Our dear children are well, thank God. Torla has been at the convent for a little concert given by her class this p.m. & a [party] after - it is now almost nine & she has not yet returned. She was to dance an Irish jig for them in honour of the day, but I cannot tell you how the affair came off until she comes in. Gertrude & Harwood are both reading.

Well, Torla has come in simply delighted at the success that crowned her efforts & the compliments paid her about her dancing. She had a fine time & is at peace with all the world, I am happy to say.

I attended a meeting of a new society formed here & which they requested me to join "The <u>children's</u>

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aid society". They put me on the committee - it is undenominational & Father Jan & M<sup>r.</sup> Valiquette & myself represent the Catholic's [*sic*]. It was very nice. M<sup>rs.</sup> Jamisson (Mayoress) M<sup>rs.</sup> Burns, Deaconess [Lampart], Ensign Coombs, & Burch (S. Army) M<sup>rs.</sup> Cushing represent the other churches as well as M<sup>r.</sup> W<sup>m</sup> Pearce, D<sup>r.</sup> Scott (schools) R<sup>ev.</sup> M<sup>r.</sup> Kirby & another minister, M<sup>r.</sup> John [Niblock] (Pres) & one or two others - it was a very representative gathering & I was proud of the honour conferred upon me. There is a dance tonight in Sherman's rink. the [sic] Irish give it in place of the banquet.

Yours of the 14<sup>th</sup> is now open before me. I wrote you on Monday night & in case I have to go out tomorrow evening, I thought I would inflict you tonight.

Miss Urghart keeps house for her uncle, Frank Hunter I believe.

Yes, Minnie Pringle, youngest daughter of Judge Pringle of Cornwall is M<sup>rs.</sup> Aylmer. I fancy her husband may be a nephew of Lord Aylmer. She is

the one who lived in Peterbro [sic] & has two daughters, twins, who were known as the heavenly twins I believe. They lived in Coteau for a long time & one of them is engaged to be married. She was Maude Allan's intimate friend (Mrs. Kennedy) & they were married within a few weeks of each other, Mrs. Aylmer first, Maude being her bridesmaid. The Aylmer's [sic] lived in Montreal for a time as well - think they were married about Aug or Sept./84. Kenny Kennedy was born some nine months after the marriage, was she not, so you can tell from that. I know she was a baby when [/pg 4]
