First Meeting of University Senate

The first meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was held in the I.O.O.F. Hall, Strathcona, on Monday March 30th 1908. The following members of the Senate being present; Hon. A. B. Rutherford, Minister of Education, Hon. Mr. Justice Stuart (Chancellor) Hon. Mr. Justice Cockburn, Dr. H. M. Torg (President) and Messrs. P. J. Nolan K. B., O. Boyd, M. D. C. M., R. J. Hutchings, John A. M. Dougall, J. J. Gaulty, E. K. Strathairn, Jas. M. Cairns, W. A. L. B., W. D. Ferris M. D.; R. S. Jenkins M. A., Geo. Henslow B. S. A. and W. S. Galbraith M. D. C. M.

Hon. Dr. Rutherford Moved, Seconded by Dr. H. M. Torg That Hon. Mr. Justice Stuart (Chancellor) be invited to act as Chairman of the meeting. No objections being offered, Hon. Mr. Justice Stuart accordingly took the Chair.

On taking the Chair the Chancellor said he did not propose making any ^{lengthy} preliminary remarks as the meeting had a great deal of work before it and he felt sure the members of the Senate were as anxious as he himself to get on with the business on hand. He accordingly invited Mr. N. D. Mills, Mayor of Strathcona to address the meeting.

Mayor Mills cordially welcomed the Chancellor and members of the Senate to Strathcona. He assured them

of the happiness felt by the Citizens of Strathcona when the announcement was made that Strathcona had been selected as the home of the Provincial University, and that the Citizens would at all times be prepared to assist the University Authorities in their endeavors to cultivate that dignity which the educational centre of the province should at all times maintain.

The Chancellor extended the thanks of the Senate to Mr. Mills for his address.

The regular business of the meeting was then proceeded with.

It was moved by Mr. P. J. Nolan and seconded by Mr. E. J. Hutchings that Harold W. Riley be appointed Secretary of the Senate, pending the appointment of a permanent Registrar (Carried Unanimously)

The Chancellor explained the absence of Senators Dr. J. H. Radell, Dr. R. G. Brett and Dr. G. A. Kennedy, their absence being occasioned by Messrs. Riddell and Brett being absent from the province and on account of Dr. Kennedy being detained on account of professional business.

Hon. Dr. Rutherford, Minister of Education was then called upon by the Chancellor to address the meeting. Dr. Rutherford explained that 258 acres

Secretary

of land had been purchased by the Government for a University Site at a cost of \$150,000⁰⁰. The land lies immediately to the west of the city of Stratheona, fronting on the Saskatchewan River, and a portion of it is within the boundaries of the city. He estimated that the property is now worth \$300,000⁰⁰. At present an amount of about \$11,000⁰⁰ was available for immediate use and an additional sum of about \$30,000⁰⁰ would be obtainable later on. Dr. H. M. Tory had been appointed President of the University by the Lieutenant Governor in Council in accordance with Section 45 of the University Act. Dr. Tory comes from one of the greatest seats of learning in the Dominion (McGill University) and he felt sure would bring a great power to bear in laying the foundations of Alberta University. If the Senate decided to start classes this year, Dr. Tory was prepared to undertake the appointment of professors, and in the event of the Senate deciding not to start classes this year, Dr. Tory would devote his energies to organization work. If classes are started this year quarters would have to be rented in Stratheona as new buildings could not be erected for two or three years. The present Legislative Assembly has been

Very liberally disposed towards the University and doubtless future Legislatures would be equally as favorably disposed towards ~~it~~ all educational institutions of a public character. The present University Act will doubtless need to be amended somewhat at subsequent sessions of the Legislature in order to permit of the fullest expansion of every branch of the University. - applause -

The Chancellor next invited Dr. Torg, the President to address the meeting.

Dr. Torg reminded the members of the Senate of the historic nature of the present gathering. The establishment and organization of a University is a great work in the beginning of which only a few can participate. We are not called upon to re-organize some old disorganized institution but we are laying the first foundations of a University which will be for the benefit and upbuilding of the province as a whole. We can congratulate ourselves on the fact that we are not called upon to deal with religious strifes of any nature, but we are starting the work as a united body. We ought to realize too that we cannot cut loose from tradition. We must use tradition as a guide and take from it the best that it contains to guide us in our work. The establishment of the University is the crowning of the educational

System of the province, and in beginning the work there are three things necessary for the successful carrying out of the University scheme. First of all we want men. Men in every sense of the term. In his selection of a staff he would endeavor to bring to the province men of the highest scholastic attainments and mental calibre. In the second place the establishment and equipment of the library is of the highest and most paramount importance. We want a library from which the men can draw and expand their knowledge, and one that will be a constant stimulant and assistant in their work. In this connection he would like to announce that Hon. Dr. Rutherford has agreed to furnish the library with a complete set of works by Canadian Authors. The third thing necessary was the equipment. The acquisition of a proper equipment would be a large undertaking, but we must face the problem frankly and fearlessly and from year to year add to the equipment so that in time we may succeed in equipping the University in the very best way. (applause)

At the conclusion of his address Dr. Torg suggested that the meetings of the Senate be private.

Dr. Ferris moved seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan, "That the meetings of the Senate be private and that the

press be furnished with such information as the President and Secretary may deem wise"

Some discussion followed in which Messrs. Justice Beek Hon Dr. Rutherford and others participated resulting in the adoption of the resolution

Opening of
classes

The question of opening classes was then taken up. Dr. Long explained that after having visited all parts of the province and carefully studying the situation he was of the opinion that in the event of the Senate deciding to open classes in the fall, about 35 or 40 students would be prepared to enter the University. Certainly not less than 30 students would enter. He was of the opinion from what he had seen during his visit through the province that classes should be started.

Dr. Rutherford drew the attention of the Senate to the fact that the University of Harvard had started classes with 9 students, Toronto with 26 and McGill with 10 and expressed the opinion that in viewing the question from that standpoint he thought Alberta was quite justified in opening classes.

Mr. McCall expressed himself as favorable to the opening of classes as did also a number of other members of the Senate.

It was moved by Jas. McCall and seconded by J. J. Gaulty

"That Classes be opened in the fall of 1908, at a date to be decided upon by the President". Carried Unanimously-

Place of
holding Classes

The question of selecting a building in which Classes could be held was then discussed. Dr. Lory explained that two buildings in Stratheona had been offered to him, either of which would be adapted for Class purposes. One was the I. O. O. F. hall, the building in which the present meeting was being held, and the other was the West end School which the School board had informed him would be available at the end of the present school term. This latter building could be used without any changes being made. It was finally decided to leave the selection of quarters in the hands of a Committee to be appointed later.

First Course
to be Given

Typewritten Copies of a Calendar which has been prepared by Dr. Lory were distributed to the members of the Senate for examination and ^{Dr. Lory} moved, seconded by Mr. R. S. Jenkins that we organize the faculty of Arts and Sciences leading to a B. A. degree, and that we offer courses leading to B. A. and B. Sc degree in Arts and B. Sc in applied Science"

A General discussion of the motion before the meeting followed.

Hon Mr. Justice Beck said he had not had an opportunity of studying the Calendar, but he presumed it was subject to any changes which may appear advisable. Under those circumstances he had no objections to its adoption.

Dr. Galbraith asked whether a

Laboratory would be equipped at once. Dr. Torg replied that that would depend on the financial standing of the University, as the equipment of a laboratory was a very costly undertaking. Judge Beck asked if Biology would be a second year study to which Dr. Torg replied in the affirmative. Hon. Nolan asked if a curriculum ^{for Matriculation} had been prepared to which Dr. Torg replied that a curriculum had been prepared based on Standard VII of the Schools of the province. The Chancellor, Hon. Mr. Justice Stuart asked what would be the attitude of the University towards the teaching of Agriculture. Dr. Torg replied that the moment there is a demand for agriculture instruction he would endeavor to begin it. Hon. Dr. Rutherford said that the Government did not anticipate that it would be either advisable or necessary to establish an Agricultural College for 2 or 3 years to come. The Dept. of Agriculture is now doing a great deal of work in Agriculture instruction that is usually done in agricultural colleges and he did not think there were sufficient students offering to warrant the Govt. in taking the step at the present juncture. Manitoba was a province whose principal industry was agriculture and yet that province had not found it necessary to establish an Agricultural College until 2 years ago.

Mr. Harcourt said that there are only 4 students from Alberta

at present attending ~~any~~ agricultural
Colleges

Scale of Salaries

The question of the Salaries to be paid to professors, lecturers and others was then discussed. Dr. Torg suggested that all heads of departments be treated alike and suggested a minimum salary for Professors of \$2,500 per annum increasing at a stated yearly advance until a maximum of \$3,000 is reached, and that all contracts be for a period of 5 years, revocable on a three months notice. Dr. Torg intimated that three professors would be required to start with as follows, English, classics and Modern languages. A general discussion followed in which the members of the Senate generally participated. All were agreed that good salaries should be paid and that the services of first class men only should be obtained. Dr. Torg said that no professor would be appointed unless he had taken his Scholarship or an equivalent of a Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Dr. Torg moved, seconded by Mr. R. J. Hutchings "That the following Scale of Salaries be adopted.

Professors \$2,500 per year advancing at the rate of \$100⁰⁰ per year until a maximum of \$3,000⁰⁰ is reached.

Assistant Professors \$1,800⁰⁰ per year advancing at the rate of \$90⁰⁰ per year until a maximum of \$2,250⁰⁰ is reached.

Lecturers \$1,200 per year.

Contracts with Professors and Assistant Professors to be for a period of 5 years, subject to dismissal by

The Senate on 3 months notice and that certain discretionary powers re transportation be left in the hands of the President."

The resolution was under discussion when adjournment for lunch was made at 1.10 P.M. On adjournment being announced Hon. Dr. Rutherford invited the members of the Senate to lunch at his residence, the invitation being accepted by all present.

Afternoon Session

The second session of the first meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was called to order by the Chancellor at 2.30 P.M. after the luncheon adjournment, all the members being present at the morning session being in attendance. The discussion re-salaries being resumed, the motion as read was adopted, Dr. Ferris alone dissenting.

Expenditure Items Nos 12 and 16 on the agenda for 1908-9 relating to ~~Salaries~~ Staff and equipment were then discussed. Dr. Tory estimated the expenditure for the session 1908-9 would be about \$25,000, divided as follows, Salaries \$20,000, ^{and} Library \$5,000 the latter amount including books and equipment. Hon. Dr. Rutherford

Dr. Tory explained to the Senate the Appointment Terms and Conditions of Dr. Tory's appointment as President of the University. His Salary is to be \$5,000 ^{per year} for the first 5 years at the expiration of which period it was to increase at the rate

of \$500⁰⁰ per year for a further period of 5 years. Free residence is also to be furnished at the expiration of ~~2~~³ years. The contract is for a period of 10 years. It was moved by Mr. P. J. Nolan and seconded by Dr. Ferrie, "That Dr. Torg be empowered to engage such professors, Assistant professors, lecturers and other employees as in his opinion are necessary for carrying on the work of the University for the calendar year. Carried Unanimously."

Mr. Jenkins expressed his disapproval of the idea of appointing all the professors and assistants outside of the province. He was strongly in favor of utilizing the material ~~now~~ available in the province, and he felt sure that many men now engaged in educational work in Alberta were eminently qualified to undertake the higher branches of learning and he felt an injustice would be done the whole of the teaching profession of the Province if ^{only} all outsiders were appointed. He would therefore move the following resolution "That in making appointments to the staff of the University of Alberta the men in the province should be first considered before we go outside, but nothing in this resolution shall be deemed to imply or construed as meaning that the best men should not be obtained."

A general discussion of Mr. Jenkins' resolution followed in which the members of the Senate generally participated. The general consensus of opinion being that

The services of first class men only should be procured. If men possessing the necessary qualifications could be found in the province, it was generally felt that their claims would be given prior consideration but qualification and general fitness would ~~be~~ constitute ^{the} foundation of all appointments. [Mr. Nolan expressed

[Mr. Nolan's remarks in brackets were made in a jocular spirit and not intended to be included in the Minutes. They were accordingly omitted when the Minutes were read.]

his disapproval of the appointment of anyone to the University Staff who is now engaged in educational work in Alberta. He expressed the belief that the making of a single appointment would utterly demoralize the whole educational system of the province.] Mr. Jenkins' resolution not being seconded, it was accordingly dropped.

Consideration Dr. Tory presented a draft of a calendar which he had prepared and which, if adopted by the Senate, would be printed for distribution.

A general discussion of the calendar followed, the principal points of discussion being the division of the calendar year. Some members favored the division of the calendar year into two terms of equal duration other members thought three terms would work to better advantage. It was finally decided to accept the two term division for the present session. The schedule of fees set out in the calendar was also favorably commented on, and on motion of Hon. Mr. Justice Beck, seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan, the following resolution was moved and unanimously

adopted "That the Calendar as prepared by Dr. Torg be accepted for the current year, with such amendments regarding affiliated Colleges as may be drafted by a Committee consisting Dr. Torg and Hon. Mr. Justice Beck.

Registrar

It was not considered necessary to appoint a Registrar for the present year, as Dr. Torg had agreed to act as Registrar until such time as the work and finances of the University rendered such an appointment necessary. It was moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Beck and seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan: That Dr. Torg be appointed acting Registrar.

Library

Moved by Mr. P. J. Nolan, seconded by Dr. Galbraith That Dr. Torg be authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$5,000 on books and equipment for the Library. - Carried.

Hon. Treas.

Moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Beck seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan That Mr. John A. McDougall be appointed Honorary Treasurer of the University - Carried.

Committee

Moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Beck, seconded by Dr. Ferris That there be two Committees pro-tem one finance and the other Executive, to hold office until the next meeting of the Senate - Carried.

Moved by Hon. Mr. Justice Beck, seconded by Mr. R. J. Hutchings That the Executive Committee consist of three elected members and the Chancellor and President as ex-officio members - Carried

Nominations for the Executive Committee were called for and the following Gentlemen were nominated - Dr. Ferris by Mr. Justice Beck, Mr. John A. McDougall by Mr. Harcourt, and Hon. Mr. Justice Beck by Hon. Dr. Rutherford.

Moved by Mr. R. J. Hutchings, Seconded by Dr. Ferris That nominations close. The motion being adopted. Messrs Dr. Ferris, John A. McDougall and Hon. Mr. Justice Beck were declared elected as members of the Executive Committee.

Finance Committee Moved by Mr. Harcourt, Seconded by Dr. Ferris That the Finance Committee consist of three elected members and the president and Hon. Treasurer as ex-officio members.

Senate and that all cheques shall be signed by The Hon. Treasurer and President - Carried

Moved by Dr. Lory Seconded by Mr. Justice Beck "That the ^{selection of the} place of Holding Classes at the opening of the University be left with the Executive Committee - Carried -

Moved by Dr. Lory Seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan, "That the Government be now requested to hand over all monies now in its possession belonging to the University, to the Hon. Treas., and that the selection of a bank be left in the hands of the finance Committee

Moved by Mr. Harcourt, Seconded by Mr. Jas. McCall "That the question of looking after suitable lodging accommodation for the Students be left in the hands of the Executive Committee - Carried -

Scholarship The question of offering Scholarships was discussed and on motion of Dr. Galbraith, Seconded by Geo. Harcourt the following motion was passed: "That a sum of \$200 be appropriated from the funds of the University for Scholarship purposes at the Matriculation examination to be written in September - Carried -

Mr. John A. McDougall spoke of the beneficial effect the offering

of Scholarships would have in inducing prospective Students to do their best work in all examinations. As an incentive to this end he desired to offer the sum of \$500⁰⁰ to the Senate for Scholarship purposes to be divided in any way They saw fit.

Moved by Mr. Nolan Seconded by Mr. Harcourt That the Generous offer of Mr. McDougall of \$500⁰⁰ for Scholarship purposes be accepted and that the Thanks of the Senate be extended to Mr. McDougall for his ~~generosity~~ ^{Gift} - Carried with applause -

Hon. Dr. Rutherford also offered the sum of One Hundred dollars for Scholarship, the amount to be used at the discretion of the Executive Committee

Moved by Mr. McCaig, Seconded by Mr. McDougall "That the thanks of the Senate be conveyed to Hon. Dr. Rutherford for his Gift of \$100 for Scholarship purposes and that the amount be accepted - Carried -

The Second Meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was held in the Judges Chambers, at the Court House, Calgary on Monday evening, July 6th 1908. Mr. Justice Stuart, the Chancellor, presiding. The members of the Senate present being Messrs. Strathy, McCall, Hutchings, Galt, McDougall, Harcourt, Drs. Boyd, Ferris, Galbraith, ^{and Brett} and Hon. Dr. Rutherford. Mr. Justice Beck, Dr. Torg, Dr. Riddell D.D. and P.J. Nolan K.C.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and, after some slight corrections regarding Judge Beck's attitude towards the publication of the first Calendar, on page 9, and the date ^{of} furnishing a residence to Dr. Torg in accordance with the terms of his contract with the Government, (page 13) were adopted on motion of Messrs Justice Beck and Dr. Ferris.

The next item of business on the agenda for consideration was Dr. Torg's report of his visit to Eastern Canada and the States in the selection of a staff and equipment.

4. Fourthly - Dr. Torg moves Seconded by Dr. J. H. Russell That Mr. Miner Edwards M.Sc. of McGill University be appointed as Assistant Professor of Mathematics and lecturer in engineering at an Assistant Professors Salary - Carries -
- Dr. Torg ^{spoke} briefly regarding each appointee. Before finally deciding to recommend the appointment of any of them Dr. Torg said he had made ^a very close personal inspection of each man and made careful inquiries concerning the work they were now doing and the satisfaction they are giving in their present positions. He had heard nothing but words of praise regarding them and personally he felt that they would give entire satisfaction in the positions to which the Senate had appointed them.

Dr. Torg presented the report of the Executive Committee in which the Committee approved of the appointment of Messrs Alexander, Broadus, Edwards and Alexander.

The question of organizing a

Book Store
 A University book store was outlined by Dr. Torg who explained the many benefits derived by the establishment of such an institution to be conducted in conjunction with the University. The matter of discounts alone, on all books purchased, was, in itself, sufficient justification for the Senate to act. He would accordingly ^{recommend} ~~advise~~ the Senate to authorize the opening of a University book store and suggested that any profits which may be made from the sale of books etc, be utilized in further equipping the library.

The Senate concurred in Dr. Torg's views and it was moved by Dr. Ferris, and seconded by Mr. Justice Beck that ^{the} organization of a University book store be sanctioned - Carried - new Con-

Committees

It was moved by Dr. Torg and seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan that the Executive and finance Committees appointed at the previous meeting of the Senate, be permanent standing Committees to hold office pending the introduction of by laws governing the general organization of the University. Carried - new Con-

Convocation

Dr. Torg presented the report of the Executive Committee dealing with a variety of matters delegated to them at the previous meeting, the first being their report on the question of holding

a Convocation of ^{enrolled} ~~the~~ Graduates.
 The Executive Committee favored
 the holding of a local Convocation
 at which all enrolled Graduates
 should have ~~corresponding~~ degrees
 conferred upon them Ad Eundem

Dr. Torg informed the Senate that he had received a letter from the Stratford City Council in which they wished to cooperate with the University authorities in giving the Convocation a special occasion.

Hatching and Seconded by Dr. Ferris that the finance Committee ^{be authorized to make} necessary arrangements for providing all Clerical assistance for carrying on the work of the University and to pay such Salaries as in their opinion are commensurate with the Services performed. Carried. item Con.

Professor

Dr. Torg addressed the Senate with reference to the appointment of Professor Bancroft as Professor of Geology, expressing the opinion that if Professor Bancroft ~~comes~~ comes he secured the University would be securing the services of a very capable man. Dr. Ferris moved, seconded by Dr. Boyd that Dr. Torg be empowered to approach Professor Bancroft and lay a formal proposition before him, regarding his accepting the appointment of Professor of Geology in the University of Alberta. Carried - nem - con.

Gowns

Dr. Torg asked the Senate what its attitude would be regarding the wearing of gowns by the professors and students. Various members of the Senate expressed their views on the subject, the consensus of opinion being that the professors and undergraduates should wear gowns, the former at lectures, and the latter at all functions, examinations, classes and lectures. It was therefore moved by Dr. Torg, seconded by Dr. Ferris that all professors and instructors be compelled to wear gowns at lectures. Carried - nem - con. Moved by Dr. Rutherford, and seconded by Dr. Ferris that all undergraduates be compelled to wear gowns at all functions, examinations, classes and lectures. Carried - nem - con.

The question as to whether partial or Conditional Students should wear gowns or not was discussed at some length. Dr. Ferris and Dr. Kinsell spoke, favoring the ~~wearing~~ compulsory wearing of gowns by all Students, regardless of whether they were Undergraduates or only partial or Conditional Students. Dr. Boyd also favored this view while Dr. Lory and Mr. Nolan and others were opposed to it. Mr. McDougall favored the wearing of gowns by third and fourth Year Students only. This view was supported by the Chancellor also. Finally, the following resolution was moved by Mr. P. J. Nolan and Seconded by Mr. McBair "That all Students who are not Undergraduates of the University be not allowed to wear gowns during lectures or examinations nor at functions. A vote being taken, the motion was declared lost, the vote being Aye 7. Nae 5.

The question of the selection of University Colours was disposed of by the adoption of the following resolution. Moved by Dr. Lory and Seconded by Dr. Ferris that the selection of University Colours be left in the hands of the faculty to report to the Senate at a future meeting - Carried - Aye Con.

Text books

Dr. Lory asked the Senate for an expression of opinion as to the attitude towards any publications

which may be issued ^{from time to time} by members of the faculty. He expressed the hope and belief that some member of the faculty may become the author of some work, and he suggested the advisability of the Senate permitting all publications including text books, which may be issued by members of the faculty being published as The Alberta University Series.

Mr. Jas. McChaff moved seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan That the Senate Concur in Dr. Torg's Suggestion and that all publications, including text books issued by members of the faculty be authorized to be issued as The Alberta University Series, but all such publications shall first be endorsed by the Senate. Carried *unanimously*.

Dr. Russell moved seconded by Dr. Ferris That Dr. Torg be authorized to extend the Senate's Thanks to all institutions that have supplied the University of Alberta with copies of their publications - Carried - *unanimously*.

Time of Commencement of Salaries Dr. Torg informed the Senate that the Executive Committee had recommended that the salaries of the professors be paid from July 1st 1908.

Dr. Ferris moved seconded by Mr. P. J. Nolan That the Executive Committee's recommendation re salaries be adopted and that Dr. Torg be authorized to apprise the appointees accordingly Carried - *unanimously*.

The third meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was held in the President's office, in the temporary University quarters, Duggan Street School, Strathcona, on Tuesday October 13th 1908. the Chancellor, Mr. Justice Stuart, presiding. In addition to the Chancellor the following members of the Senate were present Messrs. Rutherford, Beck, Nolan, Kennedy, Boyd, McDougall, Riddell, Galbraith, Galt, Hutchings, Harcourt, McBair, Ferris and President Tory. The absentees being Messrs. Jenkins, Brett and Strathy.

Present

The meeting was called to order by the Chancellor at 10. A.M.

Reading of Minutes

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted on motion of Messrs. Nolan and Hutchings.

Absent Members

Mr. Jas. McBair drew the Chancellor's attention to the fact one member of the Senate had been absent from the last two meetings, and thought some steps should be taken by way of prescribing rules for the guidance of members in this connection. After some discussion on the point it was referred to the legislative Committee without a motion.

Report of Credentials Committee

Dr. Tory presented the report of the Credentials Committee and the list of names of those who were qualified for the Ad. Eundem Degree. He said that there was some doubt as to the qualifications of Rev. Bishop Pritchard and Mr. C. F. P. Combeare, as they appeared to only have honorary degrees. The Committee recommended however, that these two degrees be granted,

and that an honorary degree of L.P.D. be conferred upon His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, and Hon. A. B. Rutherford, and that an honorary degree of D. C. L. be conferred upon Hon Chief Justice Sifton. The Committee also recommended that His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. Dr. Rutherford, and Hon Chief Justice Sifton, Hon. Mr. Chancellor Stuart and Hon^{rs} Justice Beck be presented individually for their degrees.

President Tary presented the report of the building & Grounds Committee. The report was to the effect that a gang of men had been placed at work clearing a portion of the University grounds of all brush and timber, and that some informal conversation and correspondence had been exchanged between himself and the Deputy Minister of Public Works regarding plans etc for the University buildings. The report recommended that the work of "brushing" be allowed to be continued and that the Committee be permitted to continue its labors. These recommendations

were adopted by the Senate on Motion of Messrs Hutchings & Beck.

Finance Committee's report

Finance Committee's Report

The Finance Committee's report was presented by the President. The report showed total receipts from all sources amounting to \$15,024.38 and expenditures to date amounting to \$10,244.29, leaving a cash balance in the bank of \$4,780.09. The report showed an expenditure for the Academic ^{Year} ending June 30th 1908 of \$3,420.00 and an expenditure to date for the Academic Year 1908-9, including salaries to the end of the year, of \$22,100.00. In view of the fact that there are still some unpaid outstanding accounts and additional equipment to be purchased, the report recommended that Dr. Lory be authorized to spend up to \$25,000 the amount originally estimated for the Academic Year 1908-9 which will close on June 30th 1909.

This recommendation was adopted on Motion of Messrs McDougall and Hutchings.

The report further showed an estimated expenditure for the Academic Year 1909-10 of \$30,000.00 computed as follows:-

Dr. Torg reported progress for the Executive Committee in connection with the selection of a Coat of Arms, and requested that the Committee be permitted to continue its labors. A similar report was presented from the Legislative Committee, both requests being granted without a motion.

College Colors.

The Committee on College Colors presented their report which recommended the adoption of Green & Gold as the University Colors. The report was adopted on motion of Messrs Ferris and Nolan and on the suggestion of Mr. Justice Beck, the Secretary was instructed to embody in the Minutes the reasons why these particular Colors were adopted and their particular adaptability to the Province of Alberta.

"The Choice of Colors for the University accepted at this meeting - Green & Gold - are peculiarly adapted for the purpose for which they have been accepted. The Choice of this beautiful and at the same

Time infrequent combination was based on ^{an} appropriate Symbolism - The Green representing the wide stretches of Verdant prairie-land flanked by the deep Spruce forests of the Province - while the Gold prefigures the Golden Harvest fields that are Alberta's boast. Referring back to the old accepted Symbolism of colors, the choice was still found to have been made with discerning art; for Green there ^{is} the Symbol of hope; of joyous optimism, and Gold of the shining light of knowledge. Both are certainly particularly apposite to the "New University".

Faculty's Report on Scholarships
The President presented the Faculty's report on Scholarships. On account of the fact that very few of the Students were able to present complete Certificates on entering the University only one Student had written on the Scholarship Matriculation Examinations, this being Mr. Charles F. Reilly of Calgary. A. John A. McDougall Scholarship of \$100⁰⁰ had accordingly been awarded to him. The Faculty respectfully recommended that the donors of the Scholarships be asked to allow their gift to remain for future competition. To this suggestion Messrs. Rutherford and McDougall agreed. The report was adopted on Motion of Messrs. Ferris and Nolan.

Dr. Ferris moved seconded by Dr. Riddell that the Scholarship

won by Mr. Reilly be publicly presented to him at the meeting of Convocation during the afternoon. - Carried -

President Lory reported that there are now 39 Students enrolled and in Actual Attendance at the University. The Faculty's report on the Courses of Study proposed to be adopted, was presented by the President. The various Courses of Study offered by the different Professors were outlined by President Lory and generally discussed by the Senate. The Programme generally meeting with the Senate's approval.

The Committee on College Affiliation presented their report through the President. The report recommended the adoption of a general regulation providing for the acceptance of Students from any College of recognized merit who produced the necessary proof of qualification and intellectual standing. It being generally understood however, that this method would only be a temporary expedient, pending the adoption of regular rules. The method too, would be subject to change at any time on the recommendation of the Senate.

The report was adopted without a motion.

Dr. Lory addressed the Senate regarding the affiliation of Western Canada College, and related a conversation he had had with Dr. Hede Ræe in the matter. Dr. Lory recommended

that a Committee be appointed to deal with the question.

It was moved by Messrs Riddell and Ferris that a Committee consisting of the Chancellor, President Tory, the Vice Chancellor and Messrs Nolan and Riddell be appointed to deal with the whole question of the recognition of Preparatory Schools and the Affiliation of ^{preparatory} Colleges Generally, and that such Committee report to the Senate at a future meeting. - Carried -

Moved by Messrs Galbraith and Nolan that the finance Committee be authorized to arrange with the Secretary for a continuance of his services as such and to arrange a basis of remuneration for such services and for those already rendered. - Carried -

President Tory asked the Senate for an expression of opinion on the question of opening Convocation with some form of Prayer. He said it was customary in other Universities to open Convocation with some simple form of Divine Petition and personally he was strongly in favor of introducing the practice in the University of Alberta. Judge Beck approved of the idea conditionally - firstly that he should have an opportunity of reading the form of prayer before it is used, and secondly that it should be said by an officer of the University. It was moved by Messrs Riddell & Beck

that Convocation be opened with a recitation of the Lord's Prayer by the Chancellor and closed with the Singing of the National Anthem by all present, and that the Executive Committee be authorized to draft a form of prayer to be used on future occasions - Carried -

Dr. Riddell addressed the Senate regarding the date fixed for holding the University Matriculation examinations and expressed the belief that an earlier date should be set. In many other Universities the examinations are held at a much earlier date, and as many of the students, and especially those who contemplate entering the Ministry are dependent upon their own earnings to put them through the University, he thought they should be given as much time as possible during the Summer Season in which to earn money. This could only be done in one way and that was by fixing the date of the examinations early in the Season. On Dr. Long's suggestion the question was referred to the Faculty with power to act for the present year, pending the selection of a permanent fixed date.

Convocation

It was decided by the Senate, without a motion that at the meeting of Convocation to be held during the afternoon the election of officers would be deferred until a future meeting. Meeting adjourned - 12.45 P.M.

The fourth meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was held in the Court Room in the City of Calgary on Thursday June 10th 1909, Chancellor Stuart presiding. The members of the Senate present being Messrs Jory, Harcourt, Brett, Rutherford, Nolan, Beck, McCall, Boyd, Ferris, Russell and Gaez. Those absent were Messrs M. Dougall, Jenkins, Strath, Kennedy and Huthings. The meeting was called to order by the Chancellor at 4.30 P.M. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Discipline
Committee

The report of the Executive Committee was presented by President Jory. The Executive's recommendation regarding the appointment of a Discipline Committee was adopted and on motion of Messrs Russell and Talbot a Committee composed of the President, Vice Chancellor, the Dean of each faculty or one member appointed by each faculty until such time as the Deans are appointed, and Dr. Ferris as representing the Senate, were appointed as a discipline Committee. It was agreed that the Professor shall exercise the right of discipline in the Class room to the extent of Suspension from the Class; that the Faculty shall have power to Suspend from Classes in the University, impose fines etc; and that the

Power of expulsion shall lie with the discipline Committee.

Charter Day.

The Executive's Recommendation regarding the adoption of May 9th of each year as "Charter day" was agreed to, and in future this date, which marks the Lieutenant-Governor's Assent to the University Act, will be fittingly celebrated in a manner to be decided upon by the faculty.

On motion of Messrs Galbraith and Harcourt, Prof Edwards was invited to become a member of the Building and Grounds Committee.

The establishment of a department of Civil and Municipal Engineering under the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, and the appointment of Professor Edwards as Professor of Civil and Municipal Engineering as recommended by the Executive Committee, was approved by the Senate.

Sites for
Denominational
Colleges

The Executive's Recommendation that the principle of offering adequate sites for denominational colleges on the University grounds was adopted with the following proviso: That leases shall be for a period of 99 years; the buildings to be taken over at a valuation to be settled

by arbitration in the event of dissatisfaction arising; the plan and character of buildings to be in accordance with the General University scheme and that the Executive and building Committee's recommendations be submitted to the Senate for ratification before being acted upon.

Extension Lectures
On Motion of Messrs Brett and Ridgell the Executive Committee's report recommending the advisability of making extension lectures a separate part of the University work, was adopted.

Distribution of fees
On Motion of Messrs Ridgell and Galbraith the finance Committee was authorized to disburse the fees collected for extension lectures this year amongst the Professors who participated therein; and that plans and details for a continuance of the work during next year be prepared and presented to the next meeting of the Senate by the Executive Com.

Hospital Scheme
The Executive Committee's recommendation regarding the setting apart of a site on the University grounds for hospital purposes and the acceptance of a sum of \$100,000 from the City of Strathcona for the construction of a hospital was explained at length by Pres. Lory.

Dr. Galbraith expressed himself as opposed to the scheme if the City of Strathcona were to govern the hospital. Dr. Ferris favored the scheme providing the hospital were governed by a Union board composed of an equal number of representatives of the Municipality and the University. Dr. Brett thought the question was outside the functions of the University and expressed the opinion that in the event of the University affiliating itself with the City of Strathcona in a hospital scheme, sectional ~~prejudices~~ prejudices would arise and the hospital boards throughout the province would demand similar treatment.

Judge Beck thought that in years to come the scheme might prove impracticable and that a strictly University hospital should be built. In any case the University would be morally indebted to the City of Strathcona to the extent of \$100,000 and in the event of dissatisfaction arising that amount would have to be repaid. Dr. Boyd opposed the scheme and favored its further consideration postponed until a later date. Dr. Riddell spoke favoring the project and the debate was brought to a close by the adoption of the following motion

The meeting resumed at 8.30. P.M. Pres. Jory outlined the Executive's ideas regarding a General Scheme for future expansion of the work of the University. The Scheme included a faculty of Arts of ~~arts~~ and Science including Arts proper, Applied Science and Education. A faculty of Agriculture. A faculty of Medicine. A faculty of Law. That plans for building in the immediate future include

- (a) A main building to serve
 1. The faculty of Arts and Science
 2. The faculty of Agriculture
 3. A system of Laboratories where research in all departments of work of value to the Province may be carried on. A residence for men, Residence for women and a library.

That the organization of the faculty of Agriculture be undertaken forthwith so as to be open for classes in the Session of 1910-1911. It was

also recommended that ^a Committee be appointed to confer with the Judges of the Supreme Court and the Law Society with a view of securing Co-operation between the Law Society and the University in framing a Course for Students at Law and in the Conduct of examinations. The appointment of a similar Committee to confer with the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons to secure, if possible, Co-operation between them and the University was also suggested.

*Faculty
of Agriculture*

With reference to the establishment of the Faculty of Agriculture in connection with the other faculties under the direction of the University, Dr. Torg explained that the whole trend of Modern Scientific Agricultural training is tending to a closer connection with University education and cited many instances where the mistakes of the past are being rectified by bringing the various Agricultural Colleges completely under the direction and control of the State Universities.

Dr. Galbraith favored the establishment of the Agricultural College in connection with and as part of the University providing a Secondary System of High School Agricultural instruction is established.

at other points throughout the province and that this latter phase of the question be fully explained to the public at large.

The Chancellor endorsed the Supplemental System of Schools advocated by Dr. Galbraith and expressed the belief that the utmost means should be adopted of imparting to the ~~public~~ agricultural community generally the work being done in the College. Messrs McBaig, Nolan, Russell^{Harcourt} and Galt also spoke favoring the establishment of the faculty in agriculture.

On motion of Messrs Russell and Ferris it was resolved to proceed at once to the establishment of a faculty of Agriculture on the lines advocated by the Executive Committee.

The sixth meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta was held in the Faculty room, November 19th 1909.

The meeting was called to order at 10.0'clock, A.M. Mr. Chancellor, Stuart presiding. The following members of the board were present: Messrs. Rutherford, McDougall, Ferris, Harcourt, Gatty, Nolan, Pres. Tory, Beck, Hutchings, Boyd, Riddell, Brett and Galbraith. Those absent were Messrs. Jenkins and Strathy.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Treasurer McDougall presented an Audited Statement of the receipts and expenditures for the financial year 1908-9, which closed June 30th 1909. The Statement showed a total expenditure on Capital and Current account of \$25,712.⁶³/₁₀₀ and receipts from all sources amounting to \$31,630.⁷⁴/₁₀₀, leaving a balance on hand at the beginning of the year 1909-10 of \$5,917.⁷⁴/₁₀₀. The report was adopted on motion of Messrs. McDougall and Ferris.

Pres. Tory presented a report from the Finance Committee recommending-

- (a) The confirmation of the purchase of a set of the Annalen der Chemie, and
- (b) The payment of the travelling expenses of members of the faculty in attending conventions in the Province of an educational character.

The former recommendation was approved on motion of Messrs. Nolan and Ferris and the payment of

any outstanding accounts for travelling expenses was agreed to.

Pres. Torg was requested to consult with the department of Education with a view of arranging a basis of Co-operation for defraying the expenses of Members of the faculty in attending future Teachers Conventions.

The report of the building and Grounds Committee was presented by Pres. Torg, together with a set of Ground plans and a sketch of the proposed Arts building. The various phases of the plans were explained by President Torg and also by Mr. Jeffers the Provincial Architect who was present by invitation of the board. At the conclusion of a General discussion the plans were adopted by the acceptance of the following resolution. Moved by Messrs Beck & Hutchings. "That having considered the report of the building and Grounds Committee the Senate approves of the plans of the Arts building submitted, to be built of Stone and fireproof throughout; The basement and the main entrance to the height of one story of Granite and the remainder of Sand or lime Stone; The work to be done by the department of Public works in accordance with their expressed consent; That the Committee confer with the Government with regard to means and the procuring of material and it is now recommended that Convocation

Hall basement walls one story high
 and the north wing be first under-
 taken: That the building and grounds
 Committee submit to the next meeting
 of the Senate a plan of a permanent
 building which will eventually be
 used as a Students' residence but
 temporarily as class rooms,
 together with an estimate of the
 cost and plans for the necessary
 means, it being the opinion of
 this meeting that such a building
 should be undertaken as soon as
 possible - Carried -

The application of the
 Methodist denomination for a site on
 the University grounds for their
 Theological College was received.
 The question of the amount of ground
 to be given to Theological Colleges generally,
 was discussed at length. The question
 being under discussion when an
 adjournment was made at 1.0 O'clock
 of one hour for luncheon.

The meeting re-assembled
 at 2.0 O'clock the debate on the
~~Theological~~^{denominational} College sites being
 continued. Dr. Riadell, who was
 absent from the morning session,
 was now present and explained
 to the meeting the position of his
 denomination. On motion of Messrs
 Ferris and Hutchings the following
 resolution was adopted.

"That the application of the
 Methodist Church, through Dr. Riadell
 for a site on the University grounds
 for its denominational college, be
 received and that there be granted

for this purpose a site South of the continuation West of Seventh Avenue North, extending South to the continuation West of 5th Av. North, with a frontage on the said continuation West of Seventh Avenue North extending half way between 8th Street West and College Avenue, as the latter may be ultimately located, such width being not less than 450 feet; and that a lease be granted under the terms of the previous Minute applicable to the case providing for the occupation by the University, otherwise than by building, of such portion of the area granted as may not be in the meantime required by the Methodist Church, and that the lease be drawn under the direction of the building and Grounds Committee and signed by the proper officers of the University - carried.

Dr. Tory read some correspondence that had been exchanged between himself and the Presbyterian denomination respecting a site for that denomination's College. On Motion of Messrs Nolan and Ferris, the action taken by Pres. Tory in the matter, was approved.

The question of permitting denominational Colleges to borrow money on their buildings on the University site, was brought to the attention of the Senate by

Dr. Read. The matter was referred to the Executive Committee for consideration.

The Faculty's report was presented by Pres. Torg, and adopted on motion of Messrs. Nolan Ferris. The report showed a total registration of 103 Students, 83 of whom are undergraduates, 11 Graduate Students and 9 Students Taking Special Courses.

At this juncture the Senate adjourned on motion of Messrs McDougall, and Hutchings, ^{until 7.30 P.M.} to permit the members to participate in the reception to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor marking the occasion of his first official visit to the University.

The meeting resumed at 7.30 P.M. The report of the Executive Committee being presented by Pres. Torg. The action taken by the Executive and Finance Committee respecting the commencement of Extension lectures was endorsed by the Senate on motion of Messrs Beck and Hutchings.

The Executive Committee's Report respecting the organization of the Agricultural College recommended the establishment of the following departments

- (a) Agronomy or Field husbandry.
- (b) Animal husbandry
- (c) Veterinary Science
- (d) Horticulture
- (e) Agricultural Engineering
- (f) Dairying
- (g) Bacteriology
- (h)

The report further recommended

the Completion of the establishment of the Faculty of Agriculture within the University at the earliest date possible and the inauguration of a System of extension Teaching throughout the Province under the direction of the faculty of Agriculture.

Hon. Dr. Rutherford announced to the meeting that as a result of a recent conference between the Ministers of Education of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta a decision had been arrived at whereby the three provinces would work in harmony with each other in the establishment of a System of High Schools in each province wherein Agricultural Instruction would be given greater prominence than has hitherto been given to it in the ordinary provincial Schools. These Schools would be affiliated with the University and would act as Secondary Schools in connection with the Agricultural College.

The Schools would be located in those sections of the Province not coming within the immediate scope of the Agricultural College and would be combined with demonstration farms where the Students could be given practical demonstrations in the Science of Agriculture. Provision would be made whereby Students taking a Course in the Schools and entering the Agricultural College, would be given a status in the College commensurate with their standing in the Schools.

This Statement from Dr. Rutherford was received with Satisfaction by the members of the Senate a number of whom asked for permission to make it public in their respective localities, to which Dr. Rutherford assented. The Executive recommendations were then adopted on motion of Messrs Beck and Brett.

On motion of Messrs Messrs Jory and Gaebraith it was resolved that the salary of deans be fixed at \$3,500 per year.

The Executive Committee's recommendation respecting amendments to the University Act were approved on Motion of Messrs Brett & Nolan. The understanding being that a draft of the proposed, ^{Act at} amended be first considered by the Senate before being presented to the Legislature.

The Executive's report respecting the method of reporting to the Executive Council, ^{for the current year} and the action taken to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Kennedy, was approved on motion of Messrs Beck and Hatchings.

The consideration of appointments to the Staff for the year 1910-11 was deferred until the next meeting of the Senate.

The question of providing residence accommodation for both the professors and students was discussed and on motion of Messrs Boyd and Hatchings the whole matter was referred to the Executive Committee with the request that a report outlining a general residential scheme

be presented to the next meeting of the Senate.

On Motion of Messrs Beck and Hutchings, Premier Rutherford and Pres. Jory were appointed a Committee to interview the Strathcona City Council for the purpose of getting permission to construct a spur line of the Street Railway to the C.P.R. tracks to facilitate the hauling of building material to the University grounds.

Pres. Jory was authorized to publish a photograph of the proposed University buildings in the newspapers with such a description of the general plans as he may see fit to furnish.

On Motion of Messrs Beck and Ferris the Public Works department was authorized to enter into a contract or contracts for the purchase of bricks and ^{such} other building material as may, in their opinion be required. Carried.

The faculty's report respecting the adoption of a University Coat of Arms, was left over for further consideration at the next meeting of the Senate, on the solicitation of Mr. Nolan, who expressed a desire to submit a model.

Before adjournment Hon. Dr. Rutherford submitted a summary of the school enrolment of the Province.

The figures showed the great expansion that had taken place during the past four years and foreshadowed to some extent the future prospects of the University from a student point of view. The members of the Senate generally, recognized the urgent necessity of securing increased accommodation at the earliest possible date.

The report showed receipts on current account of \$38,776.³⁵/₁₀₀ and Expenditures of \$33,300.⁷⁰/₁₀₀ leaving a Credit balance of approximately \$5,475.⁶⁵/₁₀₀. The report of the Finance Committee respecting the building account was also presented by the President. The

Report showed a total expenditure of \$65,276¹⁵. This amount had been met by the discounting of notes, personally guaranteed by the members of the Senate, amounting to \$60,000 and \$5,276¹⁵ paid out of the Current account.

"Whereas certain members of the Senate have personally obligated themselves to the Bank in the sum of \$60,000, and, whereas the the University Senate has agreed to lease a portion of the University site to various Theological Colleges, therefore be it resolved that the Senate respectfully request the Lieutenant-Governor in Council in whose name the University Site is now vested, to transfer the same to the University, thus furnishing security to the members assuming responsibility and enabling the Senate to legally lease the portion of the property which they have agreed to lease

Academic Costume

COURSES IN HONOURS.

Courses in Honours are offered to students in the Third and Fourth years. These courses are planned with a view to a measure of specialization, and are open only to students who have already displayed marked ability and maturity of judgment.

General Regulations.

- I. A student must begin his course in Honours in the Third Year and in order to graduate in Honours must continue his course through the Third and Fourth years.
- II. A student shall be admitted as a candidate for Honours only by permission of the faculty, upon the recommendation of the department in which the student wishes to take Honours. In general, no student will be considered unless he has in his second year attained Class I in the subject in which he wishes to take Honours, and further, unless he enters the third year without conditions in any subject.
- III. Students are in general expected to pursue work for Honours in only one subject, associating therewith two subjects from the pass courses. Students are permitted to take Honours in two subjects only, upon the consent of the departments involved, subject to approval by the Faculty.
- IV. A student applying as a candidate for Honours must submit his program of studies to the Committee on Honours. This Committee acting in conjunction with the head of the Department in which the student wishes to take Honours, will advise the student in regard to the selection of pass courses best adapted to supplement courses in Honours.
- V. The final examination for the second term of his fourth year shall be an oral examination dealing with his general knowledge of the subjects which constitute his work in the third and fourth years. This examination will be conducted by the members of the faculty under whom the candidate has been pursuing his courses. This oral examination may be supplemented by a written examination at the option of the department.
- VI. Honours are awarded in two grades:--
Summa cum laude, and
Cum laude.
- VII. A student in honours who fails to obtain a pass degree upon recomr

The Committee on Academic Costume recommends:--

1. That all gowns be of the customary Cambridge shape; i.e. for undergraduates a black stuff gown, not falling below the knee with round sleeve cut above elbow; for bachelors, a black stuff gown, falling below the knee with full sleeve cut to elbow and terminating in a point; for masters, a black stuff or silk gown falling below the knee with long sleeves with Semi-circular cut at bottom.

Scholarships and Prizes.

It was moved by the Honorable H.C. Taylor, seconded by Mr. D.S. McKenzie that the report of the Faculty regarding Scholarships and Prizes be adopted (see Class-lists for May 1911) Carried.

Gold Medal in Classics.

The President announced the donation by the Chancellor of a Gold Medal for Proficiency in Classics in the Final Year, available first to the Graduating Class of 1912.

Affiliation.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. McCaig "That a Committee of five (5) be appointed to deal with the question of affiliation according to the new Act respecting the University of Alberta, and that in the meantime Dr. S.W. Dyde, the newly appointed Principal of the Presbyterian College, be accorded a place on the Senate".

On motion of Messrs. McCaig and Taylor, Professor Alexander was appointed Master of Ceremonies for the procession of the day.

A request was received from Mr. Hoar, of Calgary, for a special examination for admission as an Alberta Land Surveyor.

Mr. Knight reported that ^{special} examinations coming up frequently were undesirable and had been reported against by the Council of the Alberta Land Surveyors. After some discussion, it was moved by Vice-Chancellor Beck, seconded by Mr. Harcourt: "That, an examination be held ^{on Friday, July 14, 1911,} in accordance with the provisions of subsection 2, section 25 of the Alberta Land Surveyors Act, for persons who are required to pass upon the statutes only, and that the Registrar of the A.L.S. be asked to acquaint applicants with this arrangement." Carried.

On motion of President Tory, seconded by Mr. D.S. McKenzie, the Registrar was authorized to issue the prescribed certificate to candidates who should obtain a mark of 75 (seventy-five) percent or over at this examination.

President Tory gave a short account of the progress being made in building projects, and the Senate adjourned at 12 o'clock noon.

Minutes of the Meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta held in the Faculty Room of Athabasca Hall on Thursday, December 14th, at 11 a.m. Chancellor Stuart was in the Chair. There were also present Messrs. Rutherford, Taylor, Tory, Alexander, Galbraith, McKenzie, Dyde, Harcourt, Riddell and McCaig, and the Registrar.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read. It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by H. C. Taylor that the Minutes be adopted as read.

The Committee on Affiliation reported progress and planned to meet shortly when the Chancellor should be in Edmonton.

The Recommendations of the Faculty were then discussed.
Recommendation (1) —

It is recommended that the subjects of study of the First Year be amended giving the students the choice of any two languages: Latin, Greek, French and German.

It was moved by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. McKenzie, that Recommendation (1) be adopted to go into force in 1913. Carried.

The question of putting Hebrew on as an optional language was raised by Dr. Riddell and the need of meeting the requirement of quite a number of students.

It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by H. C. Taylor, that the Board of Governors be requested to provide for the teaching of Hebrew, and a Committee be appointed to bring in a report as to the need. Carried.

The President, and Principals Riddell and Dyde were named the Committee.

That the subjects of study of the Second Year be amended by combining 3 and 4 under one head reading "the two languages selected in the First Year three hours each". See Calendar, p 24.

Recommendation (3) --

Agreed.

That on page 14 of the Calendar under Group B for Matriculation that 7 and 8 be combined to read "two of the following: French, German, Greek, Elementary Science (Physics or Chemistry)".

Recommendations (2) and (3) were adopted with same understanding i.e. that they come into force in 1913.

Recommendation (4) --

It is further recommended that the subject of Education be added to the course of study of the Third and Fourth Years adding it under Group A Senior Courses, p. 24; also that the subject of Psychology be added to the same Group; and that the Board of Governors be asked to make provision for the teaching of the same.

Recommendation (4) was presented in two sheets. Sheet (2) was intended for information only, and as tentative until a thorough discussion was conducted with the Education Department. Mr. McKenzie spoke in favor of complete postponement of professional training until the conclusion of the non-professional course in the University.

The idea as brought out by addresses by President Tory, Mr. McCaig, Principal Dyde and others was to give a philosophical course for Education in keeping with the Historical training for Law and the Science training for Medicine.

It was moved by Mr. McCaig, seconded by Mr. Harcourt, that Recommendation (4) be adopted. Carried.

Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the University of Alberta, held at the Senate, held at 8 p.m. on Monday, April 1st, 1912, in the chambers of Mr. Justice Beck in Edmonton. Those present were Chancellor Stuart in the chair, Vice-Chancellor Beck, President Tory, Dr. Rutherford, Mr. McCaig and the Registrar.

Arrangements for the Alberta Land Surveyors examination were first discussed. It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by President Tory, that the name of A. P. Patrick of Calgary be added to the list of examiners. Carried. This makes the complete list of examiners for Land Surveyors as follows: Messrs. R. H. Knight, R. W. Cautley, L. C. Charlesworth, A. P. Patrick, W. M. Edwards and E. W. Sheldon.

The arrangements for Dental Examinations were then discussed. It was understood that there would be six examination papers as follows: Dental Anatomy and Anatomy; Chemistry and Metallurgy; Histology and Physiology; Materia Medica, Therapeutics and Dental Medicine; Dental Surgery and Pathology; Anaesthetics, etc. The examiners which the Executive recommends to the Senate for appointment are Drs. Whittaker, Callum, Jamieson, Doyle, Roberts, Courtice and Holt.

Some discussion took place as to the preliminary education required of a dentist, and it was thought that this should be equivalent to the Matriculation of the University of Alberta.

It was moved by Dr. Tory, seconded by Mr. McCaig, that in so far as the examinations for various branches of Medicine are common subjects that there be the same papers and examiners, and that there be special examiners and papers in the Principles and Practice of Osteopathy and Homeopathy respectively.

In this connection it should be noted that members of the

Osteopathical Association had suggested that they be granted separate papers in Gynaecology and Obstetrics as well as in the Principles and Practice of Osteopathy.

It was moved by Dr. Tory, seconded by Dr. Rutherford, that for the present examination we adopt the same list of approved schools and colleges as heretofore recognized by the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the Alberta Dental Association respectively, with the proviso that the Executive of the Senate may decide on any new cases on their merits.

It was also resolved that for the current examination for Osteopaths we accept candidates who come from schools or Colleges recognized by the American Osteopathic Association as provided in Section 9 of the Medical Act of last session.

It was thought wise to make no change in the examination fee as heretofore charged. This was understood to be fifty dollars in the case of both the Dental and Medical examination. Fees for licenses to practice will still be paid to the Associations issuing the licenses. The fee for registering Osteopaths under Section 9 of the Medical Act was fixed at ^{ten}~~five~~ dollars payable to the Registrar of the University.

"That the Senate authorize a Department of Extension in connection with the University" - Carried.

Re midwifery.

Dr. Galbraith brought up the subject of midwifery and moved, seconded by Principal Riddell, as follows: -

That, whereas the matter of the practice of midwifery, ~~the control~~ has by the recent amendments to the Medical Profession Act, been placed under the control of this Senate, and

Whereas a great proportion of the married women of Alberta are young and within the child-bearing age, and many of them living at long distances from competent nurses or medical attendants, and

Whereas the Act excludes the area within ~~the~~ the limits of any city, town or village in which a medical practitioner resides, from the provisions applying to the practice of midwifery - an arrangement that will expose patients to the dangers of unskilled help in time of need -

Therefore, be it resolved that it is expedient in order that this normal function be surrounded with all the aids available, and freed from ~~the~~ many of the hardships and unfortunate results which sometimes accompany

and follow it, that this Senate make arrangements for a course in midwifery along the lines (so far as local conditions warrant) of the British midwives bill, and that a committee of this Senate, half of whom shall be medical men, be appointed by the Chancellor to bring in a report ^{on the details of such a scheme to} ~~at~~ the meeting of the Senate next after the summer vacation, and further, that the Provincial Government be memorialized as to the desirability of establishing and maintaining suitable maternity hospitals in appropriate districts to permit of the proper carrying out of this work. Carried.

The Chancellor named Doctors Galbraith and Boyd to act in conjunction with the President and the Chancellor on this Committee.

Delegates to the Congress of the Universities appointed. The Chancellor, the President, Dr. Rutherford and Dr. Fairley were then appointed official delegates to the Congress of the Universities of the Empire, the President being authorized to appoint a substitute in place of any one of these unable to go.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Prof. Alexander, and carried, that the proposed arrangement with the Alberta Association of Architects be accepted as read. The agreement here follows:-

Memorandum of the Agreement between the Alberta Association of Architects and the University of Alberta with respect to the conduct of Examinations. *May 14th 1912*

I. Preliminary Examinations.

The preliminary examination shall be of Matriculation standing in English, Mathematics, Physics, French or German, and in addition Free-hand, Geometrical and Model Drawing (the Freshman year of the Faculty of Applied Science will be accepted in lieu of this.)

II. Conduct of Examinations.

The examination shall be conducted by the University Examining Board appointed by the Senate of the University. The representatives on the Examining Board from the Alberta Association of Architects shall be nominated by the President of the Association of Architects and the President of the University conjointly.

III. Fees.

It is agreed that an amendment will be sought to the Act incorporating the Association of Architects allowing the fee for the examination to be adjusted by the Senate consistent with the cost of the examination.

IV. As stipulated in the University Act, it is understood that the Council of the Architects Association shall elect one representative to the University Senate, who will become a member of the Senate Executive.

V. It is further agreed that the certificate of the Registrar of the University shall be the evidence necessary that the student has passed the preliminary examinations and further where a candidate for the final examination applies for exemption for a part of the examination, the right to exemption shall be decided by the Alberta Association of Architects.

B E T W E E N:

The Governors of the University of
Alberta, a body corporate, incor-

porated by Chapter 7 of the Statutes of the Province of Alberta passed in the Second Session of the year 1910, (hereinafter referred to as "the University")

-- Of the First Part;

- and -

The Law Society of Alberta, a body corporate, incorporated by Chapter 20 of the Statutes of the Province of Alberta, passed in the year 1907, (hereinafter referred to as "the Society")

-- Of the Second Part.

WITNESSETH: That the parties hereto hereby covenant and agree each with the other as follows:-

1. The University shall, twice in each year, hold for the students of the Society examinations corresponding to the examinations now conducted by the Society, namely, - First Intermediate, Second Intermediate and Final Examinations.
2. Such examinations shall be held upon such dates as may be agreed upon between the parties.
3. Such examinations shall be held at Edmonton and Calgary and at such other places as the University may select.
4. The examinations shall be upon the books and subjects upon which the Society's examinations are now conducted and changes in such books and subjects may be made with the consent of both parties.
5. The University may make regulations with regard to the notice to be given by candidates proposing to present themselves for examination and with regard to the fees payable for such examination and with regard to the conduct thereof, such regulations, before the same come into force, to be communicated to and approved by the Society.
6. The selection by the University of the persons to be charged with the preparation of and marking of the examination papers shall be subject to the approval of the Society.
7. The University shall, within two months after each examination, make a full report to the Society of the percentage of marks on each subject secured by each candidate.
8. This agreement shall be deemed to be an agreement pursuant to Section 34, sub-section 3 of "The University Act", Chapter 7 of the Statutes of Alberta, 1910, Second Session.
9. This agreement shall come into force on the first day of January, 1913, and shall continue in force from year to year unless either party before the first day of July in each year gives a notice in writing of its desire to terminate the same on the thirty-first day of December in such year.

Minutes of the Meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta held in the Faculty Room in Assiniboia Hall on Friday afternoon, March 28th, 1913, at four o'clock.

Chancellor Stuart presided. There were also present President Tory, Doctors Rutherford, Alexander, Coffin, Boyd, Whittaker and Messrs. Bishop, MacKenzie, Harcourt, Dickson, Knight and the Registrar.

The Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted on motion of Dr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Bishop.

The Committee on the Law Course reported through the President and presented the curriculum now in operation. The report was received and the Committee discharged on motion of Messrs. Rutherford and Bishop.

The President reported that the Board had authorized the establishment of a Pre-medical year and the two following years, to begin this year after details had been worked out and again referred to the Board.

It was moved by Dr. Boyd, seconded by Mr. Dickson, that the Board of Governors be requested to seek an arrangement with the College of Physicians and Surgeons whereby their co-operation, financial and otherwise, may be obtained in establishing Medical teaching. Carried.

The Senate asked what steps were taken concerning their request for a teaching building, and some time was taken to examine and discuss the plans prepared by the architects for the grounds and the next two buildings, viz. the third Residence building and the Main building.

Professor Alexander then presented the report of the Faculty. It showed that the total registration in the five years was as

The meeting adjourned at 7.15.

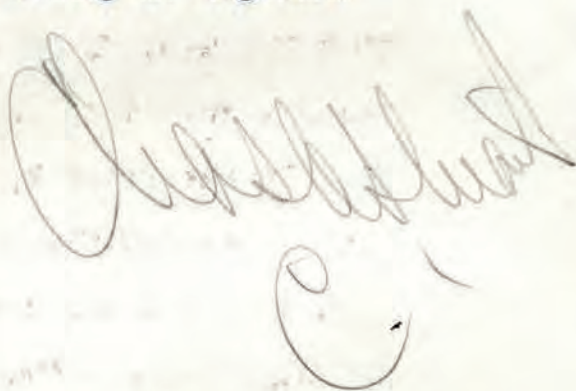

The Report of the Scrutineers was received and put in the Minutes.

It was suggested that with the permission of the Board of Governors, the Registrar in sending out notices calling for nominations for the Senate should request that the consent of the nominee should be obtained in writing on the nominating paper before his name should be printed on the ballot.

The Faculty recommended that the following be the degrees of the University of Alberta: B.A., M.A., B.Sc., M.Sc., M.D., LL.D., LL. B. and D.D.S.; and that where ad eundem degrees are granted by the University the degree must be the one equivalent thereto, selected from the above list.

It was moved by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Dr. Dyde, that the recommendation of the Faculty regarding granting of degrees be accepted with the elimination of the exclusiveness by omitting the word "the" in the phrase "following be the degrees, etc." Carried.

The time of the LL. B. examinations, being wholly under the control of the University, was left with the President to adjust.

It was moved by Dr. Riddell, seconded by Dr. Whittaker, that the recommendation of the Faculty "that Green and Buff be the Faculty Colors for Dentistry" be accepted. Carried.

The Registrar presented the correspondence with the Government regarding the amendment to the Dental Act. The Senate decided that nothing more could be done at the present time and ordered the correspondence filed until a Dental Faculty should be organized.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Galbraith, that the whole question of examinations in Osteopathy and of the qualifications for, and limitations of, the

practice of Osteopathy be left to a Committee consisting of the Chancellor, the President, Mr. MacKenzie and Dr. Brett, to confer with the Osteopath representatives and report to the Senate, and that for the next examination all persons be admitted to examination who are graduates of a college of Osteopathy recognized by the American Osteopathic Association, but that the subjects of their examination and their limitations of practice be subject to the decision of the Senate on the report of this Committee. Carried.

Mr. Bishop's letter.

"I wish to establish a fellowship in the University of Alberta, in memory of my eldest child, to be known as the Lloyd Hartnoll Bishop Memorial Fellowship in English Literature, and to be given to the graduating student in each year, who, during his undergraduate course, has shown unmistakable evidence of ~~creative~~ literary ability. I am prepared to pay over to the University at some future date, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), as an endowment fund for this fellowship, and in the meantime, to pay over the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) on each occasion that the fellowship is granted. The establishment of this fellowship is to be on the express condition that the nomination for the fellowship is, for the present, to be made by the head of the Department of English, to the Faculty for submission to the Senate. I reserve to myself the privilege of substituting for this arrangement a Committee of three, consisting of the President of the University, the head of the Department of English, and the head of the Department of Classics, (or in the event of this department being divided, the head of the Department of Greek).

I would be pleased to be advised at your convenience of your decision in regard to this proposal."

As a report from the Committee appointed to meet the Osteopaths, the Registrar read the minutes of the conference held at the Court House in Edmonton on October 22nd, 1913.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Judge Taylor, that the agreement as suggested in the Minutes read be adopted as follows:

1. That the preliminary education required for osteopaths should be equivalent to Matriculation into the University of Alberta, the same as for Medicine;

3. That the examination be in the following subjects: Anatomy, Physiology, Hygiene and Public Health, Pathology and Bacteriology, Midwifery and Gynaecology, Minor Surgery and Diagnosis for Surgical Operations, and Theory and Practice of Osteopathy; and that the certificate contain the right to apply for license to practice Midwifery and Gynaecology, and Minor Surgery.

On the suggestion of the Vice-Chancellor the following was added to section 2 --

or, if having only taken a course of three years, they have been bona fide engaged in the active practice of Osteopathy for not less than three years previous to January 1st, 1915.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Whittaker, that the matter of a Dental Department be left over for one year. Carried.

Pharmaceutical Association. The President reported further negotiations with the Pharmaceutical Association, and read a letter dated April 2nd, 1914, covering suggested terms of an agreement. He reported that the Board of Governors had authorized the establishment of this Course.

Dr. Kerr then reported for the Faculties as follows:
To the Chancellor and Senate of the University of Alberta.
Gentlemen:

As a Faculty representative on this body I have the honor to submit for your information a report dealing with the attendance, scholarship and discipline of the students registered in this University.

Attendance.

The University has only been in operation six years and it will not therefore take too long to recapitulate the registration during this period.

It will be noticed in the six years under review that the enrolment has increased almost one thousand per cent -- to be quite correct 962 per cent.

Some scrutiny of the distribution under various categories of this total of 433 students may not be without interest.

Two years ago the number of students in proportion to the number of instructors gave a ratio of 13 to 1; in 1912-13 the relation was 13.5 to 1; if the Law students, who are taught by a special group of instructors, be deducted from the total registration it will be found that the 337 students of the three Faculties of Arts and Sciences, Applied Science, and Medicine are taught by 23 instructors, yielding a ratio of practically 12 to 1. There is no doubt that one of the fundamental conditions of efficient teaching lies in the keeping of classes so small

that the human relationship between teacher and taught remains intimate, easy and personal. In this critical educational regard the University of Alberta would appear to be maintaining the excellent standard which she set herself at the outset. This seems to me to be distinctly a matter for congratulation.

A religious census reveals in an interesting light the way the various denominations are represented in our student body:

These figures indicate that relative to their numbers in the community the various churches are proportionately represented in our student body -- which is only another way of saying that the Provincial University has equally the confidence of all shades of religious opinion and, while not preponderatingly representing any one, with marked proportional equality represents them all.

There are few subjects of more vital interest or fundamental importance to our national life than the much discussed one of the composition of the population of Western Canada. We are constantly being told that our native British stock is being overwhelmed by the foreign inrush. We are none of us unconcerned about this question,

but a scrutiny of the ethnic genesis of our student body yields no alarmist results:

In other words 86 % of our students are British, 11 % are American, 3 % other scattered nationalities. The outlook for the native Canadian -- at least for that class being trained for leadership, -- hardly looks ominous yet.

Addresses of Students.

Since her foundation the University of Alberta has made every conscious effort to be an institution of provincial appeal. Her duty is to the Province and she wishes to draw students from every section of the Province. How far this ambition is being realized and how far the province is responding as a whole by sending her sons to the Provincial University may be judged from the following partial list of students' addresses culled from those on file in the Registrar's office:

Grande Prairie, Edson, Morinville, Edmonton, Vegreville, Mannville, Wetaskiwin, Camrose, New Norway, Jarrow, Viking, Irma, Delburne, Ponoka, Lacombe, Sedgewick, Castor, Red Deer, Olds, Bowden, Didsbury, Innisfail, Crossfield, Calgary, Spring Bank,

Bankhead, Medicine Hat, Stavely, Okotoks, High River, Claresholm, Macleod, Lethbridge, Taber, Raymond.

It would be tedious to extend the list. As a matter of fact the 310 students giving home addresses in Alberta come from 61 distinct communities in the Province.

This institution can fairly then call itself the Provincial University, when, within the confines of Alberta, it claims students from a region bounded by Grande Prairie, Edson, Bankhead, Raymond, Taber, Medicine Hat, Castor, Mannville, and Morinville.

One hundred and twenty-three students give home addresses outside Alberta. Every Province of Canada is represented:

Of our 433 students therefore, only 7 or $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ register a foreign address.

With respect to scholarship I think it is safe to assert that the teaching force is on the whole well satisfied with the

industry and accomplishment of the student body. The High Schools of the Province are now becoming thoroughly organized and efficient engines of instruction, and the University is beginning to receive students whose preparatory training is much better than that of a few years ago.

Owing to the system of frequent test examinations which has been in vogue since the institution first opened its doors our students are compelled to keep their reading steadily going throughout the year. Whilst these examinations entail a considerable burden on the staff there can be no doubt of their excellent results educationally, and that of course is the decisive point.

A somewhat important change in our examination system put into effect for the first time this session, deserves a word of reference. Having in mind the shortness of our Canadian University year, it was felt that the conducting of two final examinations, one in January and one in May, made too great inroads on the available teaching time, and in the sum of the year's work involved more loss than gain. The two-term system was therefore abandoned, and the one-term system adopted. While the final examinations for 1913-14 have not been held it is the opinion of the staff, I believe, that the elimination of the serious mid-year break has enabled more ground to be covered, and also to be covered more thoroughly.

With respect to discipline: Both in the Lecture-Room and generally an excellent tradition of discipline has been maintained through the past year. No serious case has arisen to cause trouble. The two or three difficulties which have presented themselves have been disposed of by the students' own self government machinery. It is to be hoped that this system will long continue to work satisfactorily.

In concluding may I express, as a representative here of the University Faculties, our deep sense of the interest, which

we feel to be always warm and sympathetic, shown by the Senate in the work of the teaching force? It is simply impossible to estimate how much this invariably kindly and cordial attitude on the part of the Senate contributes to stimulate and hearten the members of the Staff in the conscientious fulfilment of their daily duty.

It was moved by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Knight, that the report of the Faculties as presented by Dean Kerr be adopted, and that it be embodied in its entirety or practically so in the Press report given out of the present Senate Meeting, and that the publication of it be particularly asked of the Provincial Press. Carried.

The President reported for the Extension Department. The outstanding features were:

Over fifty travelling libraries have been sent out to 44 communities. These libraries have had, so far as reports have been received, a circulation of about 100, indicating that several thousands of people have been reached and served by them.

In the work of debating and public discussion a provincial High School debating league has been successfully organized, fifteen schools competing for the provincial championship, represented by a trophy presented by Hon. Dr. Rutherford. The championship was won by the Camrose High School. Material for debates has been sent into more than sixty communities, from points as far north as Grande Prairie, and as far south as Warner, as far east as Medicine Hat, and as far west as Lundebreck. A particularly noticeable feature has been the number of remote rural communities reached. In all, some 210 debating libraries have been sent out to 60 communities in which 75 organizations are at work.

An estimate of the number of people reached by the Extension work during the year is in the neighborhood of 25,000.

It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Bishop, that the report be adopted, a synopsis published, and that the Senate record its appreciation of the action of the Board in doubling the appropriation for this Department for next year. Carried.

The President reported the action of the Board regarding the proposed publication of a University magazine, probably to be called "The University of Alberta Review". It could be printed by the University Printing Department and circulated through the assistance of our Extension Department.

It was moved by Dr. Crang, seconded by Mr. Harcourt, that the Senate record its approval of the plan to publish a University magazine. Carried.

The Course in Military Instruction.

It was reported that the Board had approved of the offering of an optional course in Military training.

It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that the Senate approve of the establishment of a course of instruction in Military History, Tactics and Organization, as an optional course.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the course in Military Instruction be deferred until the Physical Instruction is more fully organized.

The amendment was lost and the motion carried.

A suggestion was offered in the form of a motion by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the President be asked to bring in a report on the question of a series of lectures on "Peace". Lost.

The President, however, thought that the topic was a good one to keep in mind in connection with the Extension lectures.

It was then reported that Law lectures had been arranged for in Calgary as well as in Edmonton.

The Registrar read the proposed agreement with the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Alberta, as follows:

as the Primary examination, shall be conducted, the re-
quirements being equivalent to Matriculation, in the sub-
jects of English, History and Mathematics - (Penmanship
being taken into account.)
3. Such examinations shall be held on such dates as
may be agreed upon between the parties.
4. Such examinations shall be held at Edmonton and
Calgary and at such other places as the University may select.
5. The examinations for the Intermediate and Final shall
be upon the books and subjects upon which the Institute's exam-
inations are now conducted, but changes in such books and subjects
may be made with the consent of both parties.
6. The Primary examination shall be upon the same texts as
required for Matriculation in Arts, but equivalent certificates
may be accepted by the University as exempting candidates from
this examination.
7. The University may make regulations with regard to the
notice to be given candidates proposing to present themselves for
such examinations and with regard to the fees payable for such
examinations and with regard to the conduct thereof.

8. The persons to be charged with the preparation of and marking of the examination papers shall be approved by the Senate of the University on the joint nomination of the President of the University and the Council of the Institute.

9. The University shall, within six weeks after each examination, make a full report to the Institute of the results of the examination.

10. The University agrees to make provision for instruction in Accounting as soon as it is found practicable.

11. This agreement shall be deemed to be an agreement pursuant to Section 34, sub-section 3, of the University Act, Chapter 7 of the Statutes of Alberta, 1910, Second Session, and to Section 8 of an Act to incorporate the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Alberta, Chapter of the Statutes of Alberta, 1910, Second Session.

12. This agreement shall come into force on the first day of January, 1914, and shall continue in force from year to year unless either party, before the first day of July in each year, gives notice in writing of its desire to terminate the same on the 31st day of December in such year. Such agreement is, however, subject to revision on consent of both parties.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Crang, that we enter into this agreement with the Institute of Chartered Accountants. Carried.

Calendar Material.

The dates in the Academic Calendar were approved with the exception of the dates for beginning examinations in Applied Science and in Law. These were left to the respective faculties for decision.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. MacKenzie, that the principle of double courses in B. A. and B. Sc. in Arts, Arts and Applied Science, Arts and Medicine, and Arts and Law, be approved by the Senate, the details to be left to the Faculties to arrange.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon.

On resuming at two o'clock, it was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. Harcourt, that the Senate adopt the recommendation of the Faculty of Applied Science regarding the establishment of a Department of Electrical Engineering. Carried.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Crang, that teaching in Accountancy be established, in evening courses, for the present, under either the Department of Economics or Mathematics. Carried.

It was agreed that a Department of Drawing and Descriptive Geometry be established.

The President presented a sketch of the proposed course of study for the first three years in Medicine (see Medical Faculty Minutes). This necessitated the establishment of Departments of Anatomy, Bacteriology and Physiology. The outline of the course with the establishment of these departments was approved on motion by Dr. Crang, seconded by Mr. Knight.

Election of Vice-Chancellor. On motion of Dr. Crang, seconded by Mr. Bishop, the Senate determined under Section 41, subsect. 20 of the University Act, that the election of the Vice-Chancellor should be for a period of four years.

It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by Mr. Knight, that the number on the Executive of the Senate be five. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Bishop, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, the President, Dr. Rutherford and Mr. Knight constitute the Executive. Carried.

It was understood that in any matter affecting any Faculty, or any of the affiliated societies, the dean of that Faculty or

the Senate representative of that Society should be invited to meet with the Executive.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. Knight, that the new courses of Mine Design and Ventilation, and Water Power Engineering be authorized. Carried.

The President outlined three proposed new courses in History. These were authorized.

Two new courses in Physics were also authorized, namely, Electrical Theory, and Radio-activity and Ionization.

The request of the Law Society was then considered, as contained on p. 10 of their printed summary of the Proceedings of the Twelfth convention of the Benchers, held at Calgary, on the 5th and 6th of January, 1914, "to prevent matriculant students-at-law from taking the LL. B. degree during the first three years of their enrolment as matriculant students so that upon such negotiations being concluded the Rules of this Society may be altered so as to provide for the admission as Barristers and Solicitors, after four years' enrolment of such matriculant students as during their whole four years have been in attendance at Lectures, and have successfully passed not only the Law Society's examinations but also the additional examinations provided by the University for the Degree of LL. B."

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Vice-Chancellor Beck, that we arrange to make our LL. B. a four years' course on the understanding that the Law Society will accept this degree as excusing an articulated student from the fifth year of his five years articles, (i.e. we approve of the principle contained in the 2nd paragraph on page 10 of the Summary of Proceedings, etc.), ^{4 Jan, 1914.} and that it be referred to a Committee with power to settle the entire matter with the Law Society. Carried.

The following Committee was then named, on motion of Dr. Rutherford and Mr. Harcourt, -- The Chancellor, the President,

the Vice-Chancellor, Mr. Ross and Mr. Bishop.

It was given as the opinion of the Senate that the degree of LL. B. May be given to any one, not an articulated law student, who takes the regular series of examinations covering four years of study.

The medal offered by Mrs. Ferris for competition amongst students in Modern Languages was accepted on motion of Mr. Harcourt, seconded by Mr. Knight, and the Registrar asked to convey the thanks of the Senate to the donor.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. Ross, that we add to the Committee on Student Affairs, the President of the Wauneita Society and the Advisor to Women Students, as ex officio members. Carried.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Galbraith, that we grant the usual certificates to Drs. C. H. Church, J. C. Eager, H. Hart, S. McGibbon, J. S. Macleod, D. H. Morris, E. A. Neff, R. R. Paul, L. A. Roy, W. E. Saunders, F. W. Weston, R. A. Worthington and A. M. Day, P. I. Dahl and A. Fettes. C'r'd.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Judge Taylor, that the following candidates be granted supplementals as recommended, viz.-- Drs. E. A. Ferguson, F. R. Gray, H. C. Swartzlander, Miss E. Brewster. Carried.

It was moved by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Dr. Riddell, that it is the judgment of the Senate that supplementals should not be granted on two major subjects. Carried.

It was moved in amendment, by Dr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Bishop, that the fee be \$20. Carried.

It was, however, agreed that the degree might be deferred on request.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Kerr, that the Department of Extension be a department of the University to

report direct to the Senate, and that the Committee on Extension as now constituted be a committee of management, the President having power to add to its number. Carried.

The President reported upon the work being done in the Faculty of Law, presenting the Law pamphlet under which we are now conducting lectures in both Edmonton and Calgary. He also explained the appointment of Dr. W. S. Scott as Adviser on Legal Studies, and W. Kent Power as Registrar of the Faculty in Calgary. It was explained that this course was not yet in its permanent arrangement, and it was understood that the Committee previously appointed (See p. 131) would, in conference with Messrs Scott and Power, carry on the arrangement to its completion, and report to the Senate at a subsequent meeting.

Oxford Affiliation. - The following letter was read by the Registrar:

From the Registrar of Oxford University to President Tory. "I am now able to reply definitely to your letter of June 6th. The Convocation of the University today passed the following decree, viz.

'That the University of Alberta be admitted to the privileges of Statt. Tit. ii. Sect. viii On Colonial and Indian Universities.'

I enclose two copies of the Statute in question."

It was noted with satisfaction that this would place our students on the same basis with Oxford, as enjoyed by students of Eastern Universities.

Dr. Kerr then read the following recommendation from the Faculty of Arts and Sciences:

"The University, being desirous of discontinuing the sub-collegiate work in the languages undertaken originally on account of the backward state of language teaching in the high

schools of the Province, intended to give notice that subsequent to September 1915, no student coming from a high school in which the languages were taught would be enrolled in the beginners' courses in the University. Unfortunately notice of this change of policy, through some oversight, was omitted from the current Calendar, and in order to be fair and not take the high schools unawares, it has been deemed expedient to postpone the coming into effect of this policy until Sept. 1916."

It was moved by Dr. Kerr, seconded by Dr. Dyde, that this be ratified. Carried.

The Report of the Department of Extension was then read by the Registrar, as follows:

1. EXTENSION LECTURES.

Applications for lectures have been received from 57 centres, for 55 of which courses have been definitely arranged, varying from two to four lectures in each course, and for the remaining two, arrangements are being made. It is likely that applications will be received from other centres in addition to these. In territory these range from Lloydminster, Coronation, Hughenden, and Medicine Hat on the east to Coleman and Edson on the west, and from Cardston in the south to 50 miles north of Edmonton on the north. A request has also been made that we send a lecturer at some time during the term to Peace River Crossing.

2. PRESS BULLETIN AND OTHER PUBLICATIONS.

The present circulation of the press bulletin is 410. It is being sent to heads of departments in the University, to members of Senate and the Board of Governors, to members of the Legislature, and to all the newspapers in the province, as well as to a number of other universities. A second edition of the bulletin of general information has also been published, and a bulletin designed to serve the members of the High School Debating League.

3. DEBATING AND PUBLIC DISCUSSION.

(a) Material for debaters has been prepared on over 20 subjects; 122 package libraries for debaters have been sent out since October 1st, a noticeable increase over the corresponding period for last year. There is a strong demand for material on subjects related to the war, such as Conscription vs. Voluntary Service, etc. The resources of the department are taxed to keep up with this demand.

(b) High School Debating League. 23 schools have entered for the debating contest. The Schedule has been drawn up, beginning December 11, and concluding March 19. The subject chosen is "The Consolidation of rural schools."

4. TRAVELLING LIBRARIES.

(a) At the present time 61 travelling libraries are in the field, distributed over all parts of the province, from Peace River Crossing in the north to Fishburn in the south, and from Sibbald on the East to Rollo, B.C. in the west. There are books available for two more libraries, and applications on file for ten. There is urgent need for increased appropriation in this department of the work.

(b) Lantern slide service.

In connection with the war, an arrangement has been made with Newton and Co., London, Eng., for a special lantern slide service, this at considerable outlay. Between 600 and 700 slides are now on hand, and most of them are in continuous use, both by our own lecturers and by various organizations to which they are being lent. This is proving one of the most popular departures yet made in connection with the work. Requests have been made by dairies for bacteriological slides, showing causes of infection in milk, etc., and also for slides on scientific and other subjects, such as geography and history. A necessary addition to this service is that of a number of lanterns, and a moving picture equipment. The opportunity for visual instruction through the department of extension appears to be almost unlimited, and should be vigorously taken

advantage of.

(c) Special service for amateur theatrical organizations.

Since the inception of the extension work there has been a demand for copies of short plays suitable for amateur talent in small towns and country districts. This year an endeavor has been made to meet this demand. An initial shipment of 30 plays was secured, and duplicates of these are urgently needed.

5. STAFF.

A Staff of four persons, a field secretary, an office secretary, and two stenographers, are giving their entire time to the extension work, with the cordial co-operation of the instructors. Judging by the development of the work, at least two additions to the staff will be necessary next term, one to take charge of the division of debating and public discussion, and one to take charge of the travelling libraries, besides more clerical help.

6. CORRESPONDENCE STUDY.

Inquiries are being received continually with regard to correspondence study. Owing to the pressure of work in the divisions already organized, and the lack of adequate staff and accommodation, it has been impossible even to consider undertaking any work of this nature. It ought, however, to have serious consideration in the immediate future.

7. CONCLUSION.

The number of fields open for extension work in Alberta is so large that the problem is one of choice rather than of looking for opportunities for service. The increasing appreciation shown all over the province of the work now being done offers the strongest encouragement for vigorously pushing organization and development.

The President showed samples of the packet libraries issued by the Extension Department, for the inspection of the Senate.

Dr. Coffin spoke to the question of extra-mural work.

The President thought that the time would soon come when the Univ.

should do some work by correspondence, -- whether University credits should be granted or not being a matter for consideration by this body.

Principal Dyde spoke of the need as shown by enquiries resulting from the work now being carried on by Robertson College in Theological and Preparatory work.

It was moved by Principal Dyde, seconded by Dr. Boyd, that we receive and adopt the report, express our appreciation of the work being done, and recommend to the favorable consideration of the Board of Governors the further expansion of this department. Carried.

Dr. Boyd spoke of the need of care regarding the transmission of disease through the circulation of these libraries.

*This class consists principally of theological students, enrolled in the affiliated theological colleges (Alberta and Robertson), who are taking one or two Arts subjects each year at the University. They must, of course, finally present complete matriculation, if they do not already possess it, to satisfy the requirements of their

respective denominations.

Other Business.

It was moved by Mr. Ford, seconded by Dr. Whittaker, that the motion regarding the fees to be charged in absentia be rescinded.

It was moved by Dr. Dyde, seconded by Vice-Chancellor Beck, in amendment that the motion be reconsidered. Amend. carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Ford, seconded by Dr. Whittaker, that there be no extra fee for the conferring of a degree in absentia. Carried.

The President gave a verbal report as to the work of the Commission appointed by the Legislature to investigate the claims of Calgary College to degree conferring powers. He expected the report to be ready for publication in a few days, and said it was a matter of deep importance to all members of the Senate.

He also spoke of the special Military drill being conducted by the University, of the members of the Staff at the front, and the modification of the brilliancy of University functions on account of the war conditions.

Mention was also made of the successful summer school conducted in July and August in the University Buildings, under the direction of the Department of Education, with 175 teachers in attendance from all parts of the Province.

The President reminded the Senate that the matter of granting degrees in Divinity was not yet settled.

The President moved that a Committee consisting of the President, Principal Riddell, Principal Dyde, the Chancellor and the Vice-Chancellor, be appointed to consider the matter and report to the March meeting of the Senate. This was seconded by Dr. Dyde.

It was moved by Vice-Chancellor Beck, seconded by Mr. Ford, that this University do not grant degrees in Divinity, but that this Senate recommend to the Government the granting to denom-

inational colleges of power to confer degrees in Divinity.

The Vice-Chancellor later withdrew his amendment with the consent of Mr. Ford with the request that the following be added to the Committee:-- Mr. Ford and Dr. Rutherford.

These were added to the original motion and the motion carried.

On motion of President Tory, seconded by Mr. Ross, the following Committee was appointed to bring in a report on Convocation ceremonies:-- Dean Kerr, Mr. Ford and Dr. Dyde.

The President reported that the nurses of the Province were desirous of arranging an affiliation with the University for purposes of uniform examinations. The Senate approved of the idea of the President continuing negotiations and reporting at a later meeting.

The question of the recent utterances of Professor Alexander on the Bible was brought up by Vice-Chancellor Beck who considered that Professor Alexander's services should be dispensed with. The matter was discussed informally, and, while there were many strong expressions of opinion condemning the position which had been taken by Professor Alexander, as the matter was one clearly belonging to the Board of Governors, it was dropped, and the meeting adjourned at 1.20.

(1) The President and Mr. Ross reported that the *Provincial* Association ^{of Nurses} was being formed, the draft of the bill now being prepared, but that the matter would probably not come before the present session of the Legislature. The aim was to bring the bill into harmony with the wishes and usual practice of the University in connection with affiliated societies.

(2) Degrees in Divinity.

"The Committee appointed to make a report on the subject of degrees in Divinity met in the President's Office on the 19th day of February, 1915.

There were present the following:-

The Chancellor - The Honourable Mr. Justice Stuart,

The President - Dr. Tory,

The Vice- Chancellor - The Honourable Mr. Justice Beck,

The Principal of Robertson College - Dr. Dyde

The Principal of Alberta College - Dr. Riddell,

Dr. Rutherford and Mr. Ford.

After a very full discussion the following resolutions were moved and carried:

Dr. Rutherford moved, seconded by the Chancellor, that this Committee report to the Senate of the University in favour of exercising the power to confer the degree of Bachelor of Divinity in course upon a properly organized course of study being arranged.

The President moved, seconded by Dr. Rutherford, that in the opinion of this Committee the right to confer the degree of Doctor of Divinity jure dignitatis aut honoris causa should be given to the theological colleges."

"A subsequent meeting was held on the 27th of February, 1915, in the President's office.

The following were present: - The President, Dr. Dyde, Dr. Riddell and Mr. Ford. In addition to these the Rev. Father Hudon and the Rev. Canon Boyd were present for purposes of discussion:

It was resolved as follows:

This general meeting of the Committee of the University with respect to divinity degrees together with the invited delegates approves of the principle already adopted by the Committee that the degree of Bachelor of Divinity in course be given in the University.

That the preliminary requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity be as follows:

- (a) That the candidate shall have the degree of Bachelor of Arts or its equivalent.
- (b) That the candidate shall have taken a three years' course in Theology in a recognized college, the percentage of marks required for passing in such college to be left for later determination.
- (c) That the candidate shall have taken a special course a part of which will be given in the University and part in the Theological College, the division to be determined hereafter and the University to determine the part of the course which it will offer and to approve of the part to be given by each individual college; it being understood that the courses proposed by any theological college need not be identical with any other, it being however intended that the standard shall be uniform.

That the outline submitted by the said Committee with respect to an application from Robertson and Alberta Colleges submitted herewith be approved and referred to the committee to work out details."

It was moved by Dr. Rutherford, seconded by Dr. Crang, that the report be adopted. This motion was carried with the idea that the Committee should go forward to complete details.

(3) Law Lectures. Reported by the Registrar as follows:

"The number of students registered in the Faculty of Law for the present session is 76, of whom 44 have registered in Edmonton, 24 in Calgary, and 8 in other parts of the Province.

At the beginning of the year Dr. Walter S. Scott of Calgary was appointed as Adviser on Legal Studies, and Mr. W. Kent Power, also of Calgary, was appointed Registrar of the Faculty for the city of Calgary. Upon these two gentlemen the greater part of the lecture work in both cities has fallen, but able assistance has also been received from one of the judges of

the Supreme Court, and from eleven barristers in the city of Edmonton. Another member of the Bench will probably deliver a course of lectures before the close of the session, and about six barristers of Calgary will have assisted in the course of lectures in that city by the same time. Mr. Justice Stuart has assisted in both cities, his subjects being Constitutional Law and the History of English Law. Mr. G. S. Fife, of the Department of History in the University, is giving lectures in both cities on British and Canadian Constitutional History.

The time tables show that lectures are given in the Court houses beginning at 8.45 or 9.00 o'clock in the morning, and closing in time for students to reach their offices at ten o'clock; or beginning at 5.10 in the afternoon, when students are able to get free from their office work. The total number of lectures delivered is approximately 150 in each city.

Attendance on lectures last year was made compulsory by a ruling of the Law Society. This year, since that ruling has been rescinded, the University has fixed a requirement of attendance upon at least two-thirds of the lectures in each course, where a student desires to present himself for the degree of LL. B. The requirements for this degree include both the regular Law work as set forth by the Law Society, and about eight additional subjects as prescribed by the University. Satisfactory attendance and examination in all of these is required before a student may obtain the degree of LL. B."

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. Dickson, that the report be received and filed. Carried.

(4) Convocation Ceremonies. Dean Kerr reported as follows:

"Your Committee appointed to consider the question of a permanent form of procedure for Convocation for the public conferring of degrees begs to report as follows:

A circular letter was addressed to all the universities in Canada and also to the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Manchester, and Trinity College, Dublin, asking for information regarding their Convocation procedure.

The registrars or secretaries of nearly all the institutions addressed responded most fully and courteously, and the information thus received was examined by your Committee. The procedure in most institutions goes back directly or indirectly to that used at Oxford. It happened that three years ago our sister University of Saskatchewan investigated this subject very thoroughly, and worked out a very suitable form based, with slight emendations, on that of Oxford. The form of procedure which your Committee submits for your approval will be found to resemble, with some minor modifications, that already adopted by the University of Saskatchewan." (Signed) W. A. R. Kerr,

- I. Procession.
 - A. Juniores priores. -- Procession (in double file); involutes at entrance to Convocation Hall. Audience stands during entrance of procession and remains standing until the Chancellor has reached his place and sits down.
 - B. Order of Procession:-
 1. Graduands: B. A., B. Sc. in Arts, B. Sc., M. D., LL. B., M. A., M. Sc.
 2. Members of Convocation: Bachelors, Masters, Doctors.
 3. Staffs, Principals and Presidents of Affiliated Institutions: Preparatory Schools, Normal Schools, Professional Societies, Colleges.

4. University Staff - juniores priores.
5. Senate.
6. Board of Governors.
7. Guests of honor, including (a) candidates for honorary degrees (the latter to be accompanied by those who present them); (b) Ministers of the Crown.
8. Vice-Chancellor and Minister of Education.
9. President and Prime Minister.
10. Chancellor and Visitor.

Note: It is recommended, in order to facilitate the formation of the procession, that a bedell or marshall be appointed.

II. Invocation.

The Invocation shall be pronounced in rotation by the Principals of the affiliated theological colleges, and shall consist of the following prayer written for the purpose by Principal Oliver, Saskatoon:

"Most Gracious God and Father in Whom dwelleth all fullness of light and wisdom, enlighten our minds, we beseech Thee, by Thy Holy Spirit, that we may have a true conception of Thy will. Convince us by Thy Grace that Thou hast made us towards Thyself and that our hearts will find no rest till they find rest in Thee. Be pleased to bestow Thy choicest blessing on every school of learning that strives to lead men into a larger life. Grant that the Students and Professors in this University may ever study to be helpful, may cease not to be patient in the search for truth, and in the midst of doubt and difficulty to abide steadfast, undismayed. Give us grace always to employ our talents to the profit of this province, the advancement of this Dominion of Canada, the glory of our Empire, and the advancement of Thy Kingdom. Give unto them who today go forth from this University, that no pursuit of glory, gain or wealth, that no desire for knowledge of things vain and hidden, that no envy or sloth or indifference nor any other creature may be able to separate them from whatsoever things are true and honest and just and pure.

Hear us of Thy mercy through Him Who taught us when we pray to say

'Our Father, Who art, etc.'"

VI. Conferring of Degrees.

Degrees are conferred by the Chancellor with the consent of the Senate on the recommendation of the Faculty Councils. The Registrar, as Secretary of the Senate, requests permission of that body for the admission of the candidates; the Dean, as representative of the Faculty Council, presents them; the President, representing the University, receives their pledge of loyalty and fidelity; the Chancellor admits them to the degree. The Chancellor remains seated during the ceremony except when he rises to admit a Master or Doctor. On his right are the Visitor and guests of honor; on his left, the President. Candidates are presented for degrees in the following order: Bachelors, Masters, Doctors, Honorary Doctors. In each case, degrees in course precede ad eundem degrees; professional degrees precede higher; junior Faculties precede senior.

The ceremony comprises four parts: Petition, Presentation, Pledge, The Admission. The Pledge is not required of those proceeding to the same or a higher degree.

(1) The Petition. The Registrar addresses the Chancellor and Senate in these words:

"Eminent Chancellor and Gentlemen of the Senate, I present to you the petition of the Faculty Council of this University that the candidates whom I shall name, having fulfilled all the requirements of the statutes, may, with your permission, be admitted to the degrees to which they are entitled:-

"To the degree of Bachelor of Arts,

(Then follow the names in full, those of the women first.)

(Placetne vobis, insignissime Cancellarie et doctissimi Senatores, ut (A.B.,C.D.) qui compleverunt omnia quae per statuta requiruntur ad gradum Baccalaurei in Artibus admittantur?

The Senate replies, "Granted" (Placet)

(2) The Presentation. The Dean, followed by the candidates, approaches the Chancellor and the President from the left and presents the candidates with these words:-

"Eminent Chancellor and President, on behalf of the Faculty of Arts (etc.), I present to you these scholars (Bachelors)

and ask that you will admit them to the degree of Bachelor (or Master) of Arts."

For ad eundem candidates the following form is to be used.

"Eminent Chancellor and President, I present to you this Bachelor of Arts in the University of (Toronto) and ask on his behalf that you will admit him to the same degree in this University."

(Insignissima Cancellarie et egregie Praeses, praesento vobis hos meos scholares (Baccalaureos) in facultate Artium ut admittantur ad gradum Baccalaurei (Magistri) in Artibus.)

(3) The Pledge. The President, then rising, addresses the candidates in these words:-

"Do you promise faithfully to observe and loyally to maintain the statutes, customs, privileges and liberties of this your University? Do you pledge your honour that when you become a member of Convocation you will vote only for those whom you surely know or firmly believe to be fit and proper persons to share in the government of this University? Do you solemnly promise to conduct yourself in all things loyally and faithfully to the honour of your University, the encouragement of learning and the good of your country?"

(Vos dabit is fidem ad observandum statuta, privilegia, consuetudines et libertates istius Universitatis. Item quod quum admissi fueritis in domum Convocationis in eadem bene et fideliter ad honorem et profectum Universitatis et patriae vos geretis. Item nisi quem habilem et idoneum certo sciveritis vel firmiter credideritis.)

Each candidate replies. "These things I pledge myself to do." (Do fidem.)

(4) The Admission. The Chancellor then addresses the candidates in these words:-

"By virtue of the authority vested in me by the Legislature of this Province, and with the consent of the Senate of this University, I consent to admit you to the degree of Bachelor (Master) of Arts, and to invest you with all the powers, rights and privileges pertaining to that degree, and I charge you to use them for the glory of God and the honour of your country."

(Ad honorem Dei et ad profectum patriae, ego, auctoritate totius Universitatis, admitto vos ad gradum Baccalaurei in Artibus, insuper do vobis potestatem omnia faciendi quae ad eundem gradum spectant.)

Then the Dean repeats the words, "I present to you - (giving the candidate's name in full)," (*Praesento tibi....*) and the candidate kneels and places his hands between those of the Chancellor. Then the Chancellor says, "I admit you" (*Admitto te*) and the Registrar places the hood over the candidate's head. Hereupon the Bachelor rises and passes to the Chancellor's right.

When a Master or a Doctor is being presented the Chancellor rises and, shaking hands with the candidate, thus admits him to the degree.

The ceremony for the admission of an Honorary Doctor should indicate the desire to do honor to a distinguished guest. The petition to the Senate should be omitted, the pledge not exacted. The presentation is made by a member of the University especially appointed for that purpose. In making the presentation he should refer to the eminent services of the guest as reasons why the University delights to do him honour. The Chancellor says, "In recognition of your illustrious public services (or eminent services to Science or Literature) I desire on behalf of this University to confer upon you the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws and to express the hope that our country (or Science, or Literature, or Art, etc.) may continue for many years to be enriched and ennobled by the devotion of your great gifts." Then the Chancellor shakes his hand, welcoming him to membership in the University. This is followed by the signing of the roll of Honorary Doctors.

Your Committee submits both Latin and English forms, but thinking that a gain in dignity would be made through intelligibility recommends the adoption of the English forms.

It is recommended that the University provide the Chancellor with an official robe.

IX. Recession.

The recession will be led by the Chancellor and Visitor, and the audience will remain standing until the recession has left the Convocation Hall."

It was moved by Dean Kerr, seconded by Mr. Ford, that the report be adopted. Carried.

It was moved by Dr. Dyde, seconded by Dr. Riddell, that the Committee on Degrees in Divinity be continued, with the addition of the name of Dean Kerr. Carried.

It was also moved by Dr. Dyde, seconded by Dr. Riddell, that, as there would be no dean of a Faculty of Divinity, the question of who should present the B. D. candidates be referred to this committee on Degrees in Divinity. Carried.

A discussion followed as to the two senses in which the word "Convocation" is now used. It was agreed that the regular general meeting of members of Convocation should be held to give opportunity for any discussion or objection of members as to the conduct of university affairs, adjournment being then taken for the purpose of the public conferring of degrees, for which, of course, the reported programme of procedure is intended.

5. Dean Kerr then presented the report of the enrolment, etc. for the session, as follows:

"I have the honour to submit for your information a report dealing with the attendance, scholarship and discipline of the students registered in this University.

It is obvious that the present abnormal conditions have simply halted our regular growth.

An analysis of the total registration of 439 may not be without interest. I might point out that comparisons as between last year and this year are especially interesting as indicating the trend of development on account of the practical identity of enrolment.

The entering class this year shows a decline of 18 as compared with the 178 of 1913; on the other hand the number of graduate students has jumped from 8 to 20. The interest which teachers in various parts of the Province - from points as far south as Cardston and Raymond - are taking in the M. A. courses is very gratifying and affords excellent proof of the vital and stimulating association the University is effecting with the most intellectually alive of the teachers in our Province. While it would be entirely premature to talk yet of a graduate school, the time is perhaps at hand when something should be done towards giving a separate organization to this significant and important aspect of our work.

Everywhere the older universities are endeavoring to bring professor and student into more and more intimate contact, believing that herein lies the secret of influential and effective work. In other words, small classes have become the ideal. From

the foundation of the institution this policy has been followed. Three years ago the ratio of students to instructors was 13 - 1; two years ago it was 13.5 - 1; leaving out the Law students, who are taught by a special corps of instructors, we find that in 1913-14 the proportion was 12 - 1; while in 1914-15 it is practically 10 - 1. The exceptionally good showing this year is of course partially owing to the halt in the growth of the student body.

As noted a year ago, the various religious bodies in relation to their numerical position in the Province are proportionately represented in our student population, and we may assume therefore that the University, while a State institution and non-sectarian, possesses the confidence, generally speaking, of all shades of religious opinion.

5. National origin.

More than ever at the present juncture we are prone to examine the racial elements which are being welded into the Canadian population. The following statistics will give an idea of the ethnic genesis of our student body.

In other words, 84% of our student body is of British birth and 16% of foreign origin. Of the latter 16%, 13% is from the United States and in some respects hardly to be considered normally as foreign at all. 3% only can be regarded strictly as alien. Of the 84% of British genesis, 62% are native born Canadians and 22% are from various other parts of the Empire.

It is perhaps fair, therefore, to infer that amongst

those of the rising generation in Alberta who are being trained for the learned professions and equipped for leadership in the community, our own British stock is in an overwhelming and re-assuring preponderance.

6. Home Addresses.

The home addresses given by our students also throw interesting side lights on what is going on amongst us. Although 69 of the students on our roll are of foreign origin, only 12 of these give a home address outside the British dominions; 360 dwell in Canada, and of the latter 231 are residents of our own Province of Alberta. If to the latter were added some 72 students who for the purpose of their education are temporarily living in Edmonton, the total would be 303.

As a matter of fact, we draw students from 67 different communities in the Province - last year there were 61 - and these represent a really astonishingly wide area of distribution. They come to us from Grande Prairie and Medicine Hat, from Vermilion and Coalhurst, from Morinville and Cardston, from Castor, Bankhead and Edson. We surely have a right to the name "Provincial".

7. Age of students.

Our students range in age from 16 years to 53 -- the youngest having been born in 1899, the oldest in 1862. The two favorite years were 1892 and 1894, in each of which 41 were born. As out of a total registration of nearly 450 we have only 5 under 18 years of age, it is evident that we are dealing with a fairly mature lot of students.

II.

Scholarship.

In regard to the standard of scholarship, I feel safe in stating that our staff, which in its own training represents many different institutions and has therefore adequate standards of comparison, is on the whole well satisfied with the work and

attainments of the student body. The High School system of the Province is really just beginning to produce, and our intake of students should year by year show improvement in training.

While some modifications of our system of regular test examinations have been introduced in certain senior courses, -- for instance, it has seemed more profitable to require an essay or a practical examination rather than a written test -- we still believe in and adhere to the principle of compelling our students to work steadily throughout the year. We are establishing on a sure foundation a solid tradition of regular work.

III.

Discipline.

With respect to discipline, I have had but little to observe. Perhaps I could say nothing more satisfactory than this. The students' self-government machinery is operating admirably. We are fortunate, indeed, in having men occupying responsible posts in the student body who have cordially collaborated with the authorities with a view to smoothing difficulties and avoiding friction.

IV.

Conclusion.

In conclusion, may I express on behalf of my colleagues and myself our appreciation of the intelligent and kindly interest which the Senate takes in our academic work. While we feel our task to be in the most real sense vital and of national importance, it has sometimes its disappointments, and the knowledge of your warm and sympathetic support never ceases to encourage the members of the staff in the performance of their daily duties.

It was moved by Dr. Riddell, seconded by Mr. Harcourt, that the report be adopted as read. Carried.

The President spoke of the gift of books which had been received from Miss Marian Gill.

The question arose as to whether Dr. Ritchie's degree should be M. B. or M. D., and caused a discussion in which the minutes on page 149 were referred to.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Crang, that A. B. Ritchie be accepted as a member of Convocation and granted the degree of M. D. Carried.

The other recommendations for degrees ad eundem were accepted, and on motion of Dean Kerr, seconded by Dr. Riddell, the report was adopted.

7. The Report of the Department of Extension was then presented by the President as follows:

To the Senate of the University of Alberta.

Gentlemen: -

I have the honour to submit for your consideration a report, covering the work of the Department of Extension from July 1st, 1914, to February 28th, 1915.

During the present session the work of the Department of Extension has been carried on under four divisions.

A. Extension Lectures.

Extension lectures were delivered by 16 members of the staff of instruction of the University, by the secretary of the department of extension, and by Mr. J. S. Woodsworth, Secretary of the Canadian Welfare League. Two hundred and nineteen lectures have

been delivered in 73 communities, including 87 lecture centres, Edmonton, for example having several lecture centres. There was an average attendance at the lectures of 117, and an aggregate attendance of 25,580. Fifty-five courses of two or more lectures were given, and 32 single lectures. This is a distinct expansion over the work of last year, when 150 lectures were given, with an aggregate attendance of approximately, 15,000 at 40 centres.

In connection with the lectures a special effort was made to take advantage of the general interest in the war. Courses of lectures were arranged on topics relating to different phases of the war situation, with the object of stimulating a better type of patriotism among the people of the Province. This effort has met with most gratifying results. Mr. J. S. Woodworth's special lectures on Social Service were well attended at Edmonton, Calgary and Olds.

B. Publications.

A Press Bulletin has been published weekly throughout the college term, 25 issues of 400 copies having been circulated. These were sent to principals of high schools, editors or newspapers, members of the Legislature, members of the Senate and Board of Governors of the University, librarians of Travelling Libraries, directors of extension work in a number of universities in Canada, Great Britain, and the United States. The material was so prepared as to be ready for use by the Press. It consisted of short paragraphs dealing with our own and other universities and with subjects of interest to farmers and dwellers in rural districts. The object of the Bulletin was to bring the work of the University before the public and the increasing use of the material provided therein, by the newspapers of the Province, as well as the interest with which its appearance was looked for by many of those who received it, proves that it has not failed of its object.

C. Debating and Public Discussion.

There has been an almost phenomenal development in the work of this division during the present year. During the eight months covered by this report, namely, July 1st, 1914, to February 28th, 1915, 463 package libraries have been sent out to 105 communities in the Province, and 9 to communities outside the Province, including

Alcorn, Miss.

Provincial High School Debating League.

Twenty-three schools entered the League this term, as against fifteen last year. The subject chosen for the preliminary debates was "Resolved that the Consolidated Rural School is preferable to the small rural school," and that of the semi-finals and final: "Resolved that Canada should adopt the Australian System of Compulsory Military Training."

D. Travelling Libraries.

The results from the work carried on along these lines have been very gratifying indeed. A comparative table of the number of libraries, circulation, etc., is appended:

The great difficulty in connection with this work has been our inability to supply the demand. At present we have 25 applications for travelling libraries on file which we are unable to fill and we are receiving applications almost daily although we have not made any particular effort to advertise this work. It would seem as though we were almost under the necessity of providing liberally for our travelling libraries.

Besides the books in the regular libraries, a number of volumes of non-fiction, approximately 150, which are being added to continually, have been reserved as open-shelf literature, from which

students of special subjects may borrow selected groups. These books deal with a great variety of subjects, such as the rural life problem and its various aspects, the various aspects of social service, as well as scientific and literary subjects.

An addition has been made during the present year to the travelling library service, in the form of lending collections of lantern slides, the particular feature of which is special sets upon the European War, secured from the Newton Co., London, Eng. These sets have been provided in duplicate for the use of our own lecturers and for lending. Over 500 pictures are provided. These have created a great deal of interest and have been widely used with excellent results.

8/ Sets of slides have been used during the term 144 times and their popularity is steadily increasing.

In conclusion I may say I think a conservative estimate would place the number of people directly reached by the extension programme for this year at 50,000.

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Dr. Crang, that a Committee on Graduate Studies be authorized, the Committee to be named at the next meeting of the Senate. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon.

9. A. W. A. Gold Medal.

On resuming at 1.30 the following extract from the minutes of the meeting of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, Feb. 1st, 1915, was read:

"A letter was read from Miss Beatrice Ockley, Secretary of the Alberta Women's Association, stating that at a meeting held on January 9th, 1915, the Association had resolved with regard to its Gold Medal that it should be awarded to the student in the graduating class who takes the highest standing in the senior courses required in the third and fourth years in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. On motion of Messrs. Alexander and Sheldon this communication was approved and referred to the Senate of the University." Agreed.

The President reported verbally the gift of \$35 by the A. W. A. for library books in Colonial History.

The Registrar was requested to express to the A. W. A. the thanks of the Senate for this donation.

Recommendation from the Faculty of Medicine.

"The Registrar was asked to note for the Senate and Board of Governors the idea of granting scholarships in the first two years in Medicine on the same basis as the first two years in Arts and Sciences, and in Applied Science."

It was moved by Dr. Riddell, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the Senate send to the Board a suggestion that they reconsider their policy of granting scholarships, with a view to providing bursaries for needy students.

It was moved in amendment, by Dr. Dyde, seconded by Dean Kerr, that the Senate appoint a committee to reconsider the matter and report to the Senate, -- the request of the Faculty of Medicine to be held over meantime.

The motion was withdrawn and the amendment on being put was carried.

The Chancellor nominated the following for this committee: The President, Dean Kerr, Dr. Sheldon, Dr. Revell, Mr. Edwards, Dr. Riddell, Dr. Dyde and Mr. Bishop. Carried.

10. Governor-General's Medals.

On motion of President Tory, seconded by Dr. Revell, it was agreed that the Governor-General's medals be awarded as follows:

In the Faculty of Arts & Sciences-- To the student who at the end of the second year secured the highest standing in the ten Junior courses required in the first and second years, provided that an average mark of not less than 75% be obtained - Silver medal.

In the Faculty of Applied Science - Conditions of award to be similar to those for the Faculty of Arts and Sciences - Silver Medal.

In the Faculty of Medicine - Conditions of award to be similar to those above, but the medal to be awarded at the end of the first three years instead of at the end of the second - Bronze Medal.

11. Colors for Pharmacy.

The Faculty of Medicine brought in a recommendation that "Cinnamon" be the distinctive color in the Department of Pharmacy. This was agreed to by the Senate.

12. Before the Calendar material was considered, Dr. Riddell brought up the question of harmonizing the courses of the University and the Department of Education in Matriculation and Grade XI, and in the First Year and Grade XII. Mr. MacKenzie stated his opinion that the Department of Education should really control the former as it concerns the high schools of the province, while the University should control the latter. The difficulty seemed to lie in the not covering of certain Junior courses covered in Grade IX and Grade X but not required in Matriculation. The hope was expressed that some common ground should be found.

It was moved by Mr. Justice Beck, seconded by Dr. Dyde, that a committee be appointed to meet the Government to discuss this matter and report. Carried.

The following committee was named by the Chancellor: President Tory, Dr. Riddell, Dr. Sheldon, Judge Taylor, Mr. Justice Beck.

12. Calendar for 1915-16.

The Calendar Committee brought in a detailed report of necessary and desired changes in the Calendar, and additions for the Calendar of 1915-16.

On motion of Mr. Ross, seconded by Judge Taylor, the report was adopted as submitted.

The President reported on the work of the year in

 O. T. C. He asked the attitude of the Senate towards turning
 the Physical Education into military channels entirely for the
 next year.

It was moved by Professor Edwards, seconded by Mr.
 Dickson, that we agree to the idea of making Physical Education
 next year take the form of military training. Carried.

The granting of standing in Arts and Sciences to
 those who had enlisted was referred to the Faculty to deal with
 on application, and report to the Senate at a later date.

The President put forward the name of W. F. Ferrier
 for the degree of D. Sc. (Honoris Causa).

It was moved by Professor Edwards, seconded by Dr.
 Dyde, that this degree be conferred. Carried.

The President also stated that the Arts building would
 be opened in the fall, and suggested a celebration at the time
 of opening.

The Vice-Chancellor brought up the question of the

affiliation of the Catholic College. As they would wish to proceed on established lines strong in Classics and Literary subjects, they would like to make a proposal for affiliation on a basis of doing their own teaching and being examined. President Tory asked that no clauses be contained in the resolution limiting the scope of the discussion.

The Vice-Chancellor moved, seconded by Mr. Ford, that a committee be appointed to consider a proposal from the Edmonton Jesuit College for affiliation with the University. Carried.

It was moved by Dr. Riddell, seconded by Dr. Tory, that the Chancellor name a committee of himself and nine others for this purpose.

It was moved by Vice-Chancellor Beck, seconded by Professor Edwards, that the following nine be a committee: The Chancellor, The President, The Vice-Chancellor, Dean Kerr, Dr. Riddell, Dr. Dyde, Dr. Rutherford, Mr. Ford, Mr. MacKenzie.

The amendment carried.

The President reported that the Committee on Student Affairs had found it in the interests of the Student Body to expel a student for theft.

The meeting adjourned at 4.15.

Minutes of the meeting of the Senate of the University of Alberta held at 10 a.m. April 28th, 1915, in the Library, Assiniboia Hall.

The Chancellor was in the chair. There were also present, President Tory, Dean Kerr, Judge Taylor, Doctors Rutherford, Riddell, Sheldon, Boyd, Revell, Crang, Galbraith, Whittaker and Allan, and Messrs. Knight, MacKenzie, Ross, Bishop, Henderson and Harcourt, and the Registrar.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted on motion of Dr. Rutherford.

The Chancellor then welcomed to the deliberations of the Senate Professor John A. Allan, the newly elected representative of the Faculty of Applied Science, in place of Professor Edwards, whose term had expired. The Chancellor remarked that Professor Allan would now take the place of Professor Edwards on any Senate Committees.

The following agenda was then proceeded with:-

2. Business arising from the minutes:

(a) It was reported that further details of the course for degrees in divinity were not yet ready.

(b) The President named the following as members of the Committee on Graduate Studies: Dean Kerr, Professor MacEachran, Professor Allan, Assistant Professor Gordon (Secretary); the Heads of Departments to be consulting members.

(c) The Committee appointed to consider the policy of granting scholarships recommended as follows:

First, that the Matriculation scholarships remain as to amount (\$200) as heretofore, but that this sum be divided into eight scholarships of \$25 each instead of four scholarships of \$50 each. It was further recommended that acting on the principle that merit deserves academic recognition and need deserves monetary assistance, scholarship should be recognized by a tangible memento of some kind, as, for example, a book suitably bound and stamped with the University crest; that the sum of \$200 which is now annually voted by the Board of Governors for scholarships in the first and second years be turned into an accumulating loan fund to be loaned to needy and worthy students.

On motion of Drs. Riddell and Sheldon this report was received and considered clause by clause.

The first clause was adopted on motion of Messrs. Ross and Galbraith. The remaining clauses were adopted on motion of Dr. Riddell and Mr. Ross, with the amendment that we recommend to the Board of Governors that the sum available for the loan fund be increased from \$200 to \$500.

On motion of Drs. Riddell and Whittaker, a committee consisting of the President and Dean Kerr was appointed to carry

out the conditions of this report insofar as the decision concerning worthy students was concerned.

On motion of Dr. Riddell, seconded by Judge Taylor, the report as amended was then adopted as a whole.

(d) The President and Mr. MacKenzie reported that a meeting would take place shortly to consider the harmonizing of the requirements for Grade XI and Matriculation, and Grade XII and First Year University.

(e) The Registrar read from the minutes of the Joint Faculty of March 29th, 1915, as to military allowances in the special cases of Harold Riddell and J.D.Harrison and the general resolution under which such cases as Howard Taylor, Roy Lutz and Roy Stevens had been dealt with. The action of the Faculty in these matters was approved on motion of Judge Taylor and Mr. Ross.

(f) It was reported that on account of the illness of the Vice-Chancellor and other causes, no further progress had been made in the matter of the proposal of the Edmonton Jesuit College for affiliation.

Senate approved of this change in the terms of award of the Lloyd
Hartnoll Bishop Memorial Fellowship in English Literature. This
action was taken on motion of President Tory, seconded by
Dr. Galbraith.

6. List of Accepted Dental Colleges:

The suggestion coming from the Board of Dental Examiners
as to a new list of approved Dental Colleges was then discussed.
The registrar was asked to put in the exact names referred to in
the report. As amended, the report was then adopted as follows:

"That a new list of Dental Colleges be made out as
follows:

(1) The four present Canadian Dental Colleges: Royal
College of Dental Surgeons, Toronto; Dental College of McGill
University, Montreal; Maritime Dental College & Faculty of Dentistry,

Dalhousie University, Halifax; and the School of Dental Surgery, Montreal (affiliated with Laval University).

(2) The seven Dental Colleges as listed by the Dental Faculties Association of American Universities: University of California College of Dentistry; Harvard University Dental School; University of Iowa College of Dentistry; University of Michigan College of Dental Surgery; University of Minnesota College of Dentistry; School of Dentistry, University of Pennsylvania (Thomas W. Evans Museum and Dental Institute); and the Washington University Dental School.

(3) This list to be added to from time to time by the Senate on report from the Board of Dental Examiners, who shall be a Committee appointed by the Senate to investigate and report upon new applications which come before it. Before any such report containing a recommendation to add a college to the list is carried to the Senate, the Committee shall have satisfied itself:

(a) That the preliminary requirements of the College are at least equivalent to those required for matriculation into the University of Alberta;

(b) That the College form an integral part of some recognized University;

(c) That after January 1st, 1917, a four years' course in Dentistry is given by the College in question. "

7. Correspondence:

(a) A letter from the Provost was read reporting the action of the Committee on Student Affairs in suspending Arthur J.E. Davies from the University on a charge of theft, pending further investigation.

A second letter from the Provost submitted the following report unanimously passed by the Committee on Student Affairs on April 23rd:

"That the Committee on Student Affairs concur with the Students Union and deprecate the introduction of Fraternities, Sororities and other organized secret societies, and request the Senate to exclude such organizations from the University."

It was moved by President Tory, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the resolution of the Committee on Student Affairs be concurred in. Considerable discussion ensued, the following members taking particular part therein: Dr. Riddell, Dr. Galbraith, Dr. Rutherford, Dean Kerr, President Tory, Dr. Sheldon, Dr. Allan and Mr. Henderson. The points most prominently mentioned in the discussion were the residential system and the method of student government now in operation; the comparatively small student body and the desirability of maintaining a thoroughly democratic spirit. After full discussion the resolution was carried. .

It was then moved by Mr. Henderson, seconded by Dr. Whittaker, that a Committee be appointed to draft a regulation forbidding the organization of such secret societies within the University. Carried.

The President, Dean Kerr and Dr. Sheldon were named a Committee by the Chancellor.

(b) The President read the following letter from the College of Physicians and Surgeons:

"At a meeting of the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, held in the City of Calgary, Friday, April 23, 1915, the following resolution was unanimously adopted-

That the Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the Province of Alberta give to the Medical Students attending Alberta University, scholarship of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or its equivalent, as follows:

One for General Proficiency at end of 1st year
 One for best in final Physiology at end of 3rd year
 One for best final in Anatomy at end of 3rd year
 One for best final in Medicine at end of 5th year
 One for best final in Surgery at end of 5th year.

The prizes to be presented by the President of Alberta Medical Council or his substitute.

9. Other Business.

(a) Dr. Galbraith brought up the question of publishing in future Convocation programmes a list of the results of the various professional examinations. It was noted that this had been difficult this year because of Convocation having been brought on earlier, but it was agreed that the principle would be a good one to adopt in the future.

(b) Dr. Whittaker asked that a letter might go to the Dental Association from the Registrar containing information as to the action of the Senate in regard to matters concerning that Association. This was agreed.

(c) On request of Dr. Galbraith, the President made a statement regarding the hospital unit which had been offered by the University to the Federal Government but which had so far not been accepted. The President said that the following were the terms of the offer:

(Telegram to Ottawa April 8, 1915)

"The University of Alberta offers to provide the personnel of doctors, nurses and men for a base hospital of 250 beds and the technical equipment for the surgical, medical, dental, pharmaceutical, pathological, bacteriological and radio-graphic departments, organization to be placed under Capt. H.H. Moshier, A.M.C., Professor of Physiology. An early ^{reply} is asked to enable us to complete the technical purchases immediately. What establishment in numbers of staff will be authorized?"

After a number of telegrams had been exchanged and considerable delay had occurred awaiting the answer from Ottawa, the following telegram had been received:

"Replying your night letter 17th inst. re stationary hospital Alberta University stop. Grateful for generous offer but have already undertaken to maintain five stationary hospitals and think that at present it would be unwise to do more in that direction, but later on Alberta University will have no doubt an opportunity to help."

There the matter stood for the present.

(d) The President reported that both McGill and Toronto Universities had formally accepted our medical curriculum for the first three years and that students who had covered this work with us could be transferred without further examination to the fourth year in either of those institutions.

The Senate then adjourned until the meeting of the afternoon for the public conferring of degrees.

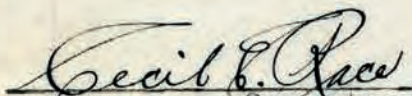

MEMORANDA of a conference held in the office of President Tory at eight o'clock on Friday evening, February 8th, between the members of the committee appointed by the Senate to consider a proposal from the Edmonton Jesuit College for affiliation and representatives of the college. There were present Chancellor Stuart, Vice-Chancellor Beck, President Tory, Dr. Riddell, Dr. Dyde, Father Drummond, Father Bellavance and the Registrar. The discussion centered about three matters:

1. Matriculation requirements.
2. Order of studies of the University curriculum.
3. A suggestion that a degree other than that of B.A. be granted by the University to students completing an approved course in the Jesuit College.

After considering the present arrangements with the Joint High School and Matriculation Examinations Board it was considered that probably with slight modifications the requirements as they now stood could be met by the students completing their fourth year in the Jesuit College. It was suggested that the representatives of the College confer with the Joint Examinations Board as to what modifications, if any, would be desirable and possible, so that students from the Jesuit College might write upon the same examinations as all other students in the Province.

Some discussion took place as to the wisdom of granting a degree other than that of B.A. and, from the University point of view, of granting any degree to a student who had not received actual instruction from the University. The more desirable method, it was felt, would be to investigate the possibility of a certain degree of uniformity in the courses taken up. These uniform subjects, it was suggested might be studied by all students in university classes. Other subjects such as Philosophy and religious options might be taken up in the Jesuit College and credit for a certain proportion of the Senior courses might be granted in that way. This would be following the general principle

on which religious options were now accepted from the other Theological Colleges. Such a method would obviate the necessity of a different degree, as all would aim to qualify for the B.A.

Adjournment was then taken at ten o'clock, the President suggesting that before they met again copies of the course of study followed in the Jesuit College might be made out and put in the hands of the members of the Committee.
