Are they the same as were there when Capt. Cartwright dwelt in Calgary? She detested the whole lot of them - there is one thing, she is not a married woman

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who flirts anyway. I certainly feel as if they will not care for me - however, that is not necessary, I can get on quite well without that sort for acquaintances, can I not? This is a beautiful day & Mother, Frank, Mrs & Miss Mare have gone to enjoy Gus & Marie's hospitality for the day. I intend to try & take a run up for a few hours this week, as I should like to see Aunt Angeligne; they have a new girl & I fear

putting them out, but I can have dinner at the hotel. They had quite a demonstration last night for Laurier - it was late so I did not go & it was raining as well, having poured in the afternoon. I shall send the "Star" as you may like to see it. The children received the letter you wrote them & were delighted to hear from you. I have been pondering over things - my last will have enlightened you on the expenses we must incur - house \$75 - Bagnall 40 = \$115 = then \$35.00 or so for schooling out of balance of \$122.00 gives \$87.00 or so to live on per month. am I right? I want to be master of the situation you know dear, that is why I worry you so much over the matter.

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one must study every side of the question so you must not be surprised. I intend bringing Harwood up with me - a year there will not harm him & will be less expensive, board & tuition everywhere is so high. I fancy Frank will be married in the spring: folks are always in a hurry nowadays, are they not? We went to half-past seven mass as usual this a.m. Gertrude Hubert came up last night & remained for today. Charlotte is still in Vaudreuil, having a pleasant visit, I believe. There is very little news - we see few people, so many being away. I am always busy & will be preparing the girlies. They need things they [/pg 4]

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would not have to get if they were with us. Well, my darling. You know why I cannot go up until Sept., as I cannot leave the children until I see them comfortably settled if they remain - no one else can see to everything like their little mother. God bless you, my darling - write soon, although owing to your <u>wedding</u> trip to L - I hardly expect to hear from you in a couple of days. With much love from one & all.
