Are all Deane's sons dead? Very likely you hear from Minnie & and I am sure she expects to live with us. Bob and Jessie seem to be under the impression that she will remarry.

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You say "as she will have nothing' - do you mean by that in the way of furniture & money; in the latter case that would lead me to believe you have very little hope of the "Empire" turning out all right- Jack J. drinks too much and perhaps a talk from you will do him good - again, you may get no thanks from him. So you met Mrs. Paddy - is she pretty or must be very fascinating in some way. I remember Ross when he used to come to Macleod, but we did not see him often, as he was so friendly with Mrs. Kennedy. Of course, I think Bagnall & Annie would want to be with us - he seems to take the same interest in everything as of you & likes the country. Have you met Hon. Jack in Johnnie Hall? We knew him well in the old days & he was always
