five thousand dollar policy. Was cheerfully met. I assure you he said I will see about the double charges made against me during the SA war. Wired Secy Militia council that I could send the squadron and sixty horses on the 10<sup>th</sup> instant to Petawawa. D.C Cameron was sworn in as lieut Governor this week. He will have a hard man to follow. It is reported that Sir Daniel McMillan is to run for the Federal House.

Sandow. Max. 66° Min. 58. Much rain. The Manseaus spent the evening with us.

#### Friday 4

Up at 7.30 Max. 63° Min 56.° Busy all day, received a stupid wire from Ottawa expressing regret that I had taken upon myself to hold Lord Strathconas Horse here without authority from Ottawa when they should have been sent on to Petawawa. I held them after wiring Ottawa that an epidemic of influenza prevailed amongst the horses that fifteen were sick and one had died and that the rest had to be under observation until the 10 when they might be shipped. All of them were isolated. Very wet miserable day. Walked out in the evening with my boy Harwood. It looks promising for a fine day tomorrow. Up later on account of rising too early, going to bed again and -oversleeping in consequence but no harm done. Sandow as usual

Winnipeg Friday 4

Up at 6.15 Max. 66(?) Min. 56 -

Busy all day. Damnably foolish telegram from Ottawa finding fault because I did not send the sick horses down to Petawawa camp, that it is to say the horses in the district have caught an epidemic of influenza, some of mine have it too, and are isolated, but the V.S states that it is unsafe to send the horses which appear well as they should be under observation all the time until there are no more cases, and that we should not leave until the 10<sup>th</sup> instant. This of no use to the wisacres in Ottawa. In spite of the fact that the disease is dangerous to other horses and that we shall lose any that catch it on the train as there will be no way nor convenience to treat them The telegrams are little less than scandalous and were it not for the children and Mays I would tell them and all concerned to go to Hades, but I cannot afford to throw away forty years service. Wired full explanation. Cannot get train from CP.R. until Monday. Sandow.

#### Saturday 5

Up at 6.20 Max. 70° Min 54°. Busy all day wrote many letters. Got a telegram from Ottawa again censuring me for not sending the squadron down in spite of the influenza. I sent Mackie to get a train and he has assurance of one on Monday night. Sandow. The Sergt Major is afraid to go. Got a letter from Ketchen who is to be here on the 10<sup>th</sup> Saying too that Mr. Docherty &Mr Deevey are now with 11<sup>th</sup> Hussars for a brush up

Winnipeg. Sunday 6

Up at 6.00 Max. 70° Min 60°

Wrote Macdonell to the effect that he must form his men in troops before leaving for Petawawa, and that I would see them all on parade and on the train before they went. Gave leave to the officers to put on chains (shoulder) Shaw A E came first and I refused him but granted it when Mackie later informed me that authority had arrived to enable me to do so. The Mitchells (J.B) and Mackies came to supper. Had quite an ex a talk over Mormonism. Sandow.

Monday 7

Up at 6.30 Max 72° Min 60°. Busy all day inspected the squadron going to Petawawa camp and gave them a few words. Macdonell is in command. Pointed out that they had the credit of their little squadron and Lord Strathconas Horse in their charge. Macdonell called for three cheers for me and a tiger, to which they responded cheerfully and well.

Ketchen returned to-day from England He had been adjutant of the dismounted troops is going to his father-in-laws to get the family together again there is one of the children there. Ketchen had three months leave. Says the western men beat all the Canadians except the M.P. South African Contingent the finest of all, clothes fitted well, they were evidently picked from the Constabulary. There is no doubt the Canadians as usual were Commanded by a damned fool, a politician, not a soldier at all and the officers as a body were useless.

Dixon reported that Ketchen stole ammunition and sold it to the Ashdowns in exchange for guns and other supplies. This is a dreadful affair. One can trust no one. I seem to have got into a nest of iniquity. Sandow

# Winnipeg, Tuesday 8

Up at 6.15 Max 72°. Min 50. Very showery day. Sent Capt Dixon to meet Mr Ashdown and ascertain from him if Capt Ketchen had sold ammunition to his firm. Ashdowns bookkeeper shews that he did dispose of 303. fixed ammunition in return for goods purchased and that there was no dishonest intent on the part of the firm. I do not believe there is Ashdown will(?) satisfy me that both the Hudsons Bay Co and the Kingston Smith Arms Co. are in the habit of purchasing from certain persons whose names we shall get later, probably Captains of rifle associations What vile people for the sake of a paltry two dollars a thousand or so. Ashdown will let me know further today,

Lunched with the Lieutenant Gov. at the club. Present Hon Lieut Cols Brown and Aikins, Lt Col Ruttan, 100<sup>th</sup> Grens – Mr. Stovel Chairman of Parks board - and Major W.G. Bell. The reason for this is to arrange about a site for a drill hall, a park, with room for drills games swimming baths, gymnastics, etc. The govt to build.

Sandow.

#### Wednesday 9

Up at 6.30 Max. 66° Min 52. Busy all day. Lt Colonel Thomson called to see me about getting the loan of a bale of blankets to enable him to carry out his shooting on the range. His regiment the 79<sup>th</sup> Camerons of Canada are doing their shooting there on the Sturgeon Creek range. I told Colonel Thomson all about the irregularities which one alleged in the sale of ammunition to outsiders from rifle ass<sup>ns</sup> supplies, and by Captain Kitchen. He is much disturbed by this thing, and surprised too He says that he has been on the Klondyke and that had I been in charge there the irregularities which were rife never would have occurred.

Sandow.

### Winnipeg Thursday 10

Up at 7.30 Max 67° Min. 48. Busy. Gave Ketchen the report to read and in reply to. He denied selling ammunition to the firm in question, denied selling any Stated that he disposed of surplus ten bore ammunition to Ashdown firm as he had changed his gun from a ten bore to a 12. He

seems like an innocent man. Dixon got the wrong way about it. He should have got the statements from the Clerks in writing and then they could not have denied Ketchen produced their written emphatic denial of all charges against Ketchen for selling 303 ammunition. It is not correct that we were occupying that office in 1909. We were in the new office when Lt Col Bliss was tried or at least investigated for offenses and had to leave the office. Mays and I went on the excursion of the 100<sup>th</sup> Had a pleasant time met many nice people, the boat had about sixteen hundred on board.

#### Friday 11

Up at 6.30 Busy all morning. Looking into the alleged case of the sale of 303 ammunition. Nothing in it. Left for Gimli by train at 2.20 arrived at 7.30 was met by Harwood Mrs Lipman (?) and Mrs Chandler. Drove to the Mill site farm ½ from Olsons farm. Was kindly received by Mrs. Burrowes Harwood is having a good time with the boys. In swimming in Lake Winnipeg. A pretty spot, sandy beach, water warm. Day warm Sandow before leaving.

# At Mill site farm. L. Winnipeg. Saturday 12

Up at 5.00 swam, dressed, read and loafed all day. The Burrowes boys and Harwood swimming all day long Sergt Chandler came with a letter from Walter Johnston, and Capt. Lipsett. The latter arrives tomorrow walked to Ollsons where fresh eggs butter and vegetables are got.

### Sunday 13

Same as yesterday. Walked to Olsons

# Mill site Lake Winnipeg. Monday 14

Up at 5.30 Read, and dawled(?) all day. The boys, Sergt & Mrs Charter swimming all day long This is a civic holiday. Max. 88° min 68°

# Winnipeg Tuesday 15

Up at 3.30. Swam in Lake Winnipeg dressed. After breakfast left with Sgt Chandler, Miss Irene, Harwood, Fred Burrows his chum and driven by Lipman(?) got to Gimli at 6.30 Met by Martin. Mays alone during my absence, poor dear but she would insist upon me going. My only holiday for years except two or three week \_\_\_\_. Max at Wpg 70° min 58. cloudy. Capt. Lipsett the new Staff Officer for the west and Winnipeg in particular called and reported. Has pleasant manners and I received him nicely. Did all I could to help him through the work of getting qrs and an office. Dixon puts him up until he can be settled properly. Sent for Ketchen he produced a document which is a statement of his account at Ashdowns. As far as I can see there is no evidence at all and if the thing was done, Ketchen could be nothing else but a madman to do it, after what happened before that vz Bliss dismissal. QMS Harris on court martial after the Q.M.S was set on fire and the books burned up. Where would he keep the stuff.

#### Winnipeg

#### Wednesday 16

Up at 6.30. Max. 70° Min 54° Busy all day. Did not keep the half holiday for myself. I let the others go. Capt Dixon stated that Ketchen on the occasion of the inspection by general Lake stated all letters except the usual "bring forwards" clear and had carried out a lot to hide them, (previous to the inspection of course so that they would not be seen by the general. and Dixon also stated that Captain Bell warned him before he left that there was a lot of back stuff which had been neglected by Capt Ketchen when the latter was Staff adjutant of course. This statement of Bells if made is like the rest of the stuff manufactured in this nest of iniquity prior to my arrival here.

On my visit to the office in the afternoon being disturbed by this yarn about Ketchen hiding letters from general Lake I called in Sergeant Chandler and asked him if such had been done, and replied that it was not so. Capt Ketchen had taken out some "bring forwards to the table in Chandlers office and told him that when General Lake asked for them he was to state that they were bring forwards. Curse the lot One does not know who to believe. The hatred that they have for one another causes them all to to [*sic*] be ready to make statements derogatory to one another. I must write general Macdonell for leave to put on a detective, to find out about the illicit sale of ammunition. Sandow

### Winnipeg Thursday, 17

Up at 6.30 Max. 70° min 50° Busy all Lt Col. Thomson went over the papers re the accusation against Ketchen for selling ammunition and stated that the case was spoiled by Capt Homer-Dixon. He also told me in confidence that Affleck had stated that Ketchen got a rake off or percentage on the sale of the rifle range to us. I was busy all P.M.

Sandow. Charlie Bell and Mrs Cameron dined with us at 6.30 They enjoyed themselves. Angus de Bellefeuille called after dinner. Sandow.

Winnipeg Friday 18

Up at 7.30 Max 70°. Min 60°.

Busy all day. Capt Phillips who is a lawyer came to see about the charge against Ketchen. He stated that Dixon asked him not to tell me that he had been talking to him about Ketchens case and Captain Mackie also rang him up and made a request for Capt Phillips to see him before he saw me or after. Phillips refused as it would cause confusion. It is damnable to see the duplicity of these officers Phillips says that Parker is a scoundrel and game for any crooked trick. He is the man who made a point of complaining that the government was not prompt enough in paying for the rifle range Phillips thinks that it would be difficult for us to prove that Ketchen got a rake of on the sale or purchase of the new range. Sandow. Told Phillips that Affleck stated that K got a rake off on the sale of the range. Sandow.

#### [no heading]

Up at 6.30. Max. 72°. Min 60° Busy all forenoon in office and at home in the afternoon at home. Capt Hugh Philips (Barrister) came by appointment to see me about the sale of ball ammunition to Ashdowns by Ketchen He thinks that the case has been weakened by the

interview which Dixon had with the clerks in Ashdowns. He also informed me that he was asked by Dixon (Capt) not to tell me that he had seen Phillips before I saw him and talked over the case with him Capt Mackie also phoned to him and asked to see him before he would meet me, and when Phillips refused to see him then asked if he could see him afterwards Phillips mentions this confidentially. It has shaken my faith Mackie. I never had any in Dixon, he is a sweep. Sandow.

The Mackies came to see Mays and self, so did young Mr Strutt.

Winnipeg. Saturday 19

Up at 6.30 Max. 70° Min. 54°

Busy all day long. Capt. Lipsett came to see me and asked permission to go with me to Port Arthur and Fort William to see the troops there. I granted it. I feel certain that I will have trouble with this young British officer. These people always come with the impression that we do not know anything and as that is not the sort of thing that I can swallow I shall make a point of seeing that the staff officer sent here does not get such a notion in his head. Curse this service, cursed be the day that I took it into my head to serve such people, or such a country. We are neither fish nor flesh We are like Ham, a servants of servants, wo is me - were not for my wife and the poor children I would not serve another day.

I had a long talk with Mackie about the little misunderstanding between him and Colonel Gwynne about an inspection of the squadron being handed over by Belson of the 16<sup>th</sup> L.H. Mackie now knows that there was no cause for annoyance. I wrote recommending that Lieut Arnott be not retained in the service. Spent evening at the Davidsons Mrs Parker and daughter there.

#### Sunday 20

Up at 7.30 Max. 78° Min 54°-

Went to church put the usual donation, twenty five cents in the place. Did not go out in P.M. Met Gerty at 11.15 P.M train from Kenora where she has been for several weeks at the hospitable home of the Crispos Mrs Crispo has been very kind. I have been in a very bad temper all day. Have good cause for annoyance. Very Heavy thunderstorm in the evening which lasted for hours. This is bad for the crops. Gertie looks well.

#### Monday 21

Monday Max. 60° cool. wet and dreary until nightfall Min 54°

Busy all day. Wrote much. Went into the question of the drill halls Got letters from Ottawa to the effect that the quarters for 90<sup>th</sup> and 79<sup>th</sup> are cramped and asking me what to do about it what I purposed!! and this after my repeated letters asking for accommodation, for drill halls etc. Went to the Walker theatre taking a party of ladies. Mays Gertie, Mrs. Donnelly, Mrs Mackie, Mrs Davidson and Miss Parker from Med Hat. Flora returned from Grenfell where she has been visiting the Gwynnes, too tired to come.

Tuesday 22

Up at 6.30 Max 60° min 48° Busy all day looking into matters for the estimates Capt Dixon has pleurisy. I made enquiries and find that he is a little better. Got many letters, wrote several. The office is run by Mackie. Drew one hundred dols for travelling expenses. Sandow a lot. Took the Mackies, Major Mitchell, Flora to the coronation moving pictures in colors all were pleased. It is a beautiful show and should be better patronized.

# Winnipeg, Wednesday 23

Up at 7. AM. Max. 65°. Min 54°.

No mail from the east weather cool Had palpitation for at time, got better towards night. Mr Ross, 18<sup>th</sup> M.R. called at 8.30 P.M had a pleasant chat with him. Strutt spent the evening so did Ross. Had a long talk with Mackie and ordered that the lieutenants have a lesson on ordnance duties when the [*sic*] return and be examined Wrote Helmer asking for Lt. Col. Gwynne to inspect R. ass<sup>ns</sup> Met Haggart accidentally on Portage ave. Sandow.

#### Thursday 24

Up at 7.00 Max. 70° Min 52° Busy all day or at least until the 4. P.M then went to Colonel Thompsons garden party at St Vital by steamer chartered by him. Major Lipsett came with them. It was a great success I met many nice people there to whom I had not been introduced before now. Everything was done which could be to make the guests happy, good music, good songs, good dancing. The Count de Bury paid too marked attention to a married lady whose conduct has been detrimental Got home at 11.00 P.M. Mays and Flora cam, the dears enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Sandow. A Mr. H.[blank] Fox. representing the Lake Superior Wagon Co came to see me about taking stock in it, and was quite frank about it telling me that William Mackenzie had none(?) that D.C. Cameron Lt Governor had and is the president that Sir William Whyte has stock Lt Col (Hon) Brown of the 90th the richest man here is in it. He told me that Captain Ketchen took five thousand and paid up half like the rest of them. This is very strange in view of all that has taken place. He could not afford it honestly.

# Winnipeg Friday 25

Up a 6.30 Max. 60°. Min 44°. Busy all day. Colonel Rattray called to see me and expressed himself strongly in Militia matters. Thinks G— would not be a popular brigadier, thinks it stupid of the govt to employ British officers their force being now forty years old.

Present the Lt Colonel and Majors Lipsett and Lyndon with me. I left at 4.00 for here and all of us by train at 5.40 arrd at Fort Frances at 1.30 and went to the Emperor hotel and to bed Raining hard. Sandow. L says that Lispett is very green, inexperienced indeed and a perfect ass. Made a show of himself on the train when the waiter accidentally fell against him. Sandow.

Annual training estimates include enough money to bring the four regiments to camp, 79<sup>th</sup> 90<sup>th</sup> 96<sup>th</sup> 100<sup>th</sup> Capt Lipsett did not study the estimates sufficiently or he would not have asked for five thousand dollars for local work of the Winnipeg brigade. He was quite surprised when I pointed out that four days in camp for the city regiments would be required and had been asked for. Colonel Thomson called to get leave for the corps (79<sup>th</sup>) to have the range for a shoot next week and asked me to go. I promised to do so, He said he intended to retire this next spring and we discussed the successor but I wro suggested his finishing the terms of Command. He said when I hinted that I would go myself that I should not, for I had made the district from nothing and that he had heard such fine things said of me on his trip up to the Yukon this year. This is nonsense, the beast lied He has been bought over by Ketchen. I must sift this to the bottom. We all went to the Donnelly pic nic and enjoyed it. Got home at 11.30 P.M. a pleasant day,

Mr. Milne called and spent the evening with us. Gertrude and Flora had a visitor in Miss Davidson.

### Winnipeg Monday 4

Up at 7. AM. Max 58. Min. 44° Sandow half an hour. Took a walk to see the labour parade. A fine sturdy lot of men in the ranks. The firemen had the best show of the lot, fine horses and other outfit suca(?) coverd with union Jacks. Donnelly called to see me and Mrs D. to see Mays. Donnelly told me that he thought that Ketchen was a liar and a cad, that hed told him to his face that he was a rotten and in the presence of Arnott. I believe him. The man is a vile double faced villain, a scoundrel, who would turn like a cur on the hand that fed him. I talked with Donnelly and suggested his taking contracts instead of going on a salary. Sandow several times, about one hour.

Up at 7.am Sandow a lot. Max 50.° Min 40°. Busy until 2. P.M. then as it

#### Wednesday 6

Up at 7. Max 50. Min 40.°. Sandow a great deal, busy in office until nearly two P.M. Mail small to-day. Wrote several letters Lt Col O'Grady called to see me about rifles, the rifle range. and other regimental matters. There was an unpleasantness last night between Capt Conger and Capt Lipsett. It is too bad. Conger came to say that it occurred. Lipsett without cause called him a fool and he lost his temper sprang to his feet and told him not to dare to call him a fool. He should have left the table and room instead I am surprised at Lispett. He surely knows that no gentleman would call one such a name. Sandow again at night.

# Winnipeg, Thursday 7

Up at 6.45 Max. 56° Min 38° Fine Sunny day, a rarity this summer. Busy all day. The tailor wrote up my measure He is not my regular one. The representative is a decent sort I wrote all evening We expected the Panet boys but they could not come they had to go to Edmonton with Lt Colonel Rogers. Sandow a lot. Wrote introduction to Red River expedition Torla dear girl is writing it up in proper style I think she will do it well.

Friday 8

Up early. busy all day. returns.

Winnipeg to Grenfell by train Saturday 9

Up early. Left by early. and on arrival was met by Gwynne. Went to the Gwynne to stay until the inspections are over I am to inspect at Grenfell at 10.00 on Monday. Max. 63. Min 41°. Sandow. Sat up late. There was a Croquet party going on

Grenfell. Sunday 10

Up at 8.20 Garden Party for Croquet at the Gwynnes, met a lot of young people there. Max 70° Min 43° Weather delightful. Sat up late. Sandow Max.

Grenfell. Monday 11

Major Wright called and arranged to come in tomorrow morning. Mr Lan(?). Drove us out to Major Wrights at 3 PM where we after inspecting the stables and viewing the farm from the elevated place on the roof an observatory. Saw the garden and then dinner. Mr and Mrs Claxton had motored us out to the Wrights. Sat up late, Max 71° Min 45°– Sandow.

Grenfell. Tuesday 12

Up at 6 A.M. Max in Winnipeg, 60° Min do.42° Min 42°

My Lyndon. asst Commissary of ordnance came on time and we inspected Colonel Gwynnes Head Qrs equipment first. Armoury clean and in good order. Gallery amn boxes should have been written off in camp I have ordered it to be made all right. All clear. Equipment in good order.

After inspecting Colonel Gwynnes went on with Major Wrights.

The equipment not properly accounted for ordered that it be ready second week in August, October

Inspected two cos of 95<sup>th</sup> Rifles Told the Captains to be careful to employ their Colour Sergts, that the officers shd not be taking off their coats, when they have non coms to do it Lunched at the Woods. Left by train after inspecting the last of the 95<sup>th</sup>

Left by the evening train for Winnipeg Perry on the train. Did not see him Max. 64.° min, 51.

# Winnipeg Saturday 16

#### Monday 18

Up at 7.30. Max.[blank] Min. [blank] Sandow. at 8.00. Busy until one, had a long talk with Macdonell he is pleased with the troop and camp at Petawawa. Likes the general The men behaved well, with one exception I told him about sport and other matters of discipline. Officers for examinations to be given the afternoons and evenings to themselves to study. Weather cold and wet miserable in the extreme. Sandow Spent afternoon at work at home. Flora busy writing for me.

Winnipeg Monday 18

Up at 6.45 Max. 50° Min. 42 Busy in office all forenoon. Arranged for the line of discipline and organisation of the corps (Lord S Horse) Miserable day. Sandow a lot. Mr Strutt called.

#### Tuesday 19

Up at 6.30 Max. 62° Min. 44° Sandow twice a great deal. Routine all day in office small mail from Ottawa. Spent evening with the Pennefathers

Tomorrow Election day, Winnipeg, for Dominion, Wednesday 20

Up at 6.30 Max. 56° 46° Routine wrote all afternoon, my reminiscences Several young fellows spent the evening Major Mitchell came to see me about a Sergeant Major for the 100<sup>th</sup> Grenadiers. Sandow a lot.

Dominion day elections held this 21st Sept. Thursday 21

Up at 6.45 Max. 60° Min 44° This election day. results in favour of Conservative antireciprocity people are overwhelming over fifty majority of members for the House of Commons. Sandow

> Winnipeg Friday 22

Up at 6.30 Max. 50. Min 40° Fine in forenoon, windy and cold in the PM There seems to be great jubilation in Winnipeg at the results of the election. I have taken no part except to vote, as

I do not believe in public officers doing so, but they all seem to think that I ought to be pleased I am sorry for Sir Frederick Bordens defeat, as he had the interests of the militia at heart. I must do my best now to get my rights. Sandow The Mackies with us in the evening,

#### Saturday 23

Up at 7.30 Max 46° Min 32° morning dark and cool. Busy all day. Wrote Sir Frederick Borden for my rights. I also wrote Brigadier Gen Macdonald on the same subject. It is high time that I got my rights. I have asked for my brevet which was taken from me when I got the appointment of D.O.C. Sandow a lot. Muscles improved much . Good friend Edwd. # Winnipeg to Brandon Sunday 24

Up at 7.30 Max. 51 [2 changed into a 5] - Min 34° Was busy writing all forenoon left at 2.40 PM with Qmr Lyndon to inspect 99<sup>th</sup> at Brandon and other posts. Arrd. at Brandon at 7.30 train heavy and behind time. Major John Clark met us there. I went to his house, Lyndon to a hotel. Hotels crowded, poor accommodation Sandow for legs and arms. Sat up late

# Brandon. Monday 25

Up at 6.30. Max in Winnipeg 51° Min 33°

Proceeded to the armoury and inspected the 99<sup>th</sup> Cos. in forenoon, except one inspected it in the PM. All in good order. Caretaker has the arms all right Took stock of everything. We all went with Major John Clark to see the new asylum which he is building Went all over it, a fine large place over 300 ft in length - and fire proof walls of solid brick floors of concrete ceilings do. Dined as usual at the Clarks and then supped with the officers of the city units. Gave them a good talk. Capt Whillier stated that the regt did not get fair play in camp and the water supply was given to the composite rgt before them. Will see Major Carey about it Sandow as usual. At supper arranged to meet reporters of local papers and give them particulars of Lord Strathconas trust. Lyndon gave lecture on ordnance.

# Brandon to Souris & back, Tuesday 26

Up at 7.45 [written over 30] AM. Max in Winnipeg 54 Min. do. 31. Up at 6.00 but went to bed again as no one was moving. Went to drill hall and met two reporters on the papers here and gave them for publication full particulars of Lord Strathconas trust and a lot more re cadets and militia. Loaned them my circular to teachers. Promised to send them the names of the teachers who passed in Wpg. Went to Souris in the afternoon and inspected the Company. Capt Hendersons, Major Young motored us around the town and parks. He has a fine house. Sandow Sat up late with John. We were motored out to Souris, Capt Whilliers car. He and Kirkaldy came. Lyndon and I enjoyed trip beautiful country, fine stacks of wheat crops excellent.

Brandon Portage Laprairie, Winnipeg

#### Wednesday 27

Up at 4.30 max in Winnipeg 40° Min 32. At Brandon cold and raw, north wind. Left my kind host and hostess Major and Mrs Clark after breakfast at 7.30 by Brandon Local to Portage Laprairie. Lt Colonel Rankin had not warned his Cos there. We phoned Snider and he came down- motored us up, shewed us the threshing-machine. Miserably cold wind from north. Wheat thirty odd bushels per acre. Snider has 800 acre farm two in all. Saw everything on the home farm, had nice lunch. Went on to town in Sniders motor inspected the Cos. they have miserable accommodation for the equipment. We were motored around the town and parks and came away at 4.40 and arrd in Winnipeg at 6.00 house at 6.15 Left Lyndon at hotel. Col the Hon Lambton of the Coldstream guards came to see me from his car and we chatted over old times to Winnipeg. He says Major Stewart is dying. The Mackies at the house and also the children had a party. E\_\_\_\_ Mitchell, came and young cousin as escort. To bed at mid night.

# Winnipeg, Thursday 28

Up at 6.30. Max 40. Min 36. Wet and miserable all day. Busy all day, discussed drill armouries ectc [*sic*] with the Dist Engineers and the Staff officer. Gave orders for letters to be written on all points to the department of Militia and defence, Ottawa. Nothing to be left unsaid in the effort to get armouries, drill halls and rifle ranges. Sandow. Mays and I went to the (?) the banquet to Sir Daniel about four hundred and fifty sat down Sir William Whyte in the chair spoke well Sir Daniel made a nice speech recognizing old friends and comrades in the assemblage. This is said to be the best dinner or banquet ever given. A beautiful centre peice [*sic*] and candalabra of solid silver was given to Sir Daniel and Lady MacMillan, and beautiful bouquets were presented. Sandow a lot. Got home at 1.30 Dress was mufti and decorations.

# Friday 29

Up at 7.30. Max. 54° Min 40° Fine day. The Hendersons Elmes and Jim, and Mrs Henderson Freda called and took tea. I dined with them at the hotel Alexandra. Came home late. Busy until 4.30 P.M. Routine matters. Board to finish examinations of Lieut Russell for captain. Sandow a lot. Arranged with Lyndon where to go next in our tours of inspection. The Hendersons are busy and jolly over the results of the elections.

Winnipeg Saturday 30

Up at 7.30 Max 60° [written over 40] Min 44. Busy all day. Routine.

#### October

#### Sunday 1

Up at 7.30 Max. 60. Min 44° Wrote all day. J.A.M. Aikins K.C. [written over QC] called to ask about and armoury or armouries on his Constituency. I told him the names of the places which he had recommended (I had and he went away) Milne called to see us in the evening. Left at 11.30 Did not go to church. Sandow a lot.

Complaint men had no tea last night for supper. and that mess is in debt. He I have trouble with that mess Cartwright is to blame this time Will stop the money out of the pay of the officer administering the affairs of the mess. Sandow.

Winnipeg. Monday 2

Up at 7.20 Heavy rain all night. Max 56° Min 48° Much to do all day Capt Dixon back at duty as Staff adjutant. Mackie has been doing his work. I am sorry that he has not the appointment, He is worth a lot to any man.

#### Tuesday 3

Up at 7.20 Max 48. Min. 40 Busy all day. Sent recommendations to Hd quarters for drill halls and armouries Sent for Macdonell and Mackie to say that I had heard that there was talk all around the barracks to the effect that Lt Arnott had stated that he had been in the Red Light dist with Capt Conger, and that such was not true and that I had mentioned that there should have been nothing said about by Macdonell as I spoke to him in strict confidence. He stated that Mackie had told him. This Mackie denied, with reason Sandow a lot.

# Winnipeg Wednesday 4

Up at 7.00 Max 50° Min 40° Busy all day at routine. Wrote Lord Strathcona again as my letter mailed on the 1<sup>st</sup> could not have caught him More explanations will be needed, and I gave him the full a/c of the outrageous treatment which I have received. Wrote Gus Harwood and sent him a long list of the troubles also the militia lists of April 07 and April 08 In the first I am a Colonel next to Lessard in the second I am a lieut Colonel about No one hundred and fifty on the roll. I told Lord Strathcona that I could resign in the spring if I did not get my rights. Inspected the No 11. Co AS.C. which I found in first class condition. Lyndon took stock and I examined the state of things.

# [no heading]

Up at 7.30. Max 60. min 44° Wet at intervals. Miserable weather Crops still in the fields. Inspected the Coronation Company of the 79<sup>th</sup> Camerons. They looked well and drilled well too. I addressed them in words of approval. The [*sic*] cheered me a lot. Had a chat with Major de Charne(?) who told me that he was still a second class clerk in the post office. Had been stepped over by a lot of Toronto young men brought up by the Inspector of post offices. He had no credit given to him. Post master a dyed in the wool party man. Sandow a lot.

Winnipeg Thursday 5

Max. 60°. Min 46° Sandow Busy all day. Wrote a good deal Up at 7.30 Sandow twice.

Friday 6

Up at 5.30 Wrote until 8.30 Office all day Wrote at night. To bed at 11.30 O'Grady called to see me about the cup, Eaton cup, competition. Friend from Calgary called(?) to buy a lot.

Winnipeg. Man Saturday 7

Up early. Busy at writing. In office all morning. Arranged to get off tomorrow morning and proceed on a tour of inspection.

Winnipeg to Maple Creek. Inspection. Sunday 8

Up at 6.30 Left by ten P.M train to come for Maple Creek, accompanied by Mr Lyndon Asst. Commissary of ordnance in my dist. Went to bed at midnight. Pleasant bright moonlight night. Farmers along route threshing. Enormous quantity of unthreshed Crop to be seen enroute.

Maple Creek. Monday 9

Up at 6.00 AM. met Dr. McEachern on train and had a long and pleasant chat. Said that the govt wished to send Major Walsh in command of the Lord Strathconas Corps to the Boer war and that he told Sir Wilfred that all the people wished me and that Lord Strathcona would not permit Walsh to take command. He told me much more.

Arrived at Maple Creek at 6.20 P.M and having arranged that the CP.Ry would stop there to let me off we were all right. Many nice people called. Good hotel, nice rooms meals well served. Met Abbott late SM N.W.M.Police, Redmond late Sergt do. do. Douglas late S.M. stock rancher and postmaster. Had long chats about the force. All are down on the present Commissioner who has disfranchised all conservatives in the force where possible to send them where they could not vote. The people who are hardest against him are Liberals which I think speaks for itself. Max at Wpg 64° [written over 40] Min. 40

Maple Creek. Tuesday 10

Up at 6.30 AM. Major Tenaille came at 11 AM. Inspected the equipment after lunch. It is in good condition. Lyndon checked it all and kept record of deficiencies. There has been no dubbing sent to the sqdn ordered that they get supply

Called on the Begins Begin not at home He lives in separate qrs from Mrs Begin. The ladies-Mrs. and Miss Begin chatted gaily but spoke ill of present conditions in the force. It is sad to see the neat but empty barracks. Sandow at night. Spent evening at the Englishs where I met Miss Dunne and a young English lady, and young Dunne from Lethbridge with a friend. They are on CPRy express business.

Max Wpg 64. min. 42°

Maple Creek to Swift Current & Moose Jaw Wednesday 11 Up at 6.30 AM. Took morning train at 6.35 and arrived at Swift Current at 10. Inspected 13 squadron, before lunch. They are green. Will have to be straightened out. O.C. is bright but must come down and take a course. All officers are going to take courses this winter Met Mr Sanders late MP. now rich

Wrote Colonel Sam Hughes about the armouries also Hugh John about Jim and Major Descharme and other matters. Wrote long letter to Bennett of Simcoe, my native Country, informed him of my treatment.

Winnipeg, Thursday 26

#### **November**

Winnipeg, Wednesday 1

Up at 6.30 Max. 24 Min, 10° above Weather fine but raw. The Minister of Militia Sam Hughes, Major Gen Mackenzie the Secretary and then Hughes and Mrs Mackenzie. I went down and met them Mrs. Taylor, Sam Hughes neice was there with her husband. Roblin, Coldwell, Colin Campbell and others met. We went up to the barrack grounds and drill hall then to the premiers office and arranged for the land needed for the barrack square and the barracks to be handed over to the Man govt for govt House, and after some discussion they decided to give us land for barracks I then went home and in the evening Sam dined us all, and there was much talk Premier Roblin himself gave us much useful conversation on Imperialism, and plainly shewed that England must do something if she is to retain her position with regard to us We give her a preference she gives the Dominions none whatever. Sam took me aside after the dinner and said that he would give me the western comm and including the whole prairie country and the Colonel Smith was framing something for him. He says he will resolve Smith and Gregory.

#### Thursday 2

Up at 6.30 Max 34° Min 10° Busy all morning. Did much. L Col Thomson called to say good bye as he is going east for a fortnight He said he came to thank me for the way I have acted towards him and his regiment, the 79<sup>th</sup> I replied that I valued his friendship very much. J B Mitchell, WJ. Maclean, Dr and Mrs Davidson spent the evening with us. McGregor was wondering how Maclean could be so polished after years in the wilderness.

# Saturday 4

Up at 6.30 Max. 40° Min 20° Busy in office until one P.M. then at home Wrote. Had a long talk with the secy of the annual ball committee. Suggested that the officers who paid the most such as the seniors would be allowed to invite more guests and that the ball would be the wind up of the season, just before Lent. Told him that as the last years ball was such a success we must keep close to the same lines. Sandow— Weather pleasant.

# Winnipeg Saturday 4

Max. 42° Min 33° up at 7.45 Wrote all day. Spent evening at Donnellys. Asked him to find a good spot for a barracks on the banks of the Red River.

Sunday 5

Up at 7.30\_ Max 40. Min 33\_ wrote all day, called on the Donnellys

Winnipeg Monday 6

Up at 7.00 Max. 40. min 32. Busy all day. Sent for Lieut Arnott so as to read a letter to me from A.G. This was done in the presence of Major AC. Macdonell and Capt Mackie. Gave Arnott a lecture Mr McGregor left for Yorkton. Had a long talk about the white slavery. He is sound.

#### Tuesday 7

Up at 7.30 Max. 38.° Min 28° Took Captain Mackie and in a motor car proceeded to the new agricultural grounds at St Vital, and lunched with the Donnelly Mr Milne and Staff, the drove through the Riverside Park and a mile and a half South of the Arctic Ice Co land, but saw no ground suitable for barracks, returned to tour and went over the grounds of the Agricultural College at Tuxedo park they are too narrow for training. Went to the land west on Portage over new rifle range and found it to be as expected much better than any we had seen. Covered about fifty miles in these inspections. Arrd at home at 6.00 P.M. eight hours.

Major Ducharme called at 8.30 to see me about matters and to invite Mays the family and I to the ball.

#### Thursday 9

Up at 7.45 Max. 32° Min 0. (zero.) Busy all day. Inspected the 79<sup>th</sup> and 90<sup>th</sup> both of them better at drill than the 100<sup>th</sup> The 90<sup>th</sup> the best of all, but the 79 much better in the fit of everything. Sandow. Mrs McGregor and the girls went to see the parade. Winter is upon us now.

Winnipeg, Friday 10 Up at 7.00 Max 0° (zero) Min 0- (zero. Met the general and Minister Colonel Sam Hughes than daccompanied them in a trip to see our new rifle range, and a piece of land south Hon Colin Campbell Hon Coldwell and others met in the Govt rooms then inspected the proposed site for a drill hall. We also had the pleasure before that of lunch with Mr. Campbell. Big banquet at night with the Minister as guest Minister and gen present. Col S Hughes Minister spoke well and to the point, so did Gen, Aikins(?) and Sir Daniel MacMillan and Hon J W Montague.

### Saturday 11

Up at 7.30 Max 4° above 0, Min. 4° below 0. Busy all day. Wired Minister to let Rattray come to the meeting in Ottawa for the  $16^{th}$  instant. He wired approval. Lt Col. Clark Brandon phoned to ask if he could go also I took the reponsibility [*sic*] of giving consent.

Ottawa Ont. Thursday 16

Up at six Meeting of large number of Militia officers a success I went with the Cavalry officers and put in a long paper. Parliament opened at 3.00 I met the other ADC.s and led with them the procession into the Senate. Duke read Speech well, very brilliant affair.

Up at 6.00 Busy at meeting, State dinner - etc - Duke pleasant. Came home with the Turners.

Ottawa. Ont, Saturday 18

Great drawing room at night very brilliant, held in Senate. I was an A D.C. Col Sherwood and I went through together Colonel Turner led the way then, Cols Smith and Landry, then Sherwood and I. Sherwood is a trump, very kind.

Last day of Militia meeting Lunched with the Minister in the House of Commons restaurant, all the officers. The duke of Connaught Sir Wilfred Laurier and Mr R L Borden present. Sir Wilfred facetious Sam Hughes sharp, as usual.

Ottawa, Ont, Sunday 19

Up at 7.30 Had tea at the Biggars Sam Hughes there very pleasant with me, met his wife, daughter and neice. Mrs Biggar pleasant

Ottawa, Ont Tuesday 21

Busy with the A.G and C.G. Staff. Told the latter all about Ketchens case and he said that as far as he could see there was no case, my own opinion. I informed him that I would report upon it when I got back to Winnipeg. Sloppy and damp

# Ottawa, Wednesday 22

Up at 6.00 Max. in Ottawa 40° very slushy. Dined with the Woodsides, pleasant time. Learned much. Lunched with the Ogilivies. she is an American. Saw Lt. Col. Thacker and was told by him that he had been slated for the Command of Lord Strathconas Horse, but had chosen Staff in England instead, he said that of course Macdonell would get the command of the corps if I recommended it, stated that things were in a bad state the in S.Horse. A lie from some damned scoundrel. I must see about this,

Met the minister by appointment He called in Colonel Smith who on being asked stated that I should not have had my brevet Colonelcy of 17<sup>th</sup> May 1907 taken from me and that Hon Colonel was preposterous. The Minister spoke clearly and firmly about the matter and asked Colonel Smith who is now judge advocate general, what the powers of the Council were. the latter replied what you give them.

# Montreal from Ottawa Thursday 23

Up at 5.00 Left Ottawa by Grand Trunk at 8.40 Paid my bills and Corporal Martins a/c, was met by Gus and went to their place on Hutchison St. A pleasant evening with them all. To bed at midnight.

Montreal, Friday 24 P. Quebec

Up at 7.30 A.M. Went down town in the afternoon with Marie and to the Huberts. Gertrude junior very ill indeed but stout. is paralyzed from the waist down Got home at six o'clock and had a pleasant evening. Did not go to bed early. Went to the train and was seen off at 10.30 P.M by Gus and Frank. Arrived Ottawa by CP.Ry at 1.30 AM the 25<sup>th</sup> and went to bed at 2. AM same date.

# On Train CP.R. Montreal to Winnipeg Saturday 25

Up at 8 AM. Rattray and I dined and had all meals together had a long chat with him went to bed at 11.00 Had gone to bed at 1.30 and sat up arose as above.

On train to Sunday 26 Winnipeg

Up at 7.30 Wrote nothing, read all day. Bryce' Red River settlers, and saddle trail and snow shoe.

Winnipeg. Monday 27

Up at 6.15 AM. Office 9.30 Max 12° Min 12° At office told Mackie and Dixon of the statement made by Colonel Thacker that things were in a bad state up here and that Ketchen and Dixon had been spoken to about their conduct - a pack of lies of course. I also spoke to Major Carey who says that Major Lipsett did not write to Ottawa privately about things here. Dixon feels much hurt and stated that Major Lipsett spoke about this, and had when he went in about Major Macdonell being reported as the next O.C - Lord S. Horse, stated that he had done it Such damnable work it is difficult to understand. It will never end until the British officer ceases to be a factor in Canadian training. Max 8° below last night Min 8° below.

# Tuesday 28

Up at 6.30 Max. 8° below. Min 8° below Max 7. Went to the Donnellys and spent the evening. Mays and Flora with me. Col. Gwynne took the children Gertie & Harwood to the theatre. Flora had not a very good time. Max 10° min 10° above 0.

Winnipeg Wednesday 29

Max. 10° above Min. 10° above went to the Donnelley birthday party of Miss Katie Donnelly. Pleasant time, Did much work until five o'clock P.M.

Did much work writing reports of Corps inspected, and letter to Lord Strathcona asking if he could give the officers their helmets as they are very expensive. I wrote him in my own hand asking for a little xmas present for the men of the Corps of which he is the Hon. Colonel. I did this for his own sake and gave him a lot of news Wrote Major Macdonell a long letter so that he could understand the whole case. and gave him an account of the affair at Ottawa. Sandow a lot.

#### Thursday 30

Up at 7.30 Max. 24° Min 24° above 0' Busy all day at the desk. Did much work Sent off great tactical-list demanded. Wrote many reports. The St Andrews banquet, had to respond to the army navy and auxiliary forces. I hate it. The same old song has to be gone over. I told them of our meeting in Ottawa with the Minister of Militia and the Lord S Trust. Told them of the trust and the benefits of it. Dr the Hon J.W Montague and Rev Mr Gordon made a good speeches long but eloquent. one would have been enough for the night. Sandow.

Winnipeg, Sunday 3

Up at 7.40 Busy writing private letters all day. Mitchell, Mackie, Mair, and Mrs Mackie called. Mitchell and I had a long chat over the 100<sup>th</sup> Things must change at once Mills is foolish. Barry the adjutant has been cut out of the job. Johnston Miller called to see us, so did young Cameron. Sandow a lot. Max. 30° above Min 4°– above,

#### Monday 4

Up at 7.40 Max. 30° Min. 20° above 0 Max at 8.30 20° above. Got a reply to my letter from Thacker He very gracefully explains the whole matter properly saying that it was understood that there had been a great improvement in the corps ever since and in the command of the district. It is satisfactory to have this from Thacker. Sandow a good deal. Inspected the Cavalry field ambulance la the men looked smart eleven away from the parade for inspection. I gave the corps (a troop) a severe lecture applying the fault finding to the absentees who I described as unpatriotic and without a good esprit de corps.

Busy all forenoon went with Mays to hear Mrs Pankhurst the leading suffragist of England. She speaks well and her arguments are sound. I have always believed in the women having votes, and I am more than Sandow. Very fine

#### Sunday 17

Up at 7.30. Max 20° min. 14° above. Wrote all day long. Miserable until night when Donnelly called. Remained up until 1.30 reading. Read in bed general Butlers evidence. It is palpable from all the deductions that the Boer war was brought on by a gang of unscrupulous capitalists who worked Chamberlain, Milner, Bobs and the British govt to bring things to climax. The behaviour of Rhodes in Kimberly during the siege The Treatment of Kekewich by Bobs the favouritism displayed towards Baden Powell who worked under Milner, Plumer. Nicholson, Lawley, and others The honours showered on the Rand magnates there is nothing for it but to shew that the Boers were more sinned against than sinning. Very fine weather.

Up at 7.30. Max 24° Min 12° above. 0. Busy all day. Mays and dined at the Kellys to meet Sir Daniel and lady McMillan Present Sir D. and Lady M. Hugh J Macdonald Mr Lamb of the bank of Toronto, Judge and Mrs Perdue. I took in Mrs Perdue, she is a sister in law of Lt Col Swinford. Sandow. Very fine weather

Winnipeg. Thursday 21

Up at 8.20 Very warm in the house, we over slept ourselves. Max. 28° Min 20.°-Gwynne wired that he does not want to take course as a physical instructor at Halifax N.S. says he is too old. I wired to say in reply to his request to move and get him the refresher course at the R M.C as previously arranged that he must telegraph himself, that it would spoil all if I wired for him. I wrote him to the same effect. Sandow.

#### Friday 22

Up at 8.00 very tired last night read until two P.M. Max. 24° Min 20° No mail to day. Lord Strathcona wired a Christmas gift for the regiment Lord S Horse, Three thousand dollars one half to the officers one half to the men, W.O. and Sergts how generous of him! He never tires of considerate acts. Spent evening at the Pennefathers

Up at 7.30 Max 24° Min 20° Busy all day finished up a lot of work. Johnston Miller called in the evening.

Winnipeg Saturday 23

Up at 7.30. Max 22° Min 20. above (Zero) at 8.30. AM. Lord Strathcona, Lord Strathcona cabled three thousand dollars Christmas present for the regiment

Up at 7.30 AM. Max 24° Min 20. above zero. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal cabled me for Strathconas Horse RC (Lord S.H) three thousand as a Christmas gift Half for the officers and half for the men How generous. He is writing so I will not say anything about it until I hear and know his wishes. No Sandow.

#### Sunday 24

Up at 8.00 Max 22° Min 0 (zero. Fine day but got cold towards midnight. Went to see Captain Conger ill in general hospital. He is a good deal better than when I saw him last. His eyesight has come back and his mind is quite clear but he is still paralyzed below the waist. I hope he will soon be well poor fellow he has had a hard time. Walked back. Sandow. Mays busy fixing up her presents and all the others. The Mackies called with a big bundle of sorts.

# Winnipeg. Man. Monday 25

Up at 8.0 [*sic*] Max 10° degrees below zero. Min. 10. Visited the mens dinner accompanied by the officers and all the married(?) dinners. They look-married ladies We drank the king. The SM. Mr. W Officer Doherty proposed men then after that the officers. I then proposed Lord Strathcona Dined at home of course Johnston Miller and Mr Le Fevre late of Jersey Channel Islands. Sandow.

#### Tuesday 26

Up at 7.30 Boxing day. Max 10°. Min 12°. below zero. We went to the Christmas tree in the mens mess room Martin was like Santa Claus. I worked in the office all forenoon. Sandow. Mr and Mrs Haslett spent the evening with us, played bridge Heard bad news of Sergt Charters, he is dying of galloping consumption. Up at 6.20/100 Max. 8° below. Min 24° below zero. Busy all day. Wrote General MacKenzie re Prince Albert and the regt they want there this year.

#### Thursday 28

Up at 8.00 Max. 16° below. Min 28° below. Busy all forenoon. Had the first headache in many years. It left me after a rest. Went with Mays Mrs Macdonell to the Military night of the 100<sup>th</sup> regiment, Grenadiers. Miss Pepple of New York. The star actress was Miss Castles, the actor Mr Horne. Lt Colonel and Mrs Brown took us to the theatre in their motor. Sandow when I got back Cold night. Must open the eyes of some people.

Winnipeg Friday 29

Up at 7.30 Max 18° below 0. Min 30 (thirty) below. At a boy scout meeting in the university building. Mr Brydon-Jack and wife dispensed hospitality and were very nice indeed. Cold night strong north wind, the boy Scouts did very well indeed. Sandow. Wrote a good deal.

Saturday 30

Up at 7.30 Max. 18 below Min 24° below Busy until 1.30 P.M.
